fluid. Guns and ammo were scarce. Targets were crude, or cardboard, requiring considerable lost time taping between shooters. Stopwatches were used for timing. Scores were kept on individual scrapes of paper so they could quickly and easily be manually sorted (the beginning of the "rank order" system!). Things were very basic, but we were having fun!

Over the years many changes have been introduced into SASS and Cowboy Action Shooting™. Most have been good (in my opinion). The changes have broadened the game, kept it exciting and fun, and have encouraged more cowboys and their families to join our ranks.

Change can be disconcerting, change is not always for the good, but change is constant. As new changes present themselves, the critical question is always "is this good for the game?"

For years it was the Wild Bunch that addressed this question, and now it often is deferred to the Territorial Governors. Both groups take this charter to "protect and grow" the game seriously. Since no one has a crystal ball to foretell the future, suggested changes are approached with concern as to whether the change is a "game changing change" and whether or not the change is beneficial to the game. Beneficial changes are defined as those changes that promote the growth of SASS member-

ship, because without SASS the game of Cowboy Action Shooting™ would quickly splinter into hundreds of factions around the world, all with different rules, standards, and practices.

The introduction of the Wild Bunch™ shooting discipline within SASS was one of those recent changes. It's not an 1880's game, our core business. As everyone knows by now, it represents a time period immediately following the "classic" cowboy period, a time between the Old West and modern America. And, it uses the 1911, a really fun gun to shoot! So far we've seen many cowboys embrace this new discipline, and hopefully it becomes the bridge for enticing

SASS has had steady growth for the past nearly 30 years. Videos of the first END of TRAIL tell a tale of a very different kind of "Cowboy Action" then we know today. Those who nostalgically wish to return to the original game often don't know what they are wishing for! There were no posses. There were next to no shooting categories. Costumes were (for the most part) terrible. Rules were

 modern "action pistol" folks to suit up and join our fun. It's also an excuse for "our" folks to buy new guns as well!

You'll notice, I called this a shooting discipline—not a shooting category. While it's never made any sense to have the various categories compete against one another (a dead horse argument!), it certainly makes no sense for 1911s to be pitted against single actions (although it's arguable which would come out on top!). The Wild Bunch™ is a *discipline* and is generally handled as a side event or a match within itself. It is most often not scored as part of a main match cowboy event.

During my travels around the country and overseas this past year, I've been exposed to three potential new categories at various SASS events—what I'll call Sodbuster, Outlaw, and Civil War.

Sodbuster is an entry-level category for those who are not comfortable with borrowing someone else's firearms until they can accumulate a complete set of their own. I've seen the game played with a single barrel, single-shot shotgun, but most often the biggest change here is the use of only a single revolver. Since there are no rules (yet), there is no standard way of dealing with competitors using only a single revolver. Insisting (or allowing) the shooter to reload on the clock and engage all ten standard revolver targets just like everyone else imposes a serious time penalty on the whole match, and is not fair to the other competitors. Sometimes this time penalty can be accommodated at a local club's monthly match, but sometimes even then it causes problems. For those clubs willing to experiment with this potential category (and report your experiences to the Territorial Governors), the recommendation is to require the shooter to simply engage the first five required revolver targets and then move on to the next firearm.

Yes, the Sodbuster is shooting the match differently than the other competitors. So long as the Sodbuster is not in a position to win the match, it doesn't make any difference. Being the best Sodbuster is the goal. When a Sodbuster gets good enough to win the match, it's definitely time for him or her to step up and get the rest of their required equipment!

Outlaw is a category where the competitor shoots all firearms from the hip! There really shouldn't be any additional safety concerns with this potential category, short of putting a bullet over the back berm! This is not a game for the newbie, but rather another opportunity for the experienced shooter to graduate to a more difficult category and take on a new challenge. This category has the possibility of fragmenting into duelist, gunfighter, blackpowder, and so on, so it's definitely something to be closely monitored.

Another interesting possibility for a new SASS category is the **Civil War** Category. Yes, it would probably have some costuming requirements, which would appeal to many, including Civil War reenactors. All firearms would be pre-1865, obviously including percussion revolvers, shot one-handed, Henrys and Spencers loaded with eight rounds max, and two-triggered double barreled shotguns. Why eight rounds, you ask? Most cowboy stages require nine or ten rounds, and the Spenser only holds eight. This would require BOTH the Henry and the Spenser to reload. The Henry shoots fast but reloads slow, and the Spenser shoots slow but reloads fast, thereby sorta leveling the playing field.

I've been asked if Sodbuster, Outlaw, and Civil War are "illegal?" No, they are just not sanctioned as standard categories. Clubs are certainly free to experiment with these categories, and if there is sufficient interest, they can be considered by the Territorial Governors for inclusion in the Handbook.

The late 19th Century was a time of many changes in firearms development. Semiautomatic pistols, bolt action rifles, clip fed rifles, and a little later, fully automatic long guns began to find their way into the hands of civilians and lawmen alike. As always, just because it existed, as double action revolvers had for years, doesn't make these guns legal for our game. These old guns have sometimes found their way into special side matches, but they really don't have a place in the Single Action Shooting Society.

Change is constant. Help decide which changes are good and which should be repressed. When good change is realized, embrace it! 🤠

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
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Always looking to improve his skills and equipment, Long Hunter came to us with a new holster idea. Instead of just making a one size fits all rig why not offer a choice that will cater to a shooter's individual style but still retain all of the features needed for a gun belt to be functional in the world of competitive shooting. With this in mind we created the new 2009 Long Hunter shooting system.

We introduced the Long Hunter gun rig in 2004. Comfortable, functional and very competitive, it has served many shooters well for the last 5 years. Since then we have made a few changes to improve the original design. The new 2009 version has a metal insert in the skirt to keep the pistol comfortably away from the body. This feature provides a draw unobstructed by the shotgun belt and presents the gun for a full shooting grip. Another feature is the retention screw and holster body lining. The tension screw allows modification of drag the holster has on the revolver and the lining insures the holster shape for years of use.

The Long Hunter rig is now available in 6 different configurations for both men and women. You can order the original Long Hunter or you can get a rig in a strongside with crossdraw, a double crossdraw (worn in reverse for muzzle forward cant), a B-Western model with more drop, a muzzle forward with crossdraw and even a 1911 rig for Wild Bunch competitions. All holsters are designed for the Long Hunter rig and will work on the original belt. Also, the new womens belt with contour for hips and adjustable length will interchange with any of the new holsters. Below are examples of the options available to fit your shooting style.



where they'll be presented with a National Day of the Cowboy 2010 Cowboy Keeper Award featuring "Simple Things," the artwork of artist, Jim Clements.



“VICTORIA’S TRIMS”

One of the things that makes Victorian garments so collectible and special, if you are lucky enough to own an authentic one, is the trimming was more than likely handmade. Lace originating from France and Belgium was expensive and difficult to obtain due to transportation obstacles during the early 19th century. The Victorian woman was left to her own devices in creating her own trimmings using ribbons that traveling salesmen and local mercantiles stocked in abundance. If there was no money to be spent on such frivolities, the resourceful woman used scraps of fabric from the dress itself to fashion her garment’s adornment.

Godey’s Ladies Book and Magazine and *Peterson’s Magazine* were invaluable sources of information, and even though the cover price was only 15 cents, every copy likely passed through many hands before it became out of date. These magazines chronicled the latest fashions from England and Paris, but didn’t give detailed instructions on how to accomplish the intricacies of their creation. Marge Harding of Oregon City, Oregon has accomplished just that in her booklet, *Victoria’s Trims*.

Mrs. Harding has broken the code and written an easy to follow instruction book that lets you re-create these trims. She includes interesting information she has gleaned from the above magazines and takes you step by step through 27 different types of trim. You don’t need to search down antique ribbon stock, as these patterns can be made with modern or reproduction ribbons. Each page of the instructions has a color photograph of the design you will be making photographed with an item from her extensive collection of Victorian jewelry and implements.

I used this booklet as the subject of a Victorian Tea I donated as a fundraiser for an organization here in south Texas and was able to go through the book from front to back and make examples of all the trims in two afternoons. Whether you are a Victorian purist looking for



authenticity, or just looking for some unique trim material for your outfits, I recommend this booklet. It is available by mail directly from Mrs. Harding at 16045 S. Sandalwood Road, Oregon City, Oregon 97045. The cost is \$25, including shipping (check or money order). Her e-mail address is harding1863@comcast.net.

