EARLY SHOOT SAVES COWBOYS FROM HEAT!

The Great SASS Northwest Regional

“Another great match is behind us. The format for this match was one of the best, being able to shoot in the morning each day and being through by noon kept everybody out of the hot afternoon sun and the winds that usually come up.” CD Tom.

Despite the high cost of gas, shooters motored to Central Oregon from just about everywhere. Motor homes were nestled amongst rows of white campaign tents, giving the appearance of a civil war photo by Mathew Brady. Add to this scene the campfire smoke, and you have what appeared to be a Sioux encampment on the Little Big Horn. Across the road from the encampment stood 15 stages full of steel and begging to be shot. All in all it was the type of panoramic scene that would make the heart of a western buff “soar like a Hawk.” There were no whiskey runners here. No terrorists, no rebels without causes, only 179 happy Action Shooters and 16 Mounted Shooters, with a supporting cast of vendors, cooks, and waddies, and all of them without excep-

tion, had one heck of a good shoot.

STAGE DESIGN? Some said “it was the best I’ve ever experienced.” No worry about stage design. Central Oregon is the home of one of SASS’s premier stage designers, Texas Jack Morales, SASS #5026, who once again assembled 15 innovative stages. His formula is simple: you put the targets right up close, and they will miss. A philosophy stated long ago by the man who sports No. 1 on his jersey, the venerable Judge Roy Bean. Texas Jack simply follows the Judge’s advice, and bingo, you have popular, easy to remember, and easy to miss stages. He puts ‘em up close and in your face, and people manage to miss ‘em! BUT, THEY MISS ‘EM FAST FOLKS, believe me—they miss ‘em very fast!

The weather during the Northwest Regional was on the warm side, but not enough to distract the shooters. Shade tents were conveniently located, offering respite from the sun, for those who wanted it, and posses were staggered to prevent backup, allowing main match stages to be completed in the cool of the morning. Each posse shot five stages each day. Shooters were mostly done by high noon, and then side-matches and/or shopping took place. Saturday night’s banquet and costume contest were once again held at Bend’s finest watering hole, the
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

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

One of our own, Shakey Molasses, SASS #20549, is running for the California Attorney General's office against Jerry Brown, a well-known and long time California politician. Shakey Molasses, otherwise known as Kenneth A. Weissman is a strong advocate of Second Amendment rights as opposed to Jerry Brown who is not. Shakey Molasses is a member of the California rifle and Pistol Association, the NRA, Gun Owners of America, JPFO, is on the Board of the Angeles Shooting Ranges, and others, as well as SASS and the Cajon Cowboys (in Southern California).

Make this election a litmus test—do you support gun rights or not? I am the only absolutist on the ballot for Attorney General. Vote for me, or stop pretending you care! Get off your butt, and vote for Ken Weissman for Attorney General. *No excuses!*

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SASS MOUNTED SHOOTING SUMMIT 2006


The SASS Territorial Governors Summit has been a huge success since its inception in 1999. It has brought together representatives of SASS Affiliated Clubs from around the world to discuss and vote on issues concerning the sporting end of SASS, including proposed rule changes and modifications, national shooting programs and policies, shooting categories, membership concerns, and safety.

The SASS Mounted Shooting Summit is based on the same principals, but is focused solely on SASS Mounted Shooting. The SASS Mounted Shooting Summit is a two-day meeting that will include presentations, open discussion, agenda items, and issue voting. It is open to all confirmed SASS Mounted Shooters that meet the following criteria:

- Registered as a SASS Convention Conventioneer
- Confirmed SASS Mounted Shooting Member
- Registered to participate in the SASS Mounted Shooting Summit

The following is an outline of the procedures and schedule that will be followed:

- The SASS Mounted Shooting Summit will take place over a two-day period, Friday and Saturday, December 8-9, 2006.
- The official agenda will provided to each Summit participant upon pre-registration and may be previewed on the SASS Mounted Web site and Wire.
- Day one will be devoted to presentations and open discussion of agenda items. Each agenda item will be addressed in order and allowed adequate time for discussion. The discussion periods will be limited to a maximum of three hours each day. The Summit Moderator will monitor the discussion to ensure the group stays on subject. Points not relative or pertinent to the agenda item will not be allowed.
- Day two will be devoted to ballot voting and open discussion. Voting issues will be confirmed and ballots handed out. Ballots must be returned to the Riviera Hotel West Registration Desk by 4:00 P.M. Saturday.
- Votes will be tabulated for distribution Sunday morning. Voting issues that receive a two-thirds or better majority vote are binding. Voting issues that receive between one-half and two-thirds vote will be sent to the SASS Mounted Shooting Advisory Board for ratification.



A LITTLE MORE DETAIL:

For him: A scarlet hunting coat, fresh from chasing the foxes. A circus ringmaster! A Canadian Mountie, a British soldier, a wealthy Colonial landowner in richly embroidered scarlet jacket, waistcoat, and breeches!



We will also make a great effort to recruit more Mounted Shooting members and clubs with a brand new club affiliation package that includes a new Mounted Shooting DVD, a course of fire stage sample book, as well as promotional materials and advice



on promoting a Mounted Shooting club both locally and nationally.

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




COWBOYS IN THE FAMILY

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


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LADY LIBERTY & THE COWBOY

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
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A "CALL" FROM THE WHITE HOUSE

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
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
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BAT & WYATT'S LAST RIDE


I recently discovered a story about my favorite Western Lawmen, Bat Masterson and Wyatt Earp. Few people knew about the story except the reporter and later, screenwriter, Gene Fowler. I made the discovery when listening to one of his audiotapes made before he passed away in 1951. Gene worked for the Denver Post in 1917 where he authored a wonderful account of the funeral of William F. Cody, "Buffalo Bill." A few years later while working for William Randolph Hearst on the New York Journal, American, Fowler made friends with a fellow newspaperman, Bat Masterson.

Bat Masterson was 62 years old in 1919 and worked as a sportswriter on the New York

Telegraphy Newspaper. Wyatt was almost 70, living in Southern California working with William S. Hart as a technical adviser on his silent film westerns.

Chalk Beeson, former Marshal, Mayor, and former owner of the Lone Branch Saloon died. The Beeson family thought it would be a nice tribute to Chalk to have a Dodge City 50th anniversary parade. To gain national interest a few real living legends would be a perfect addition. Thus, out went the call for Bat Masterson and Wyatt Earp.

By 1919, people had turned away from the cowboy to the new world of modern city building. It was the end of "The Great World War" and the time of manned flight. Henry Ford's automobile



was replacing the horse, and electric lights were illuminating homes. New fangled machines were changing the work place. The big city of New York promised creature comforts on a grand scale, and immigrants filled the apartment buildings and tenement houses.

The trains moved commerce across the country, and the telephone brought the world together.

It was the second year of the great Influenza outbreak and the year of the Black Sox World Series baseball scandal. Newspapermen were heathens and yarn spinners. It was the heyday of big city newspapers and the beginning of Prohibition, and Bat Masterson was part of it all.

Everyone talks about the old days when both Bat and Wyatt were Lawmen, but this was a later time, and the trip back to Dodge City was the perfect occasion for bringing up the old days and commenting on how things had changed.

But, little did Bat and Wyatt know of a young kid who had left New York on a crime spree of his own at the same time. He held up a Wells Fargo train, killed a guard, and made off with a moderate amount of money. This was a young Al Capone, who would soon cross paths with the old time Lawmen, and justice would be served.



Imagine an 1891 Wyoming town pulled out of the history books and plopped down in a semi tropical wilderness, hidden away in the center of New Zealand’s North Island. The Mellonsfolly Ranch at Waterfall Mountain is done up in “The Cowboy Way” for sure. As Ruby Rae Stevens and the Baron, we spent a wonderful week in this Old West town.

To digress a little, we met the builders of this western get away in Durango, Colorado four years ago. John and Kenda Bedogni, alias Charles and Caroline Mellon, were on an American Southwest vacation when we met them in the saloon at the Strater Hotel. Over a couple of beers and dinner, John rolled out his blueprints of the town, at that time still a gleam in his eye. His vacation was more of a scavenger hunt for all things “Old West” to outfit his town when completed. Pot bellied stoves, light fixtures, tables and chairs, oh ... and a buckboard as well as the chuck wagon seen in the movie “City Slickers!” He ended up filling a container to ship back to New Zealand. John’s attention to detail on this project borders on fanatical, and the end result certainly shows it.

In October 2005, John e-mailed us a website (www.oldwesttown.co.nz) to take a look at, and that was all it took.

We had to go! Mellonsfolly opened in February 2006, and we visited in mid-March, the end of summer in Kiwi land. The long winding dirt road up through the Raetihi valley to the town is breathtakingly beautiful, and really gives you the impression of going back in time.



When we arrived at the outskirts of town, there was a fresh felled tree lying across the road, and sure enough, three desperados galloped up to meet us, and at gunpoint (CO2 pistols), relieved us of our purses! Not to worry; we all know the script ... seconds later the Marshal and his deputy came hightailing it in from the other side and nabbed the bad guys! Corny? Sure. Fun? You betcha! The cast of cowboys on horseback consisted of staff, neighbors, and even a fellow guest!

We pulled up to the front of Miss Nancy Ann’s Hotel for Single Girls, unloaded our gear, and went upstairs to our room. The hotel lobby is a magnificent replica of an elegant Old West hotel. The native wood paneling (macrocarpa I believe), rivals polished mahogany. The velvet curtains, brass feather beds, period furniture, fireplace, pot bellied stove ... it’s ALL here. We looked around in awe only long enough to change into our western duds and head to the heart of the action, the saloon. No western movie set can match what you see when you push through the swinging doors. The woodwork will overwhelm you again. The tables and chairs are where all those in town, guests and staff, greet and meet for meals. It doesn’t take long before everyone is on a first name basis. I believe Kiwis and Ozzies (Aussies) are the friendliest people on earth. (But, don’t make the mistake of confusing the two!)

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All the modern equipment is present, computers, phones, atm machine, movie screen, but you just can't see it! The wooden light posts, boardwalk, and water troughs make a walk through town at sunset a walk back into the Old West era. After dinner (Texas Rose knows how to keep you stuffed), the poker chips and cards come out, all in fun. Win big, or lose big, but have a good time. Then, comes the campfire across the street from the saloon. As luck would have it, one of the guests brought his guitar and his great voice. What a treat!

The rooms are equipped with modern showers, but you and your partner may want to check out the bathhouse containing two slipper bathtubs, and a place to put your chilled bottle of wine.

If horses are your thing, the Virginian and Nancy Ann have a horse ranch nearby, and some real pretty countryside to ride them in.


The town sits in a post card pretty valley on 1000 acres of land next the Whanganui National Park, rugged wild bush country. We viewed a little bit of it in a couple of mechanical "horses," Polaris off

The news crew seemed to have as much fun doing the spot as we did appearing in it. They shot several hours of footage, edited down to about a minute and a half. We ended up on New Zealand national TV, as visiting Arizonans!

The Marshals office also houses the gun safe. This place is not a shooting venue. John maintains CO2 Colt pistols and Winchester lever guns, all firing pellets. But, we still had a hoot firing away at pie plates.

New Zealand has some reasonable gun laws regarding shotguns and rifles. Pistols, however, have tighter regulations. We elected to bring our side-by-side coach guns with our hosts' blessings. The New Zealand police department was most cooperative in providing the paperwork to bring them into the country, as were the airlines. However the airport security people (on the US side) proved to be a bit of a pain.

The good news is our hosts and the other guests had such a good time blazing away with the doubles they are considering making them available in the near future. Gunleather is provided, as well as prop six-guns and lever guns. Bring your own gunleather if you wish; we

road buggies. One of the faithful recreations is the courthouse. It represents a Wyoming courthouse built when the state was brand new, right down to the portrait of Benjamin Harrison, and a United States flag ... with 44 stars on it. The building also houses the movie theater. The screen appears from out of sight and an unseen video machine plays old western TV shows and movies, including the very first Gunsmoke episode. These buildings are built with the same wood beams and materials as the originals, not facades added to concrete block buildings.

On our second day at Mel-lonsfolly, one of New Zealand's national TV news networks called and wanted to come right up to film a "human interest" spot for the news.

did. You can still swagger around town with a hogleg or two on your hip. Be sure to bring your best western clothes, as this is total immersion in cowboy culture. You haven't lived until you hear "cowboy" spoken with a Kiwi accent!

The town is made up of ten or twelve buildings including a barn and coral, a general store, telegraph office, and more, most of which have a room or rooms built into them. Ten rooms in all sleep twenty people.

Visit the website; you may get hooked as fast as we did. And, as of this writing, one US dollar buys you about one-forty-four N.Z. dollars. Texas Rose and the Judge work very hard to see to it the guests are having fun, and they are pretty darned good at it. We had the time of our lives! 🐾

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KINCAID'S IRREGULARS "RIDE TO GLORY"

130th Anniversary Battle of the Little Bighorn, Montana

June 2006

"Can you hear anything yet, boy?" The creases around the old Indian's eyes deepened. He grinned tolerantly at the young boy sitting beside him underneath a tall tree. The boy opened his eyes and glanced at his father, a revered holy man among the Ogallala tribe.

"No, father, I cannot hear anything." "Close your eyes ... tighter. That's right. Now ... listen to the wind." The old man, known as Tashunka Witko, instructed.

The youth heard the wind rustling through the trees. Montana's rolling hills seemed to gently sway, and the pleasant scent of the greasy grass in spring rose up, delighting his nostrils. He squeezed his eyes hard, yet heard nothing.

"Father ..." his apology was interrupted. "Look," the old man pointed to the distant horizon, the fringe of his buckskin shirt sashayed with the movement. The setting sun was slowly turning a radiant orange. The Little Bighorn River meandered slowly near the village; its

be heard in the distant, near the southeastern edge of the village. The young boy squeezed his eyes tighter and listened. "Right into line ... March!" "Draw ... pistols!" "At a walk ... March!" "At a trot ... March!" "Charge!"

The boy sat rigid, listening. Sounds of his people perforated the air; women screaming, babies crying, warriors issuing orders as they raced to meet the soldiers.

His eyes burst open. Breathing hard, he stared ahead. "I do not understand." His father rose to his feet. "Someday, Curly, you will." The old man started for the village. The boy stood and sprinted after his father. The boy called Curly would one day be known among his tribe and the white man as Crazy Horse.

Eight Days in the Saddle

Kincaid's Irregulars were scheduled for three separate events in a nine-day period, eight of which would be in the saddle. Cavalry training, the Crow's Nest Ride, and the Battle of the Little Big Horn re-enactment were tightly choreographed. For the organizers, logistical nightmares

became a common occurrence.

The Cavalry Training locale was superb. Hand-chosen by our wrangler, Kevin McNiven, aka Wyoming Drifter, SASS #15351, the site of South Pass, Wyoming couldn't have been more ideal. Picturesque vistas, pine trees, and cottonwoods sporadically peppered the countryside. Large boulders appeared casually tossed by Mother Nature. Near the historic mining camp and ghost town of South Pass, an excellent Historic National Park, the topography was suitable for military training. We'd be competently trained by Saber Jim, SASS #31350. This talented horseman was elected last year to the position of Commanding Officer, "E"

became proficient military cavalymen, moving in precision to the commands used 130 years ago. The well-trained horses we rode were from the remuda of Wyoming Drifter, undoubtedly the best horseman in North America. He served as chief wrangler, along with his son, Travis, and their aide, Bob, aka Three Knives. Our group forged an uncommon camaraderie, which

would serve us well in the days before us.

The Crow's Nest Ride was a highlight. General Custer, aka Son of the Morning Star, SASS #54450, informed us that several groups attempted to organize this ride and only one group succeeded - ours. Logistics were difficult, with many personalities involved, including property owners, the BLM, and Indian tribal landowners. My first coup on Indian land! Hokahey!

The Crow's Nest is a high mountain

level high with the winter's melting snow. "All before you belong to the Lakota. Preservation of our ancestral way of life is a calling ... your calling, son. Listen."

The boy closed his eyes again and concentrated intently. He envisaged the many teepees along the river, a thousand-fold in count - more than he had ever seen. Five thousand ponies dotted the landscape. Smoke from the many cooking fires choked the afternoon sky. On the horizon was a column of horsemen clad in blue. Their multicolored flags fluttered with the breeze. Their leader - a white man in front - called out, "We've caught them napping, boys!" The men cheered excitedly. Faint shots could

Travis McNiven watched over us, as a mother hen would protect her young, ensuring our safety. Our Crow Indian scouts were first-rate guides, pointing out and discussing the landscape where Custer, Benteen, and



Reno marched. We were re-tracing history! At the base of the Crow's Nest we were informed there were two ways up ... the easy way and the more difficult way. The General looked at me, one of his scouts, for a decision. It was time to "cowboy up." "Hell, General," I mustered in my best John Wayne drawl and pointed up the ridge, "there's only one way up that mountain as I see it." With a hurrah from the command, we went straight up!

The view on top was magnificent! "The countryside is some of the best I've ever ridden," Wyoming Drifter mentioned later, and he should know, having ridden all over this country of ours. Fifteen miles away, we barely spotted the National Park where Custer and his men fell, our final

When it comes to authentic headgear in the Old West, the cap has gotten short shrift. With the possible exception of the Civil War kepi cap and the railroad cap, no one in





Westerns seems to don the suckers. Well, believe it or not, caps were much more popular than is popularly believed.

For example, in a well-known biography of an Old West outlaw-marshal, the esteemed author, Bill O'Neal, who is a friend of mine and quite a stickler for accuracy, spots a cap on a captured outlaw and postulates that perhaps the cowboy foreman-turned-bank robber was trying to disguise himself with a "train cap." Well, take a gander at the posse of men who captured that outlaw and notice the guy in the front row with a similar cap on. The logical conclusion is that caps were utilized in the Old West, much more than popular literature and movies portray.

And the prejudice continues. In the 1970s, I visited my Kingman Cowboy Cousins to take some photos for art reference. When we got saddled up, my cousin Billy told his son Craig to "take off that cap and go get your hat." It was the right call (I wanted "authentic" photos of working cowboys), but somewhat misleading nonetheless.

Yes, the iconic image of the cowboy-hatted Westerner is a hard one to overcome, but just be aware there were other forms of headgear in the Wild West as well, and one of them was the cap.

Crow scouts about the surrounding area, we moved out. It would be another four hours before we would hit the mid-way stop for the first day. Along the way, Ivan Inaccurate, SASS #28522, in the persona of Henry Voss, Chief Trumpeter, 7th Cavalry, sounded the cavalry commands he had practiced all year on his bugle, adding a surreal ambiance to our march.

The second day we came across the "Lone Teepee." Enthusiasts know Custer and his troops came across a lone teepee on their ride from the Crow's Nest. Placed in the exact vicinity, I had this surprise waiting for the troops (only time ever to be done!). Late afternoon, we completed our ride arriving at Medicine Tail Coulee, the point where the 7th flanked the Indian village and was repulsed to Last Stand Hill. After riding this route for two full days, knowing Custer rode it in several hours with little rest, we appreciated how tired men and animals must have been when they encountered a hornet's nest of Indians 130 years ago.

Upon our arrival at the river, the 10th Special Forces Airborne, stationed in Fort Carson, Colorado, was flying two Black Hawk helicopters overhead, practicing their jumps within a hundred yards of our picket line. It was inspirational to see eight paratroopers sail out of those helicopters and glide their way to an exact point on the ground. After their landing, we shook these men's hands, thanking them for all they do for the United States and us . . . true heroes in our midst! They would perform again, for the June 25th anniversary, prior to our re-enactment.

Next day we practiced military maneuvers near Medicine Tail Coulee. It is with the courtesy of the Real Bird family and the Crow Tribal Indian Nations that we participate in the re-enactment on this hallow land. Those that have a love for this time period appreciate the significance of riding these grounds. We rode to Weir Point, where a futile, half-hearted attempt was made to aid Custer. Those troops left Reno Hill, moved to Weir Point, with a view of Last Stand Hill, and returned to their entrenchments and their wounded.