As Collections Curator for a small museum in Salem, Oregon, I had the opportunity to do preservation work on genuine Victorian clothing. I would like to share an embellishment I found on a 1901 wedding nightgown and love to use on my garments. Instructions for this particular trim—the ribbon chrysanthemum flower—follows:

Material

1 spool or 5 yards of 1/4 or 3/8 inch soft satin ribbon (available from any craft/fabric store)

The size of the flower will depend on the length of the ribbon strips—you can adjust the size for the desired effect. These instructions make a three-inch flower.

Instructions

1. Cut 12 strips of ribbon 5 inches long, 10 strips 4 1/2 inches long, 8 strips 4 inches long. Tie a knot in the center of each ribbon strip. Keep strips sorted by size.
2. Thread a needle with 12 inches of doubled

thread, tie a large knot at the end. Start stacking the ribbons (small to large) by matching up both ends of the ribbon, one on top of the other (one petal), and threading them onto the needle, pushing them down tightly to end.

3. When all the ribbons have been stacked, tack through all the layers a couple of times to make sure the flower is compact and petals are secure.

You can leave the center open or sew or glue a button or a bead in the center. I use a couple of drops of fray check in the center to keep the ribbon ends from fraying. If your garment is machine washable, use safety pins to attach flowers so they can be removed before laundering.

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
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

THE OUTLAW TRAIL AND WILD BUNCH™ ACTION SHOOTING

A few months ago I talked about several changes we were making to our SASS events. Outlaw Trail is one of those changing events. Outlaw Trail has been our SASS Four Corners Regional Match for several years, and this year Outlaw Trail will become The World Championship of Wild Bunch™ Action Shooting. The date for the match is August 5-8, 2010.

Wild Bunch™ Action Shooting has really grown at a phenomenal pace. 

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
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DON'T BE AN ILLEGAL EXPORTER!

I am not a SASS member, but a friend is kind enough to let me see his back copies of *The Cowboy Chronicle*. I must write concerning the article about "Flying with Firearms ..." by The Elder Katie.

In that article, she recommends to your readers they leave their excess ammunition in a foreign country rather than bring it back to the U.S. In so doing, she is recommending they commit a Federal Felony, which I'm sure is NOT the Cowboy Way.

Leaving guns, gun parts, ammunition, even brass in a foreign country makes you an exporter of munitions list items. It requires an export license (after you register with the Department of State), end user certificate, and the legal importation of the goods into the country you are visiting. Failing to do any one of these things could get you prosecuted in Federal Court, where they have no known sense of humor.

Is it likely? No, but one incident could result in a felony conviction, loss of gun rights, and even being

placed on the infamous "no fly" list. You are allowed to temporarily export firearms and ammunition for the purpose of competition, but whatever is not consumed must be returned to the United States. No matter how your foreign compadres ask, beg, or implore you to bring guns or gun parts, or ammunition, your readers must consider the risk if they get caught!

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

The American Vigilante Tradition

Part II

WHAT A VIGILANTE IS NOT

The 1st distinction is critical in its clarity, but one that frequently confuses one form of self-help with another. Contrary to what critics of self-reliance would have us believe, vigilante justice differed from the conduct of masked secret terrorist societies in four important respects: (a) the law, where it existed, was not circumvented, it was enforced; (b) membership in the vigilantes was not secret nor did the members wear hoods or masks as a general rule; (c) rarely did vigilantes operate in direct opposition to police agencies or courts ... action against Sheriff Plummer's gang in Montana being the most notable exception.¹⁶ In fact, vigilante hangings reputedly made the job of city and county officials easier.¹⁷ As statutory courts became effective, vigilance committees ceased to function; (d) unless the bad guys were caught in *flagrante delicto*, some form of trial was typically held by a court of common consent before any punishment was imposed, and in most cases, the accused was represented by defense counsel and the community by a prosecutor.

Make no mistake, "jack rabbit justice" was known for its informality and swiftness. This means a finding of guilty could also be arrived at while the jury and participants were still seated in the saddle.

In the hugely popular 1935 Samuel Goldwyn Production, *Barbary Coast*, San Francisco of 1849-50 is in the iron grip of a ruthless killer played by Edward G. Robinson whose deadly muscle is provided by a vicious enforcer, "Knuckles" (no, I'm not making this up), played by Brian Donlevy. One of film's most abbreviated trials takes place after Knuckles adds the murder of a popular, crusading newspaper editor to his calendar of sins. Donlevy is taken into custody by the Vigilantes. Marched out of the saloon, he is tried en route to his place of execution. Testimony is taken as the "jury" marches along with the soon to be condemned. The prosecutor asks the principal witness, "Did you see Knuckles commit the murder?" "Yes, I did." As they plod along the muddy streets, the defense attorney claims the right to cross-examine the accuser: His single question "How certain are you that Knuckles is the killer?" is answered with, "Dead certain." And with that, the verdict is rendered, and Knuckles is unceremoniously sent kicking his way to the Great Beyond

at the end of a rope. In the final scene of the movie, his boss, Robinson, takes a similar stroll with his own jury.

A second distinction must be discussed because, like the first, the terms are frequently confused: A vigilance committee is not a militia. This is an important concept to keep in mind. Although it is conceivable a militia might serve as a vigilance committee in times of widespread peril, this would only be on an ad hoc basis in the same manner the National Guard might be called up by a governor to prevent looting at the scene of a disaster, aid victims, or quell wide spread breaches of the peace.

Keep in mind the militia is a mechanism foreseen by the Founding Fathers as a method by which citizens can control a too powerful, rapacious, and tyrannical government, i.e., a government teetering on the brink of dictatorship.¹⁸ A vigilance committee, on the other hand, has its primary purpose in preventing crime and punishing law breakers in the absence of effective law enforcement, i.e., (1) where the government is too weak in the face of internal crime, (2) is nonexistent, (3) the government is itself the source of criminal conduct, or (4) its interests are better served by keeping the populace in perpetual fear of

crime and thereby pliantly reliant upon, and, submissive to, a ubiquitous national police force. In other words, where the government actively manipulates crime as a means of controlling its citizens.¹⁹

The third distinction is the most obvious: Vigilantes can be distinguished from ordinary police by the former's complete lack of control by government formality and detail. And, unlike the vigilantes, the police are generally uniformed, wear badges of authority, follow standardized procedures, and have some centralized, easily identifiable headquarters.²⁰

In summary, vigilantism represents small parochial interests of shopkeepers and homeowners acting for the protection of property and personal safety. The geographic area of concern is typically in the vigilante's immediate area of residence/business. Vigilantism operates in response to a threat, deals with it, and then returns to dormancy. There are no standing armies, no regiments of secret police, no concentration camps, no wars of foreign conquest, no empire, and no institutionalized racism. A Vigilance Committee's ability to act swiftly and effectively is in its very lack of formal organization and absence of legal tampering with self-help justice.

PRIVATE AGENCY VIGILANTES

Historic facts make it pretty clear vigilante movements were the logical consequences where settlement had raced ahead of statutory law enforcement. Helping to dispense justice were such colorfully named outfits as the "Outlaw Exterminators" of Arizona, "The Partizan Rangers" of Texas, "The Jefferson Rangers" of Colorado, and "The Bald Knobbers" of Missouri.²¹ Historian Wayne Gard characterizes vigilante committees and courts of common consent as "... spontaneous expressions of the American spirit of democracy."²²

In reality, vigilantism was the only alternative to anarchy, chaos, blood feuds, and range wars. It provided men with a way of dealing with criminal behavior where there was no effective law enforcement. Vigilance committees usually conformed to established procedures and patterns of structured leadership. In nearly every instance membership was comprised of law abiding, responsible citizens who wanted only to maintain order and protect lives and property until duly constituted authority could assume those responsibilities. Historian George Stewart has described the members of the famous 1851 San Francisco Committee variously as "... intelligent ... while not highly educated ... with little regard for the tradition of the law ... hasty ... courageous ... with a sense of responsibility to humanity and justice."²³ Vigilante law may have been coarse and uncompromising, but it was necessary, and above all else, effective.

Duration and extent of vigilante justice varied from the 100 days of the San Francisco Committee which hung four murderers to the 75 years (1856-1932) during which the Kansas committees were in operation and, who, by conservative estimate, sent over 206 law breakers kicking to their great eternal rewards. The Nevada committees were in existence for approximately ten years between 1864-1875, while the Montana vigilantes of 1864 were initially active for a brief six weeks during which time they tried and hung twenty-two members of the infamous Sheriff Plummer's gang. The Montana committees periodically continued to supplement statutory law throughout the 70's and 80's, ultimately hanging eighty thieves and murderers before disbanding. Most private agencies endured for brief periods of time, while others like the XIT Ranch Syndicate in West Texas maintained armed patrols along its boundaries for approximately thirty years.

Rules of conduct on the frontier (they may have incidentally been statutes) were simple and known by all. Whether or not they were formal laws didn't matter and certainly didn't govern the manner of their

enforcement. If you stole a buggy horse from a widow, your chances of dancing from the end of a rope were excellent. And that was true even if you didn't know it belonged to a widow, and if no one could find anything in a law book that said such conduct was a hanging crime. The vigilante didn't carry around a criminal code or a Miranda advisal card. Justice was often directly tied to public wishes ... political considerations often outweighed the requirements of equity.²⁴ The same result would be reached if a child was harmed as a consequence of illegal conduct. Besides, widows, orphans, the infirm, and disabled were a special care of frontier communities.

Your offense and its punishment was what the community by practice, common sense, and Judeo-Christian tradition said it was. Violation of those rules resulted in swift and sometimes severe punishment. It was the act against the victim that was punished. It didn't matter if the thief had a troubled childhood or came from a dysfunctional family. In fact, if an outlaw were stupid or shameless enough to suggest those factors as a defense, he would probably have the buggy whip used on him before he was hanged.

Some anti-gun historians would have us believe frontier violence was a product of the prevalence of firearms. However, the truth is most likely the opposite. The fact nearly every adult male carried a revolver and knew how to use it would certainly tend to set the tone for how people treated one another. It was a common understanding that guns would be used in defense or retribution. Nor was it the highly publicized, lethal barroom gun brawl that set the standard for community behavior, but rather, how women, children, and sanctity of the home were treated ...

Simply put, in the six-shooter, disputants found a positive enforcement to civility. Mutual respect was motivated by the obvious fact each man possessed at the end of his own arm, the power to adjudicate his disputes on the spot. In the idiom of the day: God created man, Colt made them equal.

Even before formal government was established, it was a widely held notion that formal administration of justice was inefficient and corrupted by economic and political influence brought to bear on the magistrates. Distrust of the justice system particularly embraced lawyers who were regarded as a principal source of trouble in frontier communities.²⁵ This notion is captured succinctly in the movie *Star Chamber*, when judge Hal Holbrook tells a despairing colleague, Michael Douglas, the guilty are allowed to walk the streets because "somewhere along the way we took justice and hid it in the law."

The inescapable lessons of history, even as popularized in such western films as *The Unforgiven*, *Shane*, *The*

Man Who Shot Liberty Valance, *Warlock*, *The Lawman*, *Barbary Coast*, *Pale Rider*, and dozens of others teach there are times when the ultimate arbiter against lethal wickedness comes only from direct and equally as lethal intervention. In other words, there are benefits to invoking "Judge Colt and his jury of six" that are denied even to the brilliant mind of Judge Blackstone.

Throughout the western frontier between 1848 and 1890, the promise of swift and decisive vigilante action always remained a profound deterrent to any attempted terrorism by transients. Being notoriously stupid, most outlaws were slow studies and would learn in the most instructive manner possible that a corral gate, a bridge span, a telegraph pole, a pine tree, or board propped against the barn was all the formality required for the execution of sentence.

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when it came. He didn't have long to wait. Following Pearl Harbor, his unit was called up, and Brand found himself in the 83rd Infantry (Thunderbird) Division.

Brand, now a sergeant and platoon leader, led his men during the Ardennes, Rhineland, and Central European Campaigns, where he earned a Silver Star and took a bullet that nearly ended his life.

Following the war, Brand decided he'd try his hand at acting. Somehow he was cast alongside Charlton Heston in a training film for the Army Signal Corps. With such an auspicious start, how could he not succeed?

He took acting lessons under

Neville Brand was born in Iowa (1920) and raised in Illinois, the son of a bridge-building steel worker. Hardly the background we'd expect from our silver screen cowboys ... but tough enough to groom this gravel-voiced lug into one of the most recognized guys in Tinseltown. He often said: "Most people know my puss, but not many remember my name."

As war clouds gathered overseas in 1939, 19-year-old Brand joined the Illinois National Guard as a way to get into the action

the GI Bill with the American Theater Wing in New York and the Geller Drama School in L.A. ... all the while doing acting stunts on the "legit stage" to pay the rent.

His first big screen outing was as the henchman, Chester, in the frightening film noir classic, *D.O.A.*, his first of many roles as a real bad guy.

Then along came *Only The Valiant*, a cavalry western with all kinds of psychological twists and turns ... and Brand's opportunity to show his meanness, playing off the "by-the-book" officer role of star Gregory Peck.

Gritty Westerns seemed to fit Brand's nasty on-screen persona, and he soon found himself teamed with Philip Carey and our buddy, Lee Marvin, as outlaws in another great chase-and-shoot, *Gun Fury*, directed by Raoul Walsh.

That same year, 1953, Brand showed his toughness in yet another exciting oater, *The Man From The Alamo*, starring veteran Western favorite, Glenn Ford, and a rising new face in Hollywood, Hugh O'Brien, who won a Golden Globe for his portrayal of Lt. Lamar in this fine B-Western.

Even though he loved playing in Westerns, Brand never turned down a juicy role that gave him a chance to "emote." He even took on

the role of Mike Gavin, the guy who killed THE KING, Elvis, in *Love Me Tender*. Now, you don't get much meaner than THAT!

Well ... maybe there was one guy just a tad meaner than Mike Gavin. How about Al Capone??? Brand played Al in that classic TV series, *The Untouchables*, and in the movie *The George Raft Story*. He brought Old Scarface to chilling reality!

Brand went on to play Heavy roles in all sorts of potboilers. One of his favorites was *The Tin Star* with Henry Fonda and Anthony Perkins. He said watching these outstanding players from two very different backgrounds was a lesson in fine acting, even for an old pro like himself.

As he reached middle age (45), Brand decided he'd like to try his hand playing a not-so-cranky cowboy when he was offered the role of Texas Ranger Reese Bennett in the TV series *Laredo*, which ran for two seasons on NBC. Brand enjoyed the humorous character of the show and playing alongside his fellow "Rangers," Peter Brown and William Smith, and their boss, Captain Parmalee, his old buddy Philip Carey.

Toward the end of his career, Brand was tapped by the world's favorite Western star, John Wayne, to play his half-breed Comanche



sidekick, Lightfoot, in The Duke's 1973 classic, *Cahill U.S. Marshal*.

Brand rode on to that ridgeline in the sky in 1992. He's interred in the Morning Glory Room at East Lawn Memorial Park in Sacramento. I'm sure he'd enjoy a visit and a complementary snarl or two if you're in town. (Tough guys appreciate a good snarl!)

Next month we'll visit with the real Barney Fife (Don Knotts) and

see how this over-zealous Deputy from Mayberry made the big time as a special kind of Sidekick on one of TV's best known comedy shows ... and went on to star in all sorts of roles on both the little and big screens.

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Lazy Apple-Pecan Cobbler

Ingredients

- 2 Cans of apple pie filling, mixed with 1 Cup water
- 1 Box of Butter Pecan cake mix
- 1/2 Cup brown sugar
- 1/2 Cup chopped pecans
- Butter
- Cinnamon and Apple Pie Spice

Directions

- Spray inside of Dutch Oven with non-stick spray.
- Preheat Oven over 8 coals for 2-3 minutes.
- Pour apple pie filling into the Oven. Cover the apples with the dry cake mix.
- Crumble brown sugar over all. Sprinkle chopped pecans over all. Place 8-10 pieces of butter on top. Sprinkle with cinnamon and apple pie spice over all.
- Place lid (with 15 coals) on the Oven. Bake for about 45 minutes.