Over the next three days we participated in possibly the largest re-enactment in the history of this venue. Approximately 60 cavalrymen, twenty of them Kincaid's Irregulars, along with at least 15 to 20 dismounted troopers went up against a sizable number of Indians, easily outnumber-

ing us 2 to 1. This re-enactment is conducted in front of a live audience, akin to a Wild West Show. It doesn't dawn on you until you hear your cue, gallop into the arena with the other re-enactors, and sit on horseback before a crowd of over 300 cheering fans that you are participating in one of the largest Wild West Shows in America! The actual battle is breathtaking and an adrenaline rush, too. The cavalry and mounted Indians line up and face the crowd, approximately two to three hundred yards away, on a ridge, overlooking the Little Big Horn River, and wait for the signal. Suddenly "Charge!" is ordered, and all hell breaks loose, with shrieking war cries, galloping horses everywhere, clouds of dust and blackpowder smoke filling the air, and staccato-gunfire cracking all around you. Galloping to the river, we get repulsed, dismount, and fight hand-to-hand until not a white man is standing.

Add to this our own chuckwagon, placed next to the Little Bighorn River, offering three delicious meals a day, and a cowboy music concert by Wyoming Drifter, and our adventure can't get much better.

On Sunday, June 25th, exactly 130 years from the infamous date, a cavalry unit is to ride to the Little Bighorn Battlefield National Park for the Memorial Service. Thanks to General Custer and the National Park Superintendent, Kincaid's Irregulars, numbering twenty cavalrymen, took the honors and rode with pistols (unheard of nowadays) to the Memorial Service. A Park Ranger unlocked the gates for our entry, and we solemnly rode in file formation. As we passed the many headstone markers denoting where Custer's men had fallen, we saluted. There wasn't a dry eye among us. The crowds lined both sides of the asphalt drive leading to our destination. We rode behind a vehicle escort, lights flashing. Dismounting, we faced the crowd and their cameras. Our able General Custer gave a stirring speech during the ceremonies, along with others. We were due for our last re-enactment and were late. Kincaid's Irregulars galloped past the 7th Cavalry Monument and Memorial shaft, a mass grave bearing the names of the soldiers, scouts, and civilians killed in the battle. We had come to honor the brave warriors and soldiers that fought and died at the Greasy Grass, becoming immortalized in American history. Our formation gallop, with the 7th's guidon proudly flying, was a fitting tribute.

After the final battle, Kincaid's Irregulars were assembled before a set of authentic Crow teepees. Here they dismounted and were brought to order. As

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their names were called out, each man stepped forward, saluted General Custer, and received a certificate for "performing his duty with exemplary Honor and Distinction against the Indian Nations in the face of overwhelming odds." They were then bestowed the Army's Distinguished Indian Wars medal. With a final salute, our nine-day, three-event adventure came to a conclusion.

These events would not have happened without the enthusiasm of those SASS members from across the country joining Kincaid's Irregulars. Certainly, without the horsemanship of Wyoming Drifter, the use of his excellently trained horses, and his friendship with many in

the area, this event could not have materialized. I thank him, his ever-patient son Travis, and their assistant Bob for all they did for us and especially me. Our gratitude to the Real Bird family for their hospitality and friendship also goes out.

Future adventures are forthcoming. Our next adventure is our seven-day sternwheeler cruise in Alaska, come September, with forty SASS members in attendance. 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

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

of songs for the movie and was also playing one of the villainous Brown brothers. Bob's occupation is performing as a Cowboy Balladeer. He was on hand even though he had no scenes. Over the two days we talked guitars and western trivia.

Our first scene found me playing cards with gentlemen who were in real life the County Coroner and a real-estate developer, while the saloon girl who sat at our table owned a daycare center. We played cards to pass the time, and the real-estate developer was cheating. The highlight of the second scene being filmed was a row of Dancehall Girls high kicking while our heroine sang and flirted around the room. These scenes were filmed from every conceivable angle, so we found ourselves doing the same things over and over again. Those of us drinking whiskey or rum were actually drinking a half and half mixture of Pepsi and Sprite, while the beer drinkers were drinking beer. Care was taken to make sure the bottles were filled to the same levels and there was always about the same amount of liquid in all of the glasses. We also had to make sure the card game was at the same place each time. I was fascinated by the lengths to which they went to preserve continuity. After the scene was finished, Bill came around and wanted some publicity shots with myself and the Coroner drawing on one another over the card game.

With the 1st scene in the can with a safety, that is a backup in case something should happen to the final take, it was time to move on to the dancing girls. There was a break for lunch, all of the equipment was reset, and we were assigned different places to sit, since in the script it was a different day. I found myself at a table near the bar with T-Bone and a dance hall girl draped across his arm. There were four dancers on stage, and our heroine would join them as she completed her song at the end of the number. After the number was finished, the girls made their way to seats at different tables and a pretty lady in a bright green dress repeatedly joined me. Again all angles were shot, and when the director was satisfied we went home with instructions to return tomorrow for a third and final scene for this set.

The third scene involved a Spanish Dancer being accompanied by guitar and accordion. She would do her dance and then there would be some conversation at the bar. Again, it would be shot from every angle possible. Across the bar at another table I saw Big Ed Dawson, SASS #66749. He shoots with the Springfield Long 9 Club where I am a member. The only time during the whole weekend there was a problem was when the guitar player (not Cowboy Bob) left before all of his scenes were shot. The director was

Years ago I never realized how many people there were just like me still dreaming

about the west and playing cowboy. It is always good to know we are not alone. One thing I discovered was they really do say things like "Quiet on the set!" "Action!" "Cut!" And "That's a wrap!"

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


Shooting Like a Man

I have often been asked why I have been able to shoot with men and no other woman has. I don't believe it is because of anything special I possess. Instead I think it has been because of the way I have been taught to shoot, and therefore is something any person can learn as well.

The first step to shooting with the guys is to be competitive. I have often heard shooters, men and women, tell me they are just

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

“war bonnets” just to prove one might hold about a quart and a half on a good day! The 10-gallon moniker for that faithful piece of cowpoke haberdashery is yet another of the many words the gringo has adulterated from his compadres south of the border. The term comes from the Spanish “galón,” which means “braid.” It comes from the days of the sombrero when the fancier sorts had layers of braided embroidery on ‘em. (Think of the “frogging” on coat sleeves for high-ranking military officers.) The word “sombbrero” itself linguistically comes from the word “sombra,” which means shade.

Punchers from different regions wore different styles of hats. Those hailing from the south tended to wear higher crowns and wider brims than their northern cousins. The objective of the southwest puncher was to have a big air space up above his top-knot so he’d keep cooler. The



Cowboys in the Southwest favored the larger brimmed, higher crowned hats like the one on the left, which provided more shade and were cooler than their northern counterparts. Cowboys in the northern, more windy areas, appreciated warmth and less flighty, smaller hats like the one on the right.

Remember I have this buddy who figured cowboys wear all that leather stuff ‘cause taffeta just wrinkles so awful? This same person also believes Smith & Wesson is a sort of salad dressing and 10 gallon hats actually hold 10 gallons. While I will admit I am powerful-tempted to figure out a formula for a convincing salad dressing, I simply cannot bring myself to pour liquid into any of my

wider brim bought him a bigger claim to shade. The northern puncher was, by comparison, more concerned with staying warm, hence

shorter crowns. And up where the wind blew, a short brimmed hat wouldn’t get launched into the ether

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the brim is perfectly flat to begin with!) It's also considered heap bad luck to put your hat down on a bed. I don't know why this is, but back in the old days, there's many a puncher who simply would not relinquish his hat to the lady of the house for fear it might end up on a bed.

The gross grain ribbon was pretty much a standard feature as a hatband practically from day one. Still, punchers got downright inventive about "after market" hatbands. Depending on what part of the territory they were from or how much talent you or a fellow ranch hand might have, a hatband could incorporate anything from horsehair to finely-braided leather or rawhide, rattlesnake pelt, conchos, spots ... well, you name it! Some of these hatbands were built simply for vanity's sake. More often they were there to size a hat that was bought a hair too big or to cinch an older one that had gotten loose back down to some semblance of its original size.

Stampede or "bonnet strings" kept the hat where it belonged. The less elaborate ones were a simple leather string threaded through a couple of holes on the sides of the crown. The dangly ends would be secured with a sliding knot or bead of some sort. "Stampedes" went the range of plain to fancy. Braided leather was highly regarded, espe-

cially if there was some fancy knotwork on them or a tassel of hair from a favorite horse or a girlfriend. Horsehair stampedes were also popular – though they tended to be a tad scratchy compared to leather.

Hats were not only functional pieces of protective headgear but served as many purposes as a puncher could think of. The brim was used to dip up water for a drink; the crown, a sip for your horse or a way to extinguish a fire. It could coax a spark into a flame to dry out after a dunking or shower or to cook up some chuck. Many an ornery cow brute has been turned by waving or tossing a hat into its face. It was a device for "fanning" a bronc as well as to balance yourself while up on that "hurricane deck." It was a signaling device. And many a broken pane of glass got "repaired" when some intrepid waddie stuffed his old John B into it to stop the wind!

And, yup, they made you look like a cowboy, which is sort of what it's all about!

as easily. In fact, a northern cowboy who wore big southern style hats was accused of "chuckin' the Rio" or puttin' on airs! Fellers who rode rough, brushy ranges favored narrow brims and short crowns as well.

Hats were, by and large, fairly modest in size when the West was young. That changed as the rodeo folks got up a head of steam. It was the women of rodeo who actually set the stage for those great big crowns and brims that became popular in the 1910's and into the '30's. You can see them in the paintings and sketches of Will James whose heyday was right in around that time. Charlie Russel's paintings, on the other hand, portray hombres wearing the typical smaller northern-style hats of his earlier days in Montana.

If you look at early photos, you see a lot of flat brims (some slightly flopped down from weather) as well as a number of "go-to-hell" or Curly Bill style brims where the whole front of the brim is pulled up toward the crown of the hat. You also see brims pulled crownward slightly to the side of front. This was the rifleman's crease, and the side lopped upward was always on the side the rifle was shot from. Both the go-to-hell and the rifleman's style brims were favored by shooters who used

vernier or ladder-style sights as they didn't knock the sights out of whack. Sadly, as Hollywood took over, go-to-hell creases became relegated to the faithful sidekick or comic relief. Rodeo and horseshow fads also began to change the way a hat brim and crown were shaped. Compare hats from the 50's and 60's TV westerns and photos of the real Old West, and you'll see what I mean.