Now, if you *really* like dessert, spoon the cobbler into bowls and top with butter pecan or vanilla ice cream. You're in Heaven!!!! 🍌

Sometimes The Missus and I like to enjoy a One Pot meal featuring just one special course—DESSERT!

So, this month's recipe, to celebrate the Merry Month of May, is one of the most delicious, yet easiest, cast iron desserts you'll find anywhere.

We found it in John Ragsdale's great pocket-sized cookbook, *Dutch Oven Cooking*, which is a real basic cast iron reference and a standard for Scout Troops and backpackers.

You can use this same basic recipe with peaches, cherries, or apples. We like the apples, so that's what we're using here. You can also switch the cake mix to white or spice if you like. They're all goood!

Use a 10" Camp Dutch Oven (we used Lodge's Model L10CO3) over 8-10 coals with another 15-20 coals on the lid. It's so easy you can get the



friends. He and his friends formed a team. Fortunately for all us SASS members, the man we now call "The Judge" never let that vision get away—his idea not only became a reality, it became an institution. Since SASS became a worldwide sport, many of our members have had brilliant ideas and visions. Proving once again, Cowboy Action Shooting™ is not short of men and women with brilliant ideas and thoughts. All this is simply another step forward for our sport, our mutual visions, and our love of the game. Okay, back to "Team Chapel."

The Proposal submitted to the Wild Bunch by Jim and his team rationalized many shooters at END of TRAIL attend Cowboy Church services on Sunday morning. The proposed Cowboy Memorial Chapel would be an appropriate place to conduct those services in the future, as well as a permanent building where meetings could be held for various SASS-related groups and activities, including on-site weddings.

The funding and construction of the Cowboy/Cowgirl Memorial Chapel would come from a donation of an amount to be determined from each SASS club wishing to have deceased members memorialized in the chapel. The amount could be pro-rated based on the current number of SASS clubs in existence, with remembrances being provided for deceased club members initially, and subsequent additions being the responsibility of those

participating clubs. Additionally, anyone personally, or on a club level, that wishes to donate funds for its construction could also be honored in a like fashion at another area within the chapel. I'm guessing now, but I would make the assumption the Wild Bunch deliberated all of 30 seconds before making the decision this was good—this was in the spirit of the game! Again, let the project begin!

As envisioned, the Chapel will consist of a single 30 X 40 foot sanctuary capable of seating at least 40 people with remembrances appropriately displayed. Of course, if the fund raising is a successful as I believe it can be, the church could be much larger and consist of two rooms. Room #1 would be the "Memorial Area." The Entrance Foyer would be set aside strictly for memorial remembrances, candle station, and benches, and measure 40 x 16 feet. Room #2 would be the "Sanctuary," with bench/pew seating for 40+ people, and raised platform with altar/podium. Room #2 would measure 40 x 54 feet and allow seating for a large number of folks for alternate activities, such as church services, weddings, meetings, costume contests, and so forth. The Team has suggested to the Wild Bunch the Chapel be located at the opposite end of the "Town" main street, OR alternately on the Northeast hill area near the Bay 1 side of the main vendor area.

What's next for our team? There are always the dreaded administra-

tive requirements (read red tape). But, this does not intimidate Jim or Mo. Like I said, these guys and their team are achievers, so let the minutiae begin—in this case, minutiae stands to lose. They have already established the fact this proposal would be entirely under the oversight and control of the SASS board, and the project itself will be subject to any modifications the board would deem appropriate. Both Jim and Mo have already expressed to the Wild Bunch the willingness to organize and form a committee to direct the fund raising activities, under oversight from the SASS board, if the board would accept and ratify this proposal, and deem it an appropriate project. As stated above, the Wild Bunch probably took all of 30 seconds before a resounding and unanimous "aye" was heard.

Next will be the initial account set-up, and promotional events planning, and art work for posters at END of TRAIL and major matches, along with club flyers. Jim and his Team plan to make the initial announcement at END of TRAIL 2010, this coming June, so those of you who are present will get to meet Jim, Mo, and the team at this official announcement. I'm sure the Team will gladly accept all individual contributions right on the spot!

Well Pard, you got the drift now. SASS Affiliated Clubs need to talk about it—I'm sure the thought of loved ones and friends will be foremost in

the minds of club members, and I'm predicting a landslide of club participation—I've got my personal check ready, just tell me where to send it. Join me if ya will; you're a Daisy if ya do!


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
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MY FIRST TEN YEARS OF COWBOY ACTION

Lessons Learned

I shot my first Cowboy Action Shooting™ match in April of 1999, and I was hooked. In September of 2000, along with about fifteen other Cowboy Action Shooters, I had the privilege of helping start the Texas Troublemakers, and it has been a wagonload of fun. Reading the July 2009 issue of *The Cowboy Chronicle* brought back many memories from the past ten years. The columns by Tex, SASS #4, “WHY CAN’T WE ALL JUST GET ALONG” and Coyote Calhoun, SASS #201, “STAGE WRITING 101 PART 1” really hit home with me. I started writing scenarios in my first year of Cowboy Action Shooting™, and I usually enjoy it, but there are times I wonder why I

put up with comments and complaints. Right now I write all the scenarios for the Texas Troublemakers, as no one else wants to do it. Most of the time I get compliments and thanks for my stage writing, but every once in a while, I get some complaints. Some are legitimate, and some just don’t make sense. Now before I start telling these stories, I should mention I have shot at twenty-one different Cowboy Action Shooting™ clubs, and I know what a good stage/scenario looks like. I have seen and shot some really good ones and some really bad ones.

Not long after we started the club, Bent Barrel Betty, SASS #33237, built the club a horse prop and donated a saddle to go with it.

The first thing I thought of was John Wayne as Marshal Rooster Cogburn. The scene where the Marshal faces down Lucky Ned Pepper would be perfect. I used the exact line, “Fill your hands, you ...,” well, you know the rest. Most shooters didn’t have a problem with it, and those that did just came up with a line of their own. After the match, a couple said they would not be back to shoot with us because I used that line in the stage. They said this is a family sport, and I should think twice before I use such language on a stage. I apologized, and said I would not use that kind of language again. Now, John Wayne is my favorite western/action actor. He is an American Hero to me, and I felt if he used that line in a movie, we could use it on a stage. Fast forward a couple of years. Someone gave me a Shooters Handbook from an annual match they had just got back from, and low and behold, there was that same line, word for word. After those folks said they would not come back, I had felt pretty guilty I had insulted them, but after learning the same line was used at this annual match with 200+ shooters, I felt a little better, but I still won’t use that line again. Score one for the legitimate side.

We are always looking for ways to keep the stages fun and different but not overly complicated. One of the things we do from time to time is a miss pickup stage or miss pickup match. Here is how it works—there are four shotgun targets, two swingers, and two knock-downs on each stage. After you shoot the revolvers and rifle, you shoot the two shotgun knockdowns, and if you have any misses, two may be picked up by shooting the two swingers with the shotgun. If you are having a bad day this helps a little. On this one particular stage we were shooting a falling plate rack with the two revolvers. You had ten shots to knock down five plates, and any rounds left in the second revolver were shot on a dump plate. The only misses that

counted on the falling plate rack were any targets left standing. After the match, a shooter said he had a problem with that stage and wanted to talk about it. He didn’t like the fact the misses on the dump plate counted as misses. I listened to his concerns, and then reminded him he could miss five on the falling plate, two more targets elsewhere that could be made up with the miss pickup, and still have a clean stage (not a clean match, but a clean stage). Our club has a “buy a miss” program—for a dollar you can buy one miss back, but only one per match. It helps the club make a few dollars. Now, that is eight misses you could have on one stage and still have a clean stage if you use all the miss pickup opportunities available to you. This one gets scored, too, so the complaint just didn’t make sense.

Now let me poke some fun at myself. In April of 2008, I made a road trip to shoot at two different clubs in two states on one weekend. One of the clubs did something we had not tried, and I decided to try it at my home club. What they did was mix the shotgun in between the revolvers and rifle, moving with an unloaded shotgun. It was different and fun, and, as a good stage writer, I stole the idea. We have a big open stage that would be perfect for this stage/scenario; it has a ten foot fence on the left, a ten foot gateway in the middle and a ten foot fence on the right. I went out to the range before the work day to set it up. I like to use lots of targets. It took at least a couple of hours, and I thought it was set just right. The morning of the shoot, I announced at the shooters meeting we would be shooting a different type of stage, but not to worry, as it would not be hard. Now, at my home club I always shoot first, because if there is something wrong with the scenario, the targets, or the stage setup, I want to be the one who finds it, not another shooter. The RO asked if I understood the course of fire. I said yes, recited my line, and when the buzzer went off I felt

like I had been shot from a cannon. I went flying through the stage until I got down to the last two shooting positions. I suddenly felt like the little kid on Christmas morning who has opened the toy for which you have waited all year, and you realize you just threw away the instructions. I had no idea which gun to shoot next! The anticipation of finally getting to shoot this stage was too much, and I shot the last guns out of order. I got a procedural on my own stage! It was really funny, but I was worried other shooters would make the same mistake. Luckily no one did. It was a good stage; it just needed some tweaks to make it run smoother.

The new stage went like this— at the buzzer you shoot five revolver targets at the far right end of the right fence, then you move to the left and the rifle. You shoot eight rifle targets, and then step into the gateway to shoot five more revolver targets. Lastly, you move all the way to the left fence, get the shotgun and shoot two shotgun targets, go back to the gateway, shoot two more shotgun targets, and finally move back to the right

fence to shoot the two shotgun knockdown targets. This stage has ten revolver targets (five at each position), eight rifle targets, and six shotgun targets in three positions. When you see it set up for the first time, it looks like a sea of targets! You move all the way across the stage and then back again. It is great fun to shoot. After I shot this revamped stage, I knew this one would be a hit, and it was. I try to learn from my mistakes. We try to keep our scenarios simple, I tried to get a little too fancy, and it bit me in the butt.

I can only hope my next ten years in Cowboy Action Shooting™ are just as much fun as the last ten years. Writing and setting up stages is enjoyable, but a lot of hard work. If you are one of those rare people who have taken on this sometimes thankless job, THANK YOU. If you think you have a good idea for a stage, don't be afraid to try it. The stage I just wrote about is called the Long Stage. I could not have written that stage if I had not tried the more complicated stage before it. When you hit on a really good stage idea, it's like nothing else. 🐾

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COWBOYS*

[A Defining Opinion]

I have heard it said “Cowboy is a state of mind.” That made me think. I have also heard it said, when referring to someone who is a pretend-cowboy, “He’s all hat and no cattle,” meaning he may wear a cowboy hat, but real cowboys also own cattle and horses, and to be a real cowboy, you must have all of the above. Of course, that statement also means he may be all talk and no substance.

So, how do we define “cowboy” in these modern days? Is it connected to rodeo and riding those magnificent bulls? Frankly, in all my historical research, I find no reference anywhere to a cowboy who tried to ride a

bull. What’s the point? No saddle would fit it, anyway. Bronco-busting is a real chore cowboys had to perform in order to tame horses and work cattle. Whoever saw a cowboy riding a bull and tending to stock? There is no mention of it in the annals of western history, unless inebriation is involved, and that doesn’t count. So, if the definition is not related to rodeo, to what *is* it related? I believe the large part of it is directly related to the Outdoors and to the freedom it engenders.

When I was a young’un (that’s “young one” for those of you who don’t con-tract), I spent as many hours outdoors as I was allowed, and

that was a lot. My mom never had to say, “Why don’t you go outside and play?” I was either already there, or asking if I could be. Being Outdoors was being Free, and I love being free! I was a cowboy. I didn’t own a horse. I didn’t live out west. I lived in a residential neighborhood in the south-east and owned a cocker spaniel named Bonnie. But, I owned a pair of shiny cap-firing six-guns, spurs, a battered ten-gallon cowboy ha ... okay, a battered one-gallon cowboy hat, a lasso, blue jeans, cowboy boots, and an attitude. I saved many a maid-in-distress in those days, and many a wagon train. I championed for those in danger. I rode like the wind on my make-believe horse, who actually went by various names in my cowboy career, from the coal-black stallion I called “Midnight” to that golden Palomino tagged “Sunny,” depending on the character I was portraying. I was always the good guy. Good guys always won. Cowboys *are* good guys, well, except for the bad ones, of course, and they end up either dead or in jail. Real cowboys aren’t bad guys, anyway. Bad guys are outlaws, not cowboys.

As a cowboy, I had a code to live by, a list of proprieties that went unstated, but which were understood to be part of a cowboy’s basic beliefs. The list began something like this, but not necessarily in this order of priority. *Never draw your six-gun first. Never throw the first punch. Never speak harshly in the presence of women. Be honest. Always tell the truth. Respect and obey your parents. Be especially nice to elderly folks. Wipe your feet before entering a dwelling (cowboys have been known to step in smelly stuff). Keep your gear clean and oiled. Care for all animals (even the ones you intend to eat, just don’t name those). Never sleep downwind from the herd. Work and study hard. Be polite. Always respect our flag and our country ‘cause cowboys are patriots. Be proud you are an American. And, very importantly, Be Happy.* I couldn’t have expressed all of these choice proverbial heifers as a kid,

but they were always there, grazing in the back pasture of my mind.

Part of my routine outdoor cowboy outfit was always guns, not real ones, because my folks would never allow me to own real ones, not even a Daisy Red Ryder B-B gun. Nope. I could have an air rifle (one that fired a noise, but no projectile), but not a B-B gun. Might put someone’s eye out, I was told. In that regard, “A Christmas Story,” my life was not. But, I had cap-shooters and my trusty air rifle with an authentic wooden stock.

Most all real cowboys owned firearms. And, while many couldn’t afford a pistol in addition to a rifle, this latter was the arm of choice because of its long-range accuracy. In fact, as the well-known western writer, Edward Abbey, author of *The Monkey-Wrench Gang* (1975) states in his essay entitled, “The Right to Arms,” which comes from his 1979 published work, *Abbey’s Road*, “The rifle is the weapon of democracy,” (326) and cowboys recognized this fact. Abbey goes on to say, “Not for nothing was the revolver called an ‘equalizer’” (326). That statement is a direct reference to a 19th-century saying associated with an advertising slogan for the Colt Firearms Company, which, in a variety of forms, says, “God made man, but Samuel Colt made them equal,” referring to the Colt Peacemaker, a six-shooter prized by cowboys then and now.

Yup, I “slapped leather,” as the saying goes, many a time, in order to keep the outlaws from gaining the upper hand. Some say we may have to resort to that again one day soon if we’re going to save the Republic, but the politically less-informed among us distrust such palaver. Surely, a Pow-Wow can settle such discontent in civilized times such as these are. Yes, Ma’am, I honestly hope so; for sure and for certain, I do. But let’s not forget another truism from Abbey, as he reminds us from the same essay, “... An armed citizenry is the first defense, the best defense, (Continued on next page)

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(Continued from previous page) and the final defense against tyranny" (326). After all, what is the basis of the Second Amendment all about, anyway? Duck hunting? But, most cowboys in the past weren't much thinking of this, I suspect. With today's cowboys, however, it may be a more pressing consideration altogether. I sometimes wonder.

The cowboys of the old days, however, rarely resorted to using their guns for much other than dealing with the occasional four-legged predators of cattle and even more rarely in dealing with personal threats from the similar four or sometimes two-legged predators. The movies have presented a rather distorted image of life in the Old West, but it is from those very pictures that I derived my ideals, for those good guys upheld the Code of the West in their lives, and I used those heroes as models for my own behavior. I still, to this day, am differentially polite when in the company of ladies. I still respect my parents and obey much of what they taught me, though they have been gone for some years now, and I am a parent and a grandparent, myself. I strive to work and study hard, to care for all animals, and to respect the elderly (heck, I'm one of them these days!). I still live in the southeast. I still do not own a horse, and my dog is long gone. I do, however, own spurs, several sets, in fact, and several pairs of boots and chaps, and lariats and lots of blue jeans. I also own a battered ten-gallon cowboy hat ... okay, a battered one-gallon cowboy hat. And, I own some six-guns and rifles, only these are real ones. I believe in what Abbey says. Like Abbey, I am an NRA member, but unlike Abbey, I am also a proud member of the Single Action Shooting Society of America: SASS.