The 1st priority after getting a new war bonnet was to get it shaped and fitted good. That scene in Monte Walsh where Tom Selleck dips his hat into a barrel of water is exactly how it was done back when. It still works today, and nobody should worry about getting a *good* hat wet. Just gently reshape it with your hands and then hang it in a cool place to dry. Keep a hat brush and hat sponges on hand to hold dust at bay and store all hats out of direct sunlight to prevent fading. And, for heavens sake, don't store your favorite hat in the car between shoots. Not only will the sun get it, but the heat will cause it to shrink up on you! When you take a hat off, either put it on a peg or set it on its crown. (Yup, upside down to what's normal for wearing!) It should *never* be placed with the open side of the crown down! That flattens the brim's shape out. (The only exception to this rule would be hats where



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

RANGE OFFICER ROUND-UP CROSS-DRAWS, ANGLES, AND "THE DANCE"

draws at the safety meeting. Sometimes there are so many warnings concerning cross-draw shooters who use them start to feel picked upon. I know of many top shooters who travel nationally and have changed to double strong side from cross-draw only because they felt like they were being hassled and singled out by match officials. Why do match officials have such a concern when it comes to cross-draws? The reason is many shooters who use cross-draws do not pay attention to holster angles and body position while drawing and returning the cross-draw pistol to leather.

First, let me state I'm a cross-draw shooter myself and over the years on occasion I've had to deal with over-zealous range officers that were hell-bent to DQ anyone using a cross-draw that didn't do "the dance" to their satisfaction. In one particular case I was moving to a shooting position from left to right, and I'm right handed. When reaching the shooting position, my body was


already almost turned 90 degrees, which is way more than anyone would ever twist their body while doing a cross-draw. After finishing the stage, the RO came up and gave me a warning for not doing "the dance." I asked if he were kidding. He told me the rule said you have to do the dance no matter what your body position. This occurred at END of TRAIL '98, and I couldn't believe at a match of that level the intent of a rule could be so misinterpreted. Upon reading the circa 1998 handbook I found it said, "the user must twist their body to ensure the muzzle never breaks the 170-degree safety rule during the process." It didn't say anything about doing a "dance." I suppose someone could literally interpret it to mean you must twist from any position, but somewhere common sense just has to prevail. This was before the RO Program was created, and there was no RO Committee to appeal to, but there was the Wild Bunch and Tex was in charge of editing the Handbook. I

struck up a conversation with Tex on the subject and asked if he could add two words to the rule, "if necessary." He agreed not breaking the 170-degree safety rule was the intent of the reason to twist the body; it wasn't supposed to be a dancing contest. He wasn't aware there were people actually taking "the twist" so literal. In the 1999 Handbook "if necessary," was added and has been there every since. I get reports people are still requiring cross-draw shooters to do "the dance" whether it is needed or not. If you are a cross-draw shooter and this still happens to you, I suggest you clip this article out of *The Cowboy Chronicle* and carry it with you.

If you are a cross-draw shooter, the onus is on you to make sure you are not breaking the 170-degree safety rule. I admit, though, I still see too many cross-draw shooters that are wearing their rigs wrong. We don't care who manufactured your holster and how beautiful it is, it is up to you to make

The rest of the RO Committee have articles in mind they would like to write, so next month we will begin printing original material from these folks.

It seems just about every match we attend Range Masters bring up cross-

whatever adjustments you need to keep it legal. The rule clearly states in the holster section, "Holsters may not depart from the vertical by more than 30-degrees when worn." There are way too many holsters, especially cross-draws, that are well over the 30-degree rule. There are also many cross-draw holsters that are worn too far back from the front-center of the body, and while there is no rule against this, it means you will have to twist much further to ensure not breaking the 170-angle. You are especially asking for trouble if you have too much angle and wear the cross-draw too far back. I strongly suggest you wear your cross-draw as far forward as the rules allow and with as little angle as possible - 10 to 15 degrees max. If you have your left foot forward a few inches (for right-handers), you will not normally need to twist at all to remain legal regarding the 170 degree angle rule.

How far forward can you wear the cross-draw? The rule states, "Main-match holsters must be located one on each side of the belly button and be separated by at least two fists at the belt." The rule doesn't say the cross-draw must be one fist away from the center of the body, which is defined as the belly button. It just must be on one side of it, with the strong side holster on the other side of the belly button, two fists away at the belt. It also doesn't say butt of the gun, it says holster, as I've heard of some people insisting the butt of the gun has to be two fists away or past the center of body. This subject was discussed by the Terri-

torial Governors, and while the Territorial Governors didn't want a shooter wearing two holsters on the same side of the body, they also realized the further forward a cross-draw is worn, the safer it is.

There are some cross-draw shooters who use what I call the "San Juan Maneuver." World Champion San Juan invented the practice of drawing the cross-draw first, and while holstering the cross-draw pistol with the left-hand, the right immediately moves to draw the strong side pistol. This is a very efficient method, and San Juan has instructed many classes and has taught it to many shooters. When performed correctly, it is legal, safe, and doesn't break the 170 degree rule. Some have tried to make the case this is illegal since there are two guns in the shooters hands at the same time. However the rule states, "Only Gunfighters may have two loaded revolvers in their hands at once." In this method, the cross-draw revolver is shot empty and is in the process of being returned to the holster before the strong-side revolver is drawn, therefore it is legal. I must add I have witnessed shooters using this method wearing their cross-draw holster with too much angle, too far back, or using an improper stance and do break the 170 degree rule. Only if your equipment in order and you've practiced this method until it has become second nature should you ever use it in a match.

Fire Down Below

The biggest threats to towns in the Old West were not gunfighters, cowboys or badmen. No, the biggest threat to pioneer towns was fire.

For one thing, almost everything was made out of wood—floors, walls, staircases, fixtures, ceilings. Virtually everything was a tinderbox waiting for a spark.



And what were those sparks? You name it. In Tombstone, in 1881, it was a whiskey barrel. Citizens were checking the alcohol level, with a match, of course, and the barrel exploded. Two city blocks burned down before the fire could be checked.

In a second fire, an outhouse went up in flames, probably caused by a lit cigar left on a ledge. In less than three minutes, the flames had spread with a velocity equaled only by a burning prairie in a gale. The heated condition of the prevalent woodwork assisted the devouring element in its rapid spread. Many buildings were ceiled with cloth, which acted as tinder for communicating the flame.

Here's what the local paper reported about the inferno:

"At three o'clock on the afternoon of May 25 [1882] a fire broke out in a water closet [outhouse] in the rear of the Tivoli Gardens, a saloon on Allen Street, and immediately spread to the framework of the 'garden.' Roofed with canvas, its wood framework dry, the fire burned 'with the rapidity of cotton,' consuming closets, kitchens, storerooms, and numerous shanties ... in less than 15 minutes the entire block between Fourth and Fifth Streets, and Allen and Toughnut was 'one steaming, smoking, blazing mass of desolation and ruin.'"

Not much in the Old West frightened the populace as much as the dreaded, all-engulfing fire.





gun belt. I had the same problem holding up my pants with a belt until the Vicar's Wife strongly suggested I start using suspenders. Then the light bulb *finally* clicked on; why not hold up my gun belt with suspenders?

But where is one to obtain gun belt suspenders? I've seen some in the homemade style, so I started asking questions. I found an Amish harness maker, Levi Weaver, nearby who was happy to furnish me with all the parts and directions I needed to put together a great looking set of gun belt suspenders.



One of the most important articles we use in Cowboy Action Shooting™ is the gun belt. Appropriate color, caliber, and size are carefully scrutinized. In my case the color and caliber are no problem, but the size never seems to be quite right. It says in *I Kings*

18:46 "the Lords' power came upon Elijah, and he out ran the king's chariot after he tucked his cloak in his belt." I have problems running at all with my gun belt on for lack of hips. At least once a stage I find myself pulling up and adjusting my

- Two Leather straps 1/8" by 1-1/4" by around 6 ft. long,
- Two Harness buckles,
- And a handful of assorted Chicago screws.


- 8 Oct 1901** J. D. Hardin, younger brother of John Wesley, is operating a saloon in Clairemont, Texas. At about 10 pm, he argues with a local named John Snowden over an account. "Angry words passed between them." At the close of business, Snowden and the rest of the customers leave. J. D. asks Snowden back inside. Moments later, three shots are heard coming from within the saloon. Hardin is found on the floor, at the end of the bar, shot through the heart, dying. His revolver hadn't been fired. Snowden was never brought to trial.
- 29 Oct 1901** Buffalo Bill Cody's Wild West train collides with another train near Lexington, Kentucky. Among the injured is Annie Oakley. She claims the accident turned her auburn hair white overnight. It will take 2 years and 5 operations for her to walk again. She will never appear again in the Wild West arena.
- 19 Oct 1902** Outlaw and parolee Jim Younger checks into the St. Paul's Reardon Hotel with a .38 pistol. Here, Younger commits suicide.
- 22 Oct 1902** Camilla Hanks, aka Deaf Charley, one time member of the Wild Bunch, shoots it out with the law in a saloon in San Antonio, Texas. He is shot and killed by lawman Pink Taylor.

- 14 Oct 1907** In Collinsville, Indian Territory (Oklahoma), the Last Pow Wow takes place as a ceremonial farewell of surviving American Indian chiefs. The event continues through October 19th.
- 1 Oct 1910** Nevada prohibits gambling.
- 23 Oct 1910** Buffalo Bill Cody and his troupe perform in Yuma, Arizona.
- 11 Oct 1916** Tom Candy Ponting, known as the Cattle King of Central Illinois, dies in Decatur, Illinois, age 92.

Bill Tilghman earned his fearless lawman reputation as a city marshal in the wild 1880's Kansas cattle town of Dodge City. He later served in the Oklahoma and Indian Territories as a deputy U.S. Marshal along with Heck Thomas and Chris Madsen, who were known as the "Three Oklahoma Guardsmen" in the 1890's. In 1910 Tilghman retired from the marshal's office and was elected a member of the State Senate from the 13th Senatorial District of Oklahoma. He resigned from the Senate in the next year to become Oklahoma City's chief of police. Tilghman's career ended in 1924 when he was shot dead by a drunken assassin.