Most importantly, however, I still own my cowboy attitude that includes my love of freedom and the outdoors. And *that*, I believe, is what most defines a cowboy. It is not his outfit, nor his gear, nor his ownership of, or connection with, four-legged critters, nor his geographical location. It is his mind-set, his attitude toward life, his enduring love for the outdoors and the freedom it represents. He never minded the bad weather, like the squalls, the blowing snow, the freezing winds, the blazing sun, the dry-as-dust air, or the ever-present insects. That was merely part of the package. Most cowboys were happy souls. They were happy because they were outside, in God's country—wherever that happened to be—and they could enjoy the complete freedom which that provided, even when that meant battling the elements. Fighting the weather wasn't a chore; it was a challenge. They relished breathing in the cool freshness of the crisp air

after a thunderstorm, the sweet smell of the prairie grasses, the pungent gum of the fir trees, and the earthy musk of the animals. They lived in God's natural cathedral, and they were grateful to have that opportunity. Much of what they owned, they manufactured. They were not wealthy in the material sense of that term, but richer lives were not lived by many others.

As a young'un, I lived outdoors as much as Mom would let me. I still

do. The Outdoors confers an attitude of Freedom to most kids. It does to cowboys, as well, and always will to this one. And to all cowboys, everywhere, freedom is everything. Yup, "Cowboy is a state of mind," all right, a *freedom* state-of-mind.

Mernickle Evil Roy Slim Jim Rig

After the Civil War, the average holster was a military holster with the flap cut off. As usual, the military was more interested in protecting the revolver than in drawing speed. The flap really impeded a fast draw. The Army assumed you would have the revolver out and in your hand when you intended to fight.

Hmm. What if you weren't intending to fight, but the fight was intending to happen anyway? First

the ex-soldiers cut the flaps off. Then, leather craftsmen made form-fitting holsters that retained the gun without a flap. This gave birth to the Slim Jim. Since all of the revolvers then were 7-1/2" or longer barrels, the Slim Jim was a long, slim holster.

Bob Mernickle received complaints his extremely successful Evil Roy series weren't "authentic" enough. Frankly, any competitive Cowboy Action Shooting™ holster isn't authentic. Authentic holsters are just too slow and clumsy, especially in speed reholstering. He decided to build a series of holsters

with all of the speed and security features of the Evil Roy, but with a more authentic appearance. "Like the ER1, this has the suede lined belt and metal lined holsters. No more pulling the gun out and having to use two hands to get it back in! The same T-nut lock system is used to ensure

the holsters stay where they are put, yet give you the flexibility of loosening the screws off and repositioning them where required," said Bob. The result is the Evil Roy Slim Jim series. I say series because there are enough variations to accommodate almost any shooter's needs.

Double Duelist/ Gunfighter/ Cross Draw

If you NEVER draw the weak hand revolver with your weak hand and shift it to your strong hand, then the

holster comes with trigger guard covers like the original Slim Jims. They can be vertical, or with muzzle forward cant, and are made to fit the guns you specify. The test version of these was a left-handed cross-draw setup because I'm militantly left-handed. With this setup you usually



draw the cross draw revolver first with your strong hand, shoot it, and shift it to your weak hand for re-holstering. This is the only time you have to shift the gun to the weak hand. Then you draw the strong side revolver and re-holster with the strong hand. This is a popular setup with a lot of really fast shooters. Its disadvantage is its lack of flexibility. You usually draw the cross draw revolver first and end holstering the strong side revolver. If you need, for example, to pick up the rifle next, you probably want to be holstering the weak hand revolver with your weak hand while you pick up your rifle with your strong hand. The other disadvantage is that we have this pesky 170° rule, and you have to be careful not to be perceived as violating this rule.

The Evil Roy Slim Jim set up for this has a different screw setup for the cross-draw holster than for the other one. Once the screws are tightened down, the holster is NOT moving. Once adjusted properly, that holster won't violate the 30° from vertical rule. Another thing of note: I ordered a left-handed rig, and it came with a left-handed belt. This is a good thing—unless you've been using right-handed belts all your life and are used to pulling the belt tight with your right hand. If you fall into this category, when you order your rig, SPECIFY whether you want a left-handed belt or a right-handed one.

Two Strong-Side Rig for Duelists and 2-handed shooters

The main disadvantage of the two strong-side rig is for two-handed shooters and Duelists who don't shoot Double Duelist. You have to transfer the weak side gun from your weak hand to your strong hand to shoot it, and then back to your weak hand for re-holstering. If you do, you want to be able to grab the weak hand revolver with your thumb over the top strap and your fingers around the front of the trigger guard, leaving the grip free for your strong hand to grab without fumbling.

Thus these holsters have no trigger guard covers. They are very efficient holsters, steel lined, easy to acquire the revolvers and to re-holster.

Field Testing

I've worn these revolvers through a lot of practice sessions, local matches, and a few major matches. I can't find much to complain about. They come in saddle tan, mahogany brown, and black, with US emblems stamped on the holsters and the shotgun belt.

This created a problem. Before George Baylor was Texas Ranger Captain Baylor, he was a Confederate colonel. He would not have been wearing holsters with "US" on them. So Bob made them with "CS" on them. You can get them that way, too. I didn't know the shotgun belt came with "US" on it and

neglected to specify "CS." So it has "US" on it. I cover that with a rifle ammo slide. I wouldn't want to be hung as a spy if captured.

Muzzle-forward cant holsters are very popular because we have "speed re-holstering." Dropping your gun when re-holstering is very embarrassing, not to mention hard on your score. With holsters worn in front of the point of my hips I can "look" the gun back into the holster. Both holsters are quite stable. They're steel lined and hold their shape well. The guns are secure, but come out quickly and easily as you would expect, and even someone as clumsy as I can re-holster quickly most of the time.

Like all of Bob's stuff, the rigs are well made and well finished. The fact that a whole lot of SASS shooters wear his rigs verifies those facts. Several of my friends have shown an interest in them, and one, Dawgtooth Dave, bought a set and loves it.

Just remember to specify "CS" when ordering!





ON THE BUSCADERO BELT

Part 1

One of my shooting pals har-rumped at me over the requisite mug of Arbuckles. "Buscadero rigs! Pure Hollywood!"

"Mostly," said I.

"Mostly! Whaddaya mean, mostly? ... Uh-oh ... Uh ... bye." (I managed to get him by the knees with a neat little houlihan throw and tied him to the chair so's I could explain it to him.)

The Buscadero belt is generally regarded as a belt that is built on a curve. On the lower portion of this curve is a "drop." There will be either one or two of these. Each drop has a slot cut into it wide enough to accommodate the top of the holster that forms the belt loop.

The curve promotes comfort to the wearer, especially if it is made of heavy material. It will vary according to an individual's hip profile. (More about this next month.) The drops (plus any rake or additional drop to the holster or holsters) are tailored to the needs of the shooter, facilitating their personal draw. Just because a belt is cut on a curve doesn't mean it's a Buscadero. The drops are what make it. There are slight variables to this, but that's the basics.

Richard Rattenbury states in


"Packing Iron" the Buscadero belt's invention in the early 20's is credited to the joint inspiration of a Texas Ranger, Captain John R. Hughes, and Tio Sam Myers, the master holster (and saddle) maker/owner of El Paso Saddlery. The story goes that a short strap was "fixed diagonally on the face of a wide cartridge belt, that slipped through the holster's belt loop and secured with a buckle, canting the holster and pistol grip lightly forward for a faster draw." This also positioned the pistol lower on the hip and nearer to the gun hand. Later, Myers simply modified the concept to a slotted tab (the drop) and the modern Buscadero rig was born.

Captain Hughes was not the first one to figure out a way to drop the holster. In my wanderings through the history of cowboy gear, I have seen a number of gun belts that were equipped with a small billet (or belt) along their body. In many instances, this billet was added to

rifle cartridges. (Verdigris is that green gunk that builds up on brass and copper. The cartridges of that time had a higher copper content than our modern ammo. They turned green very, very quickly, causing fatiguing of the thinner-walled cases that often cracked when fired.)

The 2nd problem was the issue cavalry holsters' belt loops were too narrow for these belts. This problem was solved by riveting a strap to the belt that performed very much like the slotted tab in a Buscadero belt. They admitted the loop for the holster was "makeshift" and urged better-considered modifications.

Prairie-style belts were later also modified with a variety of straps across their main bodies to carry holster, cap boxes (modified and re-issued to carry



The holster hanger on the Siterman or Cavalry Belt of 1882. Again, you can see the early prototypical stages in the development toward the Buscadero.


hang a knife sheath with a belt loop too narrow to put over a wide cartridge belt. Conceivably, this would also have been a convenient way to hang an older-style cap and ball holster that generally had belt loops around 1 3/4" wide. And if you think I'm making that up, think again.

The US military didn't think the notion all that far-fetched. In Stephen Dorsey's "American Military and Naval Belts, 1812-1902", he mentions cavalry commanders on the frontier were doing field modifications to the infantry-issue Pattern 1876 Cartridge Belts in order to solve two issues they were having. The 1st issue: The '76 was a Prairie style belt; that is, one with canvas cartridge loops rather than leather loops. The Prairie belt (and the soon-to-be-invented Mills belts) met with great approval on the frontier because they kept verdigris off the

cartridges), and a sheathed knife.

The Army also converted a number of enlisted men's saber belts sort of along the lines of the first Prairie belt modification mentioned above. This was the "Sherman Belt" or "Cavalry Belt of 1882." In essence, it was a leather belt equipped with a pair of stitched-on tabs with deers that hung down below the bottom of the beltline. A short strap with a pair of heavy hooks attached to each end was attached via the deers forming (again in Buscadero terms), a slotted "drop" for the holster. The Sherman belts "did not give satisfaction" (as the Chief of Ordnance reported in 1885) and were quickly abandoned.

The benefit (and curse!) of the Buscadero rig is it places the holster or holsters in a very specific area on the shooter's body. I say both benefit and curse because, while proper posi-

tioning makes for a faster draw, poor positioning of the drops (consequently the holsters and guns) makes for an impeded draw. This is one of the major reasons why makers cringe at the Buscadero. They not only take up a lot of leather because of that curve, but also can be a nightmare to fit correctly. That curve and the drops **MUST BE CORRECT!**

Because of these benefits, gunmen and showmen have attempted to drop their holsters or to position them favorably even before Hughes and Myers got together. These gun belts were not true Buscaderos, but they could certainly be cited as being prototypical to that type.

If you look at Tom Horn's gun belt very, very closely, you can see the holster sits in a shallow depression cut into the top edge of the belt. This drops the holster just a weensy tiny bit, aiding (like a Buscadero) in positioning the holster. By positioning his gun in the same place, his muscle memory could take over facilitating a smooth draw with the same fluid motions each time.

Sheriff Commodore Perry Owens (1852-1919) wore a very wide gun belt with two tiers of cartridge loops. He secured his holster to the bottom of this belt (I'd guess by stitching it in place as there is no evidence of a belt loop). The holster places the pistol (which was carried butt forward in the crossdraw posi-

tion) in the same position as a Buscadero rig would have.

There are also prototype rigs in which a slot was cut into the body of a standard, straight cut gun belt. This would position a gun lower, but not quite as low as a drop in a Buscadero might.

The civilian modifications cited here were neither random nor commonplace. They were utilized by people who lived by the gun and who had a definite purpose for these modifications. The Buscadero itself started life as such and ended up a fad. If you didn't have one, boy, but you just weren't with it. Truth of it is, there were a lot of guys who did real well without the fancy drops or modifications. Then as now, the whole point to outfitting yourself with a gun belt is to be comfortable and to have your holsters (and consequently your guns) placed and positioned in such a way they work with your body and are easy to draw. No gun belt, Buscadero or other, promises this unless you honestly evaluate your real needs and then purchase accordingly.

After careful perusal of the Internet firearms discussions, I have come to an interesting conclusion ... based on what I’ve read regarding self-defense firearms, it’s a miracle cowboys in the Old West, such as it was, survived without Glocks! Well, not necessarily Glocks, but without polymer-framed, high-tech, large capacity, striker-fired semiauto pistols.

But since most of the cowboys did demonstrably survive, I’ve been pondering the use of the single action revolver as a self-defense tool. I realize this is generally thought of like counting the number of angels dancing on a pinhead, more of a mental exercise than a logical deduction. Time moves on ... modern cars are safer, faster, more economical than older clunkers. Instead of a washing machine-sized “console record player,” we can listen to our entire music library on digital players small enough to be swallowed.

And to be sure, more semiauto handguns are the masterpieces of self-defense tools. But does that relegate the single action revolver to the dustbin of history?

I think not. In fact, the longer I study guns, shooting, and self-defense, the more I come to believe in the old saw that you are the weapon; everything else is just a tool. Last year we did a course at GUNSITE, which we filmed for “Shooting Gallery,” on single action self-defense. Our instructor was

Do Single Actions Still Work for Self-Defense?

Larry Mudgett, a legend at LAPD SWAT and for 13 years the chief firearms instructor for LAPD. He’s also a very competitive Cowboy Action Shooter who routinely carries a Ruger single action as his choice for self-defense. I went through the class with a vintage 4 5/8-inch Ruger .357 Flat-Top Blackhawk shooting 125-grain Hornady JHPs from a Ted Blocker carry holster designed especially for single actions and based on an old S.D. Meyers design.

I came away from the class absolutely convinced that the single action is indeed a viable self-defense tool, especially for Cowboy Action Shooters. Here’s my reasoning:

- The best gun to defend yourself with is the gun you’re the most familiar with. So you dry-fire every week with your cowboy guns, shoot a match on the weekend, take classes to be a better cowboy shooter ... next to your bed, though, you have a 1911 loaded with hot .45 ACPs. Now, I readily acknowledge the 1911 is the single best pistol on the planet (not to mention John Moses Browning actually walked across the Great Salt Lake as he was finishing up the design). But, the 1911 has a specific manual of arms (does the safety go up or down to fire ... do I have to pull back the slide ... it’s JAMMED ... now what do I do?) and the .45 does recoil ... the way you become proficient with that 1911 or Glock or XD is shoot it a lot—same way you become proficient with any gun.

Unfortunately, we live in a world of limited resources, including our time. Cowboy Action Shooting™ has bought in a lot of new shooters, a lot of women shooters, who may not have the depth of firearms background some of us have. That means the majority—or even all—of their available training/shooting time goes into the Cowboy Action Shooting™ guns. If you’re new to shooting, or maybe your spouse is new to shooting, which gun now makes more sense for self-defense?

- SASS revolvers hold five shots and are slow to reload. Well, of course that’s true, but according to both formal and informal studies, a surpris-



ing number of CCW don’t carry extra ammo regardless of the gun they choose. And, realistically, what is the most popular carry gun in America? The small frame .38/.357 revolver like the S&W J-frame or the Ruger LCR. And how many shots do those guns typically hold? Five. The pocket .380s so popular right now? Five-seven rounds. This is not as irrational as it might seem at first blush. My mentor and good friend, Walt Rauch, has been a student of gun-fights his entire life, and he has never found an instance of a civilian self-defense gunfight that hinged on the reload, much less a speed reload. One of the things we did in the GUNSITE class was learn how to reload the single action efficiently, and it’s not nearly as slow as one might think.

As far as a single action’s utility as a bedroom gun, I’m going to come down on the side of another truism ... use the handgun to get you to your long guns. Anybody here want to seriously argue that a lever action rifle and either a double-barrel or pump shotgun is not a dreadfully efficient home defense tool? Give me a ‘97 and a sack of Hornady TAPs law enforcement buckshop, and I believe I can hold the homestead indefinitely!

Okay, so here’s the net—a single action revolver isn’t an ideal tool for self-defense, but it remains a serviceable tool even after all this time.

BTW, I wanted to give you some ideas on holsters for “working” single actions. The one I used at GUNSITE was a really unique Ted Blocker that “floats” the holster itself between the gunbelt and a leather pad, which

makes for a very comfortable carry of a heavy gun. Our pal Bob Mernickle also makes a brilliantly designed high-ride belt holster that works amazingly well with relatively short-barreled single actions, the PS6SA. I have one of these for my 3 1/2-inch USFA Double Eagle .44 Special, which has become one of my favorite packing pistols.