During his life, Tilghman was a scout, Indian fighter, deputy sheriff, sheriff, deputy U.S. Marshal, senator, and police chief. 🐾

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PAR-SIMONIOUS PRACTICE

To me, at least, part of the challenge and fun of Cowboy Action Shooting™ is developing the skills to shoot better and move up in the competitive ranks. According to Wikipedia online, a game consists of a goal players try to reach, and a set of rules that determines what a player can or cannot do. Sounds about right so far. Further definition suggests if a player cannot, according to the rules, do anything to interfere with another player, then the conflict is considered to be a competition. Competitiveness is an innate biological trait that coexists with survival traits, according to Wikipedia. Therefore, it seems natural for most of us cow-folk to be competitive.

Having established we do play a competitive game, and therefore want to do better, how do we go about the task of improving? As most of us are busy, it would be nice to have efficient practice leading to




Figure 1. Split times from live fire practice (SAD stage, 10 handgun, 10 rifle, 4 shotgun, in a simple sweep). The dotted line represents best time (26.21 seconds) before par time practice, and the solid line represents best time (20.20 seconds) after working on technique with par time practice. Note that not only did the transition times improve, but so did the split times. This shooter's goal was to improve his shotgun times, both at the pickup and subsequent shots.

real improvement. Recently we discussed the use of split times to learn where to gain speed and efficiency in shooting. Once you have decided where you want to improve, practicing with an electric timer using the par time feature can help you to achieve that goal. Thus, par-simonious practice is frugal practice—it saves you time and even bullets.

What is a "par time" and how do you use it to practice? Well, the word par is Latin for "equal," and in competition, it means to be equal to the standard or normal performance. Par time practice means, simply, making your practice equal to some standard of performance. You can set the standard of performance at whatever you wish to achieve. If you have a goal of, say one second for the first shot on the draw, you can set the timer to beep again at one second. Most good quality electronic timers

have the ability to set a par time manually, and that is the key to this kind of practice. The timer can be set to beep first at a randomly determined time after pushing the starting button, and the par time can be set to beep again at whatever interval you choose. If you are practicing alone, using of the random start allows you to get in position before the starting beep. The beauty of par time practice is you can achieve significant improvement with just dry fire, in the comfort and convenience of your own home. Just make sure your guns are empty (check often to verify) and use snap-caps whenever required to prevent damage to the gun.

In order to use par time practice effectively, you need to know two things: 1) what is the function you want to improve, and 2) what is the new time you want to achieve. Let's say you want to improve the time of your first shot out of the holster with a handgun. Studying your split times, you may have learned that it takes you 2.5 seconds or more to respond to the starting buzzer by drawing first handgun and getting a good hit. You have identified the first part of your goal; faster times at the draw. Now what time do you want to achieve? Again, for the sake of discussion, let's say your split time was 2.5 seconds, and you would be satisfied by improving that time to 1.5 seconds. The way par time practice works is to set the par time feature so it beeps again after the starting beep, and you simply draw and "click," pointing at some imaginary (and safe) target in your living room, hoping to hear the click of the hammer fall before the par time beep. To do this, you push the starting button and get into your normal (not gamer) starting position; hands wherever you might normally expect them to be in a match (i.e., not touching any guns). When the buzzer goes off, draw and pull the trigger one time, expecting to hear the click of the dry fired gun before the second (par time) buzzer goes off. If the gun goes "click" before the second buzzer, you have beat the par time you set. If the buzzer goes off before the gun goes "click," then you have more work to do.

Okay Bunkies, that's the mechanics of par time practice. How it is helpful? How does this form of practice really help one improve? Many people, if not most people, who want to shoot faster just try to, well, shoot faster. Just trying to go faster doesn't allow for any analytical input to figure out what movements are efficient and what aren't. Furthermore, and I propose this is the most important factor par practice can help overcome, just trying to go faster doesn't necessarily train the most important part of your body, your brain. Just trying to go faster is often associated with a frantic mental state. Unless you can get your mind under control, the desire to go faster can produce anxiety and uncertainty. Anxiety does little to permit smooth action.

With par time practice, however, you can teach your brain you have all the time in the world. Here's how you do it. Remember our goal of getting the first shot out of the holster in 1.5 seconds? Set the par time for, say 3.5 seconds, draw and dry fire until you're bored with beating the clock. It may take ten replicates or fifty, but do it until you're smooth and find yourself standing around waiting for the beep. If you're really getting bored, you can experiment a little with how you grab the gun, present it, find the front sight, etc. This is the opportunity for analysis and developing the so-called muscle memory that obviates mental input.

Once this is working for you, decrease the split time to, say 2.5 seconds. Nothing much will likely change, except that you may find yourself waiting for the beep a little less. You will still hear the soft click of the hammer fall long before the timer beeps. O.K., so do this to boredom; then set the timer down to 2.0 seconds and keep going. Finally, set the time for your goal of 1.5 seconds, and I'm willing to bet you will still hear the hammer click before the beep.

Now obviously this may take more than one session, but it is a good idea to start every practice session with a slower time than your goal. With continuing practice, the boredom with slow times will come sooner, and you can probably get down to your goal time sooner. The good news is—as your comfort with faster times increases, so does your confidence.

First shot at the draw is, of course, just one example of what can be improved. Reholstering and drawing the second handgun, reholstering second handgun and picking up the rifle, setting the rifle down, action open and empty and picking up your shotgun are all transition events that can be practiced this way. Finally, you can even set a goal of total stage time you would be happy with and go to work. For discussion, let's say it is a SAD (Stand And Deliver) stage with little movement between guns, and you think a good time might be 25 seconds. Well, Pard, just set the par time and go to work. As with what we discussed above, set it for something like 30 seconds at first, then work your way down. Of course, readers of Tex's editorials realize that SAD stages are old hat, so you can stage guns all over the house, if you want to, and par time practice will help you develop the skills and mental calmness to deal with it.

Does it really work? Figure 1. shows the best time (SAD stage, 10 handgun, 10 rifle, and 4 shotgun) for a shooter before practicing transition drills with par time practice and after practicing with par time for several months.

It was stated that this might be called "Parsimonious" practice because it saves time and doesn't cost powder or lead. Actually, you can GAIN time, maybe enough to walk up to the stage and collect a ribbon or two. *Good luck and good shootin'!*



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
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


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DO YOU WANT TO WORK ON YOUR COWBOY GUNS?

Have you ever had the hankerin' to know what is inside those cowboy guns of yours? Well, you can learn about all those "giblets," as instructor Bobby Chavez puts it, in the Cowboy Action Short Gun (revolvers) and Cowboy Action Long Gun (rifles and shotguns) gunsmithing classes taught at Lassen Community College.

The instructors realize not all of the class attendees intend to become gunsmiths, so don't let that aspect deter you from considering attending one of the school's gunsmithing classes. Besides their NRA sponsored one-week summer gunsmithing classes, Lassen Community College offers a wealth of gunsmithing classes during their regular school year. A few years ago they realized most people who want to take gunsmithing classes cannot afford to take an entire semester off work to attend one class, so they changed the format of their regular classes to be 50 hours per week in length. Just right to accommodate a one week vacation. There are a few night classes.

This summer Coso Kid and I attended two classes, Cowboy Action Shooting Long Guns and Cowboy Action Shooting Short Guns. Fortunately the school scheduled the classes back to back. These classes were not offered in 2005, so we were determined to attend both Cowboy Action gunsmithing classes in 2006. With the political climate the way it

is in California, we can't be certain how much longer the school will be offering gunsmithing classes.

The gunsmithing classes generally start off with a short history of each gun. Then the instructor explains how the gun operates, how each part functions, and what the critical surfaces are. The rest of the day is spent dismantling, fixing, slicking up, and reassembling the firearms you brought with you, or in some cases, a gun someone loans you to "get fixed for free."

The cowboy short gun class covers Colts, Colt clones, and Rugers. Even though I love my Rugers, I have to admit the Colt clones are easier to work on. Even though there are several manufacturers, most of the Colt clones are essentially the same. Head space, end shake, cylinder gap, timing, and hammer and trigger "adjustments" are covered. Students fixed problems with

headspace, end shake, and timing on their revolvers. Forcing cones were checked, and the students cut the forcing cones to factory specifications. Everyone in the class had a revolver that needed some kind of work. Then Mr. Chavez covered slicking up the revolvers for Cowboy competition. As the instructor said, if nothing else, the class will make you an informed consumer, and give you something to bargain with, because you will be able to recognize any problems a gun might have.

The Cowboy Action Long Guns class covers both rifles and shotguns. The Winchester '97 was covered in detail. If you decide to take every last screw and pin out, you would, the instructor assured us, get it all back together. Double barrels are a piece of cake compared to the '97. The hardest part is removing and reinserting the springs that cock the gun. Actually the "removing" can be

quite exciting, as a spring can fly across the room if you don't have a good hold on it when you take it out of the gun.

The man sitting at the bench behind me discovered his brand new shotgun and rifle were both "broke," so he filed and tweaked, and by the end of the week, his long guns were in tip-top shape. The Winchester '92, '94, and the '66 and '73, and the Marlins were covered. The instructor made sure he covered all the lever action rifles and shotguns the students brought to the class. If a part was worn and could be welded, one of the full time gunsmithing students would weld up the part. Then the owner of the gun would grind or file it back to the correct shape. My .30-30 Marlin had already been "filed on just a little too much" in a prior life. So the instructor asked one of the full time students to "weld

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problem you have with a cowboy gun, or any gun for that matter. Do not fear ... there are no tests, other than "getting it all back together and making it work," but you will have lots of help, all you have to do is ask. If you have problems downloading, give Steve Taylor a call, and he will mail (or e-mail) the forms to you.

During the summer, dorm room housing is available for a nominal fee. For those that prefer motels, there are a lot to choose from in Susanville, and this year the school had a small RV lot for dry camping. Besides our rig, there were four other RVs in the RV lot, which is situated right behind the gunsmithing shop. 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up" the appropriate area. Then I filed the general area back to the right shape, and next commenced filing the "working surface" so the rifle would function correctly. After I got the "It's OK, you are done nod," the instructor took the rifle and test fired it, just to make sure it really operated correctly. The school has a "hog" (bullet trap) just outside the back door of the shop they use for function test firing. The days whiz by and before you know it, the week is over. Besides bringing your guns, there is a suggested tool list for the gunsmithing class.


We also attended Lassen's Modern and Cowboy Action Belts and Holsters class, an evening class that is two weeks long. Bob Hamilton teaches the class. The class was very informal, as the instructor realized most of us were also taking the daytime class. The time you showed up and the time you left were up to the student, and some of the students in the class were only able to attend one week of the class. The goal was for you to complete one project during the class, which is quite doable. Both Coso Kid and I were able to complete a belt and two holsters during the two-week class. No tools are required for this class. The instructor provided all the tools and supplies. There is a fee for each holster/belt you make that includes

leather, dyes, oils, edge coating, needles and thread, and so forth. Students are encouraged to bring their own belt buckles.

Other classes that were going on during the two weeks we were at the college included rifle re-barreling, cold rust and nitre bluing, color case hardening, and Parkerizing. The college offers a wide variety of other summer gunsmithing classes such as machine shop, knife making, stock making, engraving, welding for gunsmiths, function and repair of double action auto pistols, function and repair of single action auto pistols, function and repair of long guns (Remington 870, Benelli 90, Mossberg 500, Ruger Mini 14, and Colt AR15), installation of open and optical sights, recoil pad and sling swivel installation, and caustic bluing in addition to the metal finishing classes listed above.

So if you like to tinker or want to know how your cowboy guns work, these classes are for you. And the price is right. Each class is 1 unit, and registration fees for 1 unit are just \$26 for California residents. Nevada residents pay \$42 per unit. Students from other states or foreign countries pay a non-resident tuition of \$210 per semester unit. There is also a \$29 lab fee for each class, and a \$5 health fee. For \$60 you have access to a highly qualified instructor who can help you fix most any

TIME TO THINK ABOUT GROWING SASS BY ADDING A MILITARY CATEGORY?

For SASS to be willing to create a new category, there either must be a customer-focused driver, or some situation that will attract new members. The creation of a Military Category will not only fulfill a niche within SASS and pay tribute to the \$13 a month "frontiersmen in blue" who paved the way across the continent received in pay, but would also increase the marketability of SASS. SASS affiliated clubs would also benefit, via a potential increase in new local shooters, bringing an increase of revenue to these clubs. Additional revenue means better facilities and allows the local club more financial stability.

Currently, there is a national

organization based in Virginia, called the North-South Skirmish Association (<http://www.n-ssa.org>). The N-SSA is currently 12,000 members strong. Members of the N-SSA are competitive shooters who meet twice a year to compete against each other firing Civil War type firearms at targets of varying distances while uniformed as either Confederate or Federal soldiers. Some members are SASS members as well. SASS would be able to increase membership and aggregate revenue by the creation of the category and the marketing this category to members of the N-SSA and other reenacting groups.

Here are some thoughts that help differentiate the potential Military Category from other SASS categories:

- Shooters must shoot the main match duelist style. (This is due to the fact in the late 1800's the saber was considered a primary weapon wielded with the strong hand and the pistol a secondary weapon, drawn and fired with the weak hand.)
- All SASS main match rifles and shotguns would be allowed in the category. All SASS authorized revolvers with a barrel length of 5.5 inches to 8 inches would be authorized for use with in the category. (The thought behind this is most military issue revolvers were of the 7.5" variety. During the Spanish American War, the Government reissued the Colt Single Action Army cut down to 5.5 inches for Artillery Troops and Volunteers, notably the Rough Riders. During the Civil War, the 1860 Army and 1861 Navy had 8" barrels.) This category is open to all SASS authorized calibers and gauges.
- The shooter must compete with flapped holsters. It is the shooter's option to either use pistol butt forward or pistol butt to the rear. The 170-degree safety rule applies here.
- The shooter must have at least one cartridge box secured to their pistol belt. The belt buckle must have an emblem or symbol of the persona in which they are creating (e.g., the 1851 US Eagle Belt

Buckle or CSA, etc.)

- The shotgun belt must be of canvas web construction and hold no more than one shot-shell per loop hole. (This is based of the prairie belt worn by members of the military on the frontier and during the Spanish American War. During this time in history, the only likely military member that would have access to a shotgun was the Company Cook.)
- The shooter must be dressed in uniform throughout the entire event. In the case of a major event such as END of TRAIL, the participant must be in uniform for the side matches, main match, banquet (if applicable), and awards ceremony.

The participant's shooting uniform must contain elements of the following:

- A hat with appropriate branch or rank emblems or cords and piping. Palm style plantation style hats would be allowed in hot weather (they were used widely in the Southwest by the frontier military and during the summer in the Civil War.)
- Rank that is consistent with the persona the shooter is creating (e.g., stars for a general, etc.). (Rank can also be defined by the size of the stripe on the trousers, collar pinned rank, shoulder boards or hat cords. In the case of somebody shooting as a private, none of these would apply.)
- Boots shall be of either the squared toe cavalry style boots, Civil War style brogans or some variation there of, or the 1895 Combat Shoe. No modern style combat boots will be allowed. If the shooter does not wear cavalry style boots, the shooter must wear leggings. Shooters who wear Cavalry style boots would also be required to wear spurs.

It's unlikely to believe SASS would just decide to create a new category. If SASS shooters wish to see a Military Category, then we must start with local clubs on a monthly match level. Eventually we would be recognized at annuals, state, Regional, and larger matches.

There are many who believe shooting categories should not be designated via costuming choice, but with the positive precedence of the Classic Category and the B-Western Category, one can easily see the popularity of these categories and the value they bring to our beloved sport. It is my belief the creation of a Military Category would also greatly benefit our sport and specifically the

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
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KATZ REMEMBERS THE ALAMO

With Jim Bowie Tribute Knife

Remember the Alamo!

Katz Knives' commemoration of one of America's most patriotic battlefield achievements is its creation of the Alamo Bowie, an impressive tribute to Jim Bowie, the legendary 19th century Kentucky pioneer and patriot.

Bowie was one of the 184 defenders of the Alamo killed the final day of the mission's siege, March 6, 1836 on the outskirts of San Antonio, Texas, when he and his comrades were overwhelmed by more than 4,000 Mexican troops under the command of General Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna.

With the recent 170th anniversary of the fall of the Alamo, Katz Knives saw an opportunity to salute this historic moment and respond to a growing demand from Old West re-enactors, Cowboy Action competitors, and blackpowder shooters.

"We have always wanted to honor one of the most prominent knives ever designed," said Jim Baird, the national sales manager. "Our version is true to the original and will appeal to everyone who values authenticity. The Alamo is perfect for members of the Single Action Shooting Society and others who want a historically accu-

rate Bowie."

The Katz Alamo Bowie features a 10-inch XT-75 stainless steel blade, rated 440C plus 58-59 Rockwell. The blade thickness is nearly 1/4-inch (6mm). The full tang construction and 16.5-ounce weight make this a true working knife. "We want to emphasize the Alamo Bowie is not just for display," Baird said. "Yes, it is a beautiful and eye-catching knife, but it was designed to be a rugged, dependable knife, as well."

The Alamo Bowie comes in choice of three handle materials: polished cherrywood, white Micarta stag horn, and genuine stag crown. A top grain leather sheath, tanned in vegetable oil, is included.

A 300-piece Limited Edition version comes with the Texas Star medallion inserted in the crown of the stag handle. The blade is also etched "Alamo" and "Limited edition, 1 of 300." A wood presentation box is included.

At the recent Shooting, Hunting, and Outdoor Trade (SHOT) Show in Las Vegas, the largest annual assembly of firearms and shooting sports accessory dealers in the country, the Alamo Bowie received an

enthusiastic response.

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
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“THE REVENGE OF MONTEZUMA” MOUNTED COWBOY SHOOT

This sample had really exceptional color case hardening, considering it is chemically done. Original bone case hardening would make the cost prohibitive.

Most Cowboy Action Shooters and fans of the Old West will readily admit the "Gun that won the West" was not the Colt Single Action Army or Peacemaker. It was really Winchester Rifles: 1860 Henry, 1866, and 1873 Winchester repeaters that tamed it! When the original family-run firm of Aldo Uberti was bought out by The Beretta Corporation, Beretta wisely kept the 1873 Winchester as a mainstay of their cowboy line. In addition to the

1873's original caliber of .44 WCF (.44-40), A Uberti USA also offers their 1873 Winchesters in the ever-popular .38 Special / .357 Magnum and .45 Colt calibers.

Uberti is still meeting their contracts with other importers like Navy Arms, EMF, Cimarron, and

others. Recently A. Uberti U.S.A. has been importing and marketing their firearms directly to US dealers. When Ted Hatfield of A. Uberti, U.S.A. contacted me and asked me to evaluate some of their guns, I specifically requested that a .44-40 1873 be included!

1873 HISTORY

improved 1866 model repeating rifles spread westward across the American continent. The ever-increasing flow of pioneers started carving up the wilderness with these rifles. The Native Americans they encountered (and eventually displaced) also armed themselves with these repeaters, when possible. Both the 1860 Henry and 1866 Winchester rifles used a somewhat anemic, at least by today's standards, .44 caliber rim-fire cartridge that had a 200 grain bullet powered by 28 grains of blackpowder. Winchester foresaw the need for a more powerful cartridge than the .44 rimfire for the


wide-open spaces of the West. Though the basic design of the 1860 Henry and 1866 Winchester was good, it was limited somewhat by its inherently weak brass frame and the difficult to remove action side plates. Oliver Winchester redesigned the rifle, using the same toggle-link action of the early repeaters, but used a much stronger iron frame. In addition, he added easily removable side plates to facilitate easy cleaning and repair of his new rifle. This improved rifle was called the "Winchester Model of 1873."
The 1873 Winchester used a new center fire, re-loadable cartridge of

his own design, the 44 WCF (Winchester Center Fire). We now know this as the .44-40 Winchester. This cartridge was far more powerful than its weak cousin, the .44 Henry. The 1873 used a 205-grain lead bullet powered by 40 grains of blackpowder. Winchester designed the case mouths on the new .44 WCF brass to be thin so it would expand, sealing the chamber and preventing blowback. Out of a rifle, the .44 WCF's 205 grain bullet would achieve somewhere around 1320 fps.
The 1873 rifle and the cartridge were an instantaneous success, ensuring Winchester and his company would have both financial success

and immortality. The 1873 Model was later introduced in .38 WCF (.38-40), .32 WCF (.32-20), and .22 rim-fire. A slightly enlarged version, the 1876 "Centennial Model," was offered in the more powerful .45-60 WCF and .45-75 WCF cartridges. Winchester manufactured the popular 1873 Model until 1924, with a total of 720,610 1873s being made! This was a full 30 years after Winchester started producing the lighter and stronger model 1892 Winchester, which had been intended to be a "replacement" for the 1873! The tremendous public demand for the 1873 just refused to

let it die, however, so they were produced simultaneously. Winchester made many different models of lever action rifles through the years. The 1873 was second in popularity only to Winchester's Model of 1894, which just ceased production this year! There have also been other manufacturers of lever action rifles such as Marlin, Whitney-Kennedy, and Colt. None of these ever achieved the extreme level of success the Winchester lever actions did.

Now what would be more popular with Cowboy Action Shooters today than the "Gun that won the West?" Original 1873s, while not too hard to find, are generally in fair to very poor shape. Their bores are usually rough as a cob, suffering from too many rounds of blackpowder cartridges and not enough cleaning. The really nice surviving examples of the 1873 Winchester are generally in the realm of "collector items." Most folks that have them don't want to shoot them. The final consideration is the originals are usually over 100 years old, and the metallurgy prior to the turn of the century was not up to today's standards. In fact, until around 1890, Winchester used iron, rather than steel for rifle barrels and receivers.

They are fine for blackpowder, but questionable for modern, high-pressure smokeless loads. Even if they are post-1890 guns, they are still a 130-year-old design – not designed for high-pressure cartridges.

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The "Deluxe Sporting Rifle" sample they sent me is a real peach! Uberti sent me a .44-40 caliber 1873 to test, at my request. Somehow it just seems wrong to shoot anything but an original caliber in an 1873. Besides, when shooting blackpowder, the thinner case mouths of the .44-40 are far superior to the thicker .45 Colt brass in preventing blowback.

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blued finish. The magazine tube is full length. It holds 13 rounds, more than enough for any SASS shooting stage. I have always been partial to long, octagonal barrels on cowboy guns. It seems the heavier muzzle swings better for me, and sits a little steadier in the cupped, supporting "off hand." The longer sight radius also helps me keep steady.

The hammer, lever, and receiver are very nicely color case hardened, just as many of the original rifles were. The crescent steel butt-plate, loading gate, and the nose cap are blued. It has a simple period type blade front sight, and a nice reproduction of the original Winchester "semi-buckhorn" rear sight.

The Deluxe Sporting Rifle has a nicely figured walnut butt-stock with a semi pistol grip configuration, and a deep crescent butt-plate. The hand-guard was also nicely grained walnut. This forearm has the rifle configuration, with no barrel band. Both the semi-pistol grip and forearm have nicely done cut checkering. The Uberti 1873 is also available with a straight grip and no checkering. The overall fit and finish of the sample are flawless. The case colors are bright, and the bluing deep and dark.

Right out of the box, the trigger pull was excellent at about 3-1/2 to 4 pounds, with almost no creep! Also right out of the box, the action on the 1873s are slicker and lighter than

the other lever guns like the 1892 and its clones, and the 1894 Marlins. The Uberti 1873 has a lever safety that keeps the trigger from being pulled if the lever is not fully depressed. The lever disconnect spring on this sample is fairly stiff. The angle of the firing hand on the semi-pistol grip made it even a little harder than it would have been with a straight grip model. Some people remove the part of the leaf that activates the lever safety and let gravity activate it (the lever safety), but I do not endorse that. In fact, I do not recommend it, either.

AT THE RANGE


I used 200-grain smokeless .44-40 ammo from both Black Hills and Ultramax for my shooting sessions. The 1873 performed flawlessly! There are few lever action rifles that are as smooth as the Winchester Henry, 1866, and 1873s with their brass lifters! The bulls-eye shooting was done both off-hand at 25 yards, and from a casual rest at 35 yards. The groups from a rest made some ragged one-hole, three shot groups with the Black Hills ammo, and nearly as good with the Ultra Max Cowboy. Off hand groups with both brands of ammo averaged about 1 1/4" inch at 25 yards. After sighting it in, the point of impact was about 1 to 1-1/2 inches directly above point of aim at about 25-30 yards with the

rear sight in it's lowest notch.

As always, I had to do my pop can plinking drills. I spread out about 10 or 12 cans at 25 to 30 yards. Standing, shooting rapid fire, off-hand, I bounced every pop can at least once, never missing once with 14 rounds (13+1). Even without a short stroke kit, the 1873 action lends itself to rapid-fire shooting.

CONCLUSION

All in all, I'd rate the Uberti's 1873 "Deluxe Sporter" as a real "10." The workmanship and the finish are great, the action was smooth, and the accuracy was absolutely superb! Though all of the Uberti made Winchesters tend to be a bit pricey, retailing in the \$950 to \$1050 range, the Deluxe Sporter Model is certainly worth every penny! *[Signature]*

pushed through the slots in the nickel-plated harness buckles. The leather is a little lighter than my holsters, but that will be remedied. I put slots in the front of my belt just wide enough and thick enough for the leather straps to pass through. The center lines for the slots were laid out around 3/4" down from the top of the belt and placed to allow for my usual holster alignment. A leather punch was used to place holes at each end of the slot center line to include the full width of the slot. Then a belt knife was used to cut the correct width between the holes. Next one end of each leather strap was trimmed and fastened to the back of the gun belt with Chicago screws with around a 7" space between them.

Then, I put on the gun belt. The straps cross in the back then come over each shoulder with harness buckles in place. The straps were

pushed through the slots in the front of the gun belt. Next, I pulled up each strap end and placed it into the harness buckle under the mid part of the strap that is already there. With harness buckle set to appropriate height, I marked one strap for correct length and hole placement. Gun belt was then removed. Straps were laid beside each other for correct length and holes were punched. I cut the under side of the strap longer than needed to allow for any shortcomings, and punched hole. Two or three harness buckle holes were added above and below the marked holes of the outer strap.

Finally gun belt with suspenders were adjusted to appropriate fit. They look and feel great. My gun belt now stays at the same elevation with minimal tummy tension. Problem now is it eliminated another excuse as to my score! *[Signature]*

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
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LEGENDS

One of the fun things about being a contributing writer for The Catfish Chronicle is on occasion I am asked by pals to read and review their latest books. I did not realize how many SASS members were really authors, and good ones! So, I am getting to read the latest and best in Western fiction and enjoying the heck out of it.


Take the last book I read, "Legends" by Forty Rod. He contacted me via the SASS Wire and told me about it, and I said sure, I would be delighted to review it, and he made me promise I would be truthful in my opinion. I intend to be just that, truthful, so I will tell you the biggest problem I had with this book right away. It is full of typographical errors. There, I told y'all the negative stuff up front, so get over it.

Apparently, Forty Rod has been writing for years. Those years included stints in the Army and Marine Corp. He has been in numerous occupations and has, well, been around. I have never met him, but I have seen his photo on the Wire and he ain't no pretty boy, he's been around the block a time or two and it's easy to tell. Why bother telling you this? Because "Legends" is incredibly sentimental in many ways and to look at the author's photo you'd think he's a tough old geezer, and you'd never expect sentiment from him. But the first half of the book is chock full of Old West/19th century charm and warmth and sentiment. In fact, in some respects, the early chapters of this book remind me of similar tales I read in grade school. It is not written at a grade school level, but it's, well, it starts off so doggone fun and clean cut! It is the kind of story Disney might tell little kids or young adults, a story of growing up, of learning new things, discovering new skills, and realizing there is a great big world out there. Most importantly, the key figure in all this is a girl! A delightfully captivating, energetic, feminine tomboy of a girl named Martha, or Marty, a good-with-a-gun and good-with-party-planning type of enchanting, charismatic, teenaged girl. You'll fall in love with her right away, and you'll almost be sorry when the story involves anyone else!

And, believe me, the story involves somebody else. Many others, actually, but most importantly it involves a young man who, as one clearly expects from the early going, will be Marty's love interest. But he is more than that. He's a tough kid who has seen too much at an early age, has learned to control it all, and is greased lightning with his guns. He can track anyone or anything; he can fight anyone or anything, and he places honor very high on his list of important character traits. The reader will like him from the outset, too. As a matter of fact, there are a considerable number of likable folks in "Legends," but the boys will warm up to Jack quickly, just as the girls will warm up to Marty (everyone will warm up to Marty!). One could argue that there is a degree of foreseeability in what the various characters accomplish, but it's really a matter of who cares. It's just so much fun to read about them and the good time they are having!

Naturally, after the good times are firmly established, with only minor tribulations, the wars begin, and it's left to Forty Rod's heroes to resolve them. The resolution is not hard to anticipate but, somehow, even knowing that the "white hats" have to beat the "black hats," the reader hangs on every word, waiting with anticipation to see it all work out.

Forty Rod's details are well placed. He knows his western landscape; he knows his people; he knows the traditions of the time; and he knows how to weave a great tale. The title has special meaning as well – while the main story covers only a few short years, it concludes after more than forty years, and you will be moved and uplifted by the way the book concludes. The times have changed, but the Legends live on.



VENGEANCE TRAIL Western Movie Review



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
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THE LAST SCALP

Sam Bucklin finishes the Civil War in a Union prisoner of war camp. He returns home to Arkansas to the war's destruction and Reconstruction, with news of free land and hope for a new beginning. It doesn't take the Bucklin family long to decide to move to west Texas. They begin their new lives in Oak Springs, three miles south of Jacksboro. For a while their little cluster of homes is known as the "Bucklin Settlement." A few months later it is the site of the Oak Springs Massacre. Away hunting, Sam is the only one in the family to escape an Apache raid led by Cabeza Blanca. Six Rangers trailing a raiding party find him grieving over the murdered members of his family and anxious to pursue the raiders to reclaim his stolen baby daughter and teenage sister. Tracking the raiders with the Rangers, Sam finds his baby murdered and his sister brutally assaulted. Four years later, the scalps of all the raiders, except one, a gray-headed Apache, Sam believes killed in the raid, are nailed to the charred remains of the Bucklin settlement.



Thinking his trail of vengeance is at an end, Sam agrees to talk with Government representatives about stopping gunrunning to the Indians in New Mexico territory. In the interview, he learns the gray-headed Apache, Cabeza Blanca, who led the raid on his family, is the gunrunner's major customer. So begins Sam's long, dangerous ride to take the last scalp. Along the way to his showdown with Cabeza Blanca, Sam fights banditos, is hunted by cavalry patrols, rescues a young woman from renegades, frees her child, a captive in Cabeza Blanca's stronghold, and finds love to fill the great empty place in his soul left by the murder of his wife and baby.

SASS member, Paul Cox has written a classic western tale of which Louis L'Amour or Zane Grey would have been proud. Filled with action, historical characters, a hard-edged hero, and a compelling story of courage, revenge, and love borne in adversity, *The Last Scalp* is entertainment hard to put down. SASS members particularly will appreciate the descriptions of nineteenth century firearms and their use, and the abundance of well-known and obscure historical characters such as Bigfoot Wallace, Cabeza Blanco, Che Dodge, and Jesus Arviso. After readers discover the pleasure of this novel, expect to see Sam Bucklin and his lady, Jennifer Mason, appear in the flesh at SASS matches.

Paul Cox is also an excellent artist. With "The Last Scalp," it is clear he can paint pictures in words as well as he can those with a brush. Read it and be immersed the Old West.

As part of the DVD package, there is a "Star Guns of Western Films" Special Feature, featuring an arsenal of western movie guns that were used by John Wayne, Clint Eastwood, Steve McQueen,

This special feature is hosted by Western artist, actor, and recent inductee into the Texas and National Cowboy Halls of Fame, as well as a SASS honoree of the annual Buckaroo Bronze Award, Buck Taylor (*Gunsmoke*, *Tombstone*). 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

A "spirit of the game" gesture by all these individuals—a gesture often unmentioned by writers, and unappreciated by readers whose zeal is to get to the names in the Winner's Circle. However, to this writer, it's personal contributions such as this that makes Cowboy Action Shooting™, the "spirited" sport it is, not just the fast shooters.

Side matches should have been called "The Badlands Bud Show." This California speedster won five of the nine side events, and if he could have shot the Couples event as a couple, he probably would have won that also. Pursued constantly by the likes of Wogg, Longhunter, JT Wild, Mid Valley Drifter, Johnny Buck, and Chisler Wood, Bud remained unflappable and coolly shot off 10 pistol rounds in 3.02 seconds and 8 rifle rounds in 3.08 seconds, or perhaps the other way around. Who knows, the timer came in second also, and yes, all were shot clean! Watching Badlands Bud shoot is indeed a thrill, but per-

The Plainsmen event, also won by the Bud kid, was designed and conducted by another trio of stellar volunteers Hickory, SASS #5062, Tumbleweed Thom, SASS #346, and Brownie Nash, SASS #3656. Hickory, who conducted last year's RO-II class, is one of those traveling shooters who help clubs throughout the states.

Need help? Call Hickory, not Paladin. If you want Paladin, then you must Wire Paladin, SASS #5954, who is another exceptional volunteer.

Sunday was devoted to the Master Gunfighter Stage designed by Shadow Creek, whose reputation for designing this stage is equal to the reputation Texas Jack Morales enjoys for designing conventional stages. The master Gunfighter Stage pitted the top 25 men against each other, and the top 16 ladies against each

other. After the smoke cleared, Badlands Bud prevailed as the winner on the male side, despite the fact some local pranksters hid his shotgun on one match-up. Nevertheless, this stellar shooter overcame all obstacles, including mischievous cowboys, to win, whilst Nelly fought her way to the top and won on the distaff side of the house. Nelly is one of those unassuming lady competitors who seem to come out of nowhere to win the big ones. She is a joy to watch!




Captain Jarrett, the color guard for opening ceremonies.

 their posse, compliments of Dusty Tagalong, SASS #32291.

Analysis of the Two Styles

Now, an analysis of our “dual style” match. First, it should be pointed out the distances and sizes of the targets between the two styles were not drastically different. The main distance difference was the Dead Eye stages usually had one rifle target that was set farther out, approximately 40 to 45 yards. One stage was overall farther away, but it did have rather large targets.

The other difference between the two styles of stages was target separation. The Fast and Furious stages had more closely spaced targets with dumps, double taps, and triple taps. The Dead Eye stages required wider

swings with the firearm without placing more than one round at a time on any one target. A calculation of total times and total misses for the two styles revealed, on the average, the Dead Eye Stages took 14% more raw time to shoot and produced 45% more misses.

So the big question is: “Do the different styles generate different winners?” We suspected not. We figured the top shooters would still come out on top in both styles. And it appears we were right. In fact, in this case, it was exactly the same, with Kingdom Kid, SASS #46970, and Hatchet Molly, SASS #59032, winning in both styles!

The conclusion seems to be smaller more challenging targets don’t give slower shooters a better

chance at winning. It just creates more misses and slower times (and less fun), and the same people will usually win both styles. But, it was interesting to note the “yee-ha’s” and cheers when that one long target was “dinged.”

So, it seems clear people like a challenging target here and there, as long as there are plenty of easy ones. Everyone likes to hear that “ding.” That is the fun of the sport, and we need to be sure there are enough dings to prevent discouragement and provide plenty of fun.

Those are my thoughts on our dual style match. Will we do it again? I don’t know, but we will try to provide some variety.

A Great Shoot!

Over and over I heard people

comment this match was one of the best times they had ever had. Sometimes it is hard to put your finger on why one shoot is more fun than another. After all, most matches are similar; 10-12 main stages, various side matches, prizes, and so forth. But, I would have to say what made this shoot a success was those in attendance - simply a great group of people! Even though the numbers were down this year, everyone had a great attitude and enjoyed themselves immensely. What a fun time!





THE 6TH ANNUAL "REVENGE OF MONTEZUMA" COWBOY SHOOT

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BUT, as is the cowboy way, adversity and obstacles are just new opportunities, by crackie!!!! NEVER GIVE UP! That is the cowboy attitude!!! After all, there were some of our sister clubs in Louisiana that really had it tough, so we quit our whining, moved, and got on with it. Every cloud has a silver lining, and let me tell you, Old York Shootists are STILL alive and kickin' and doing better than ever at our new home on the range! Yeeeeehhhhhh haaaaaaawww!

Over the years, Old York Shootists has had its ups and downs with a landowner who ran hot and cold as far as his desire to have us there. He was not a Cowboy Action Shooter and could never understand us dressing up like cowboys and shooting guns. So in July of last year, the hottest season of the

year, we made the decision to move our range. 

Spearfish, SD—Will Lantis, WEL, or just Will to all his pardners, died unexpectedly in his iron horse on Sunday, August 6, only three days after his 70th birthday. It is with sadness I reflect on one of the only real cowboys I ever had the pleasure of knowing. I knew WEL as my "boss" first and friend later. Somehow the friend part and boss part got reversed, which was better to our liking.

I remember the first day I went to work for WEL at his offices in Spearfish—my desk sat right outside his office—and I heard a loud cracking sound. With trepidation I wandered over to his door and peaked in. Much to my surprise he was practicing his hand with his bullwhip. Years later, he'd be in shooting at laser targets with his Colt .45's, but by then I was too.

WEL was the driving force behind establishing the Deadwood Seven Down Regulators in Spearfish, South Dakota. He owned a large piece of property with rolling hills and a dry riverbank. He had walked it many times and someone just said, "Will, ya oughta build a SASS shooting range." By gum,

Nope, the range would be built with his blessings, but he also gave the founding members of the club one directive—we had to have a state shoot. WEL's philosophy was always go to the wall—do it big or go home. So, knowing how much it meant, the club did just that. One year after the range was built, the first South Dakota State Championship was held. Then it was held again to the delight of WEL because the turnout was fantastic. He was proud of his range and wanted to share it as much as possible.

WEL became a Territorial Governor so he could advance the thoughts and ideas of his club members. He wasn't one to sit around and complain. He wanted to make a difference. That's why he was a Lawrence County Commissioner and sat on a number of boards.

WEL loved Mounted Shooting

and was a proponent of helping the SASS Mounted Shooting events grow. He loved the people of SASS because they were down to earth and spoke his language. A firm handshake and a drop of spirits sealed deals.

WEL knew no stranger. He would often meet someone and let them know if they were in the area, his home was theirs. We all met some pretty interesting folks, thanks to him. He rode the mighty MO in the footsteps of Lewis & Clark, hanging his canoe in the rafters in his office. The only regret he had was losing his favorite old hat on that trip—he mentioned it more than once.

I asked him once why he didn't have a regular "alias" and he responded he liked to hear announcers try to figure it out when it was his turn to shoot.

So long my friend—I know you won't be lonely—you took a piece of everyone's heart with you when you left. *A*

also be Choctaw, Quapaw, Shawnee, Cherokee, and Lakota represented. Basket Moon, Bear, Light Eagle, Red Weasel, and Dancing Elk will be doing beadwork, basket making, flint knapping, and story telling about the Native American way of life.

And, ya know once the cowboys, miners, and Indians arrive, the Old West sutlers won't be far behind. The Harvest Fair is gonna have more mercantile than ever before. Some of the merchants that have showed up in the past include the Cloak Drummer, the Traditional General Store, and Beaver Dick with Hanson's Leather and Supply, all selling 1800's traditional clothing and Western Americana. There's even some nice "foo feraws" for the ladies. We've also had Purple Clover with fancy soaps and potions, Victorian Designs by Lily, and Alter Years with more fancy clothing and stuff for the ladies. The Grand Victorian and Frontier Design have been hemin' & hawin' about comin' (no pun intended).

The Buckskin BBQ, Santoya's Cantina, Golden Palace Chinese BBQ, and Bob's Roasted Corn will be cookin' up some great Old West style vittles.

Once things get settled down, Law Dogs n' Ladies and the Earps

are expected to arrive. They ain't much for cattle or minin'. They've never been accused of havin' calluses on their hands. Some people say they just like to fleece the cowboys. Those Earps call themselves entrepreneurs, whatever that means. We know they frequent the gamblin' halls and saloons and try to separate the hardworkin' cowboys and miners from their money.