And BTW BTW, GUNSITE is adding single action self-defense as a regular three-day class. Check the GUNSITE website for details!

I'M A SHOESTRING COWBOY

Cue the violins, hit it Glen, "I'm a shoestring kay-ooooooooow-boy, ridin' out in the West in my cut rate duds, ya know!" With the explosive growth of Cowboy Action Shooting™, there is an ever larger group needing to get outfitted. Even a careful shopper, buying used, will find it difficult to acquire a basic four gun battery for less than \$1,000, which may leave little left for the required costuming. Toulumne Lawman is writing on the gun topic, and I'd like to approach the clothing situation.

The SASS Handbook mentions thrift shops as sources, and I'd like to reinforce that concept and expand on it. Look at the picture that accompanies this article. Am I wearing the best Western costume you've ever seen? No? OK, but what would you think of it if I told you everything you see, except the guns, cost me \$5.50?! The 4X hat came from a garage sale for \$1. I attacked it with a steam kettle and gave it a John Wayne kind of look. The brown leather front vest with square cut bottom, collar, and buttons was 50 cents at another garage sale. The band collar, pullover cotton shirt in an old timey look pillow-ticking stripe was \$1.50 at the Salvation Army Store. The same source yielded the tan twill Western cut pants for \$1, and the vintage carved leather ranger style pants belt for 50 cents. The boots had belonged to a woman's ex-husband, and she was happy to take \$1 for them at a garage sale. A friend scrounged the carved Buscadero gunbelt from a neighbor who was throwing it out, so I have nothing invested in it.

Other headgear I've gotten are a black 5X Beaver hat for \$1 at a garage sale, a fur felt Injun Joe type hat, which was \$10 at an outdoor flea market (I've shaped the brim and added a Hopalong crease so it serves as my "rain hat" with my Hoppy outfit at shoots when the weather goes bad), a silver belly hat at Goodwill for \$2.50, etc. I've also gotten some really nice hats on eBay, and while they were not the extreme bargains I've got-




ten at other sources, they've been way below retail price, plus I've gotten discontinued colors and styles like a "Bat Masterson" marked derby and 7 1/2" by 5" Chocolate Stetson that are not currently available at any price.

Ebay is also a source for spurs, spur straps, holsters, wrist cuffs, Bowie knives, Hudson Bay Coats, and blankets for making gun cases. You never know what a search there will turn up, and if you are patient, you'll find what you want at a price you're willing to pay. I got a pair of brand new fancy Tom Mix styled spurs for much less than half of what another bidder paid for an identical pair because my seller had called them Charo spurs.

I've gotten other boots from \$2 to \$15 a pair at outdoor antique shows and garage sales. My "Gene Autry" styled blanket coat came from an outdoor show and a neat vintage, unlined leather coat with applied trim was at an indoor antique show. The Salvation Army Store provided two fringed suede jackets, one with medium weight lining (1950's Davy Crockett style) and one with heavier lining for \$15 each.

I have a tendency to name my clothing, and for under \$2, the Salvation Army has provided me with a Lucky Jenkins shirt, a Smiley Burnette shirt, and a California Carlson shirt. (You'd never suspect I'm a "B" Western fan). I got a pair of Wah-Maker old time high waist black Western pants with suspender buttons at another thrift store for \$3.50. A garage sale fulfilled my need for a Wild Bill Elliot bib-front shirt in black with many red buttons on it. If you have a good eye, you can find things both usable as is or easily converted for your needs. It would not be unusual to exit a Salvation Army store on any given day with a shirt, pants, and vest for under \$10 total. Don't forget to go on half price days!

Another advantage to buying this way is that being used, some items look more "authentic" than the crisp, shiny new stuff. I got my "Sandy Hopkins" lived in hat at an antique mall. Additionally, finding older duds can leave you wearing something entirely unlike what your compadres are decked out in, adding to your individuality. You didn't want to be a cookie-cutter cowboy anyway, did you? You, also, get the thrill of "the hunt" as you search out your treasures. The influence from my Depression era parents provides me with a great sense of satisfaction in making something out of nothing. There is no end to sources of really neat stuff out there.



I'm not knocking our cowboy clothing outfitters, as they have added immeasurably to our sport and need to be supported or we will lose them. But it would not be hard to invest \$150 in a hat, \$40 in a shirt, \$50 for pants, \$200 or more for boots, \$120 for leather front Duke vest, \$25 for a leather belt, etc. When you have the money and want to upgrade, go for it. If you don't, a little creativity will get you through. It IS possible to look good on a budget!

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A HORSE THAT HELPED SHAPE THE WEST

of wood in place. To operate it, the wood worker sits on one end and pushes on the bottom of the treadle with his foot, causing the top to clamp desired stock in place. The wood can then be shaped to size. A drawknife or spokeshave works well for shaving the wood. One must be very careful when using cutting tools to keep all body parts out of harm's way!

According to the information gathered from www.encarta.com who linked me to www.greenwood-working.com, there are two traditional types of shaving horses. The first is the Continental schnitzelbank or the dumbhead. This type is seen in sketches from as far back as the 15th century. It

has an offset head to allow stock to be slid in and out under it from the side.

The second type is called the English bodgeris bench. It appears to have come on the scene in the 19th century. This style uses a yoke type mechanism to hold stock in place. Some prefer the English to the dumbhead because it has the reputation of good centered gripping action as opposed to the off center style of the dumbhead. I would guess some kind of shaving horse has been around since the carpentry trade came into being. It is quite feasible the Lord Jesus and his earthly dad used a type of shaving horse, as they both were carpen-

There were many types of horses in the Old West, but the one instrumental in building our country is the "Shaving Horse." A shaving horse is a clamping device used by carpenters for untold centuries. The tool looks like a bench with a swing arm (called a treadle) that holds a piece

ters. (Mark 6:3 & Matthew 13:55)

Since the shaving horse has its place in the 1800's, I decided to build one for display at Sucker Creek, our Cowboy Action Shooting™ town. I chose the English style horse. The bench was made out of an oak plank a full 2" x 8" x 55"



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

long. The print, shown by Encarta set the measurements at 2" x 6" x 52". Others call for up to 3" x 10" x to around 5 feet long. As you can see, the size is not set in stone. A 3/4" hole was drilled cross way on center through the plank horizontally around 38" from the workman's seat end. A 3/4" metal threaded rod was placed through the hole and later cut to size. If you use planed wood from the lumberyard, you could attach the threaded rod up under the bench bottom to assure construction integrity. The legs are 2" x 2" x around 19" to 20" long. The tops were turned to 1-1/2" diameter. Corresponding holes were drilled up from the bottom of the bench on an out-pitched angle to promote stability. Then, legs were glued in place and tops smoothed off. A good height for the bench is around 17" to 18" to the top.

I made the treadle frame sides out of maple. They are full 1" x 3" x 31" long. A 7/8" hole was drilled through the 3" side up 15" from the bottom of each. Then, a piece of 3/4" copper pipe was inserted as a bushing for the metal threaded rod to ride on. A 1" hole was drilled through up around 2" from the bottom of each for the foot bar. A 1" wood dowel was used for the bar. It was built up between the treadle sides to hold it in place. The foot bar extends 5" to 6" outside the frame sides. A 1" hole was drilled through up around 8" to 9" from the bottom and also around 2" from the top of each side. Two 1" wood dowels (cut around 2-1/2" longer than the outside width of the treadle) were threaded on each end with a 1" wood-threading die. These I used for treadle cross ties, which give it extra strength. One-inch wood flat washers and one-inch wood nuts hold them in place.

Three quarter inch wood flat washers and wood nuts were made for the metal threaded rod. White Oak or Ash works well for wood washers and nuts. Hole saws were used to make the wood flat washers. A wood

threading tap & die set was used to thread the 1" nuts and dowels. A 3/4-10 tap was used to cut threads in the wood nuts for the threaded rod. I got the wood threading taps and dies from www.grizzly.com.

Next, improvements were made on the horse. First, instead of drilling one set of holes to install the yoke, I drilled a set of six holes of 1/2" diameter on 1-1/2" centers. This allows the yoke (a piece of 2" x 3" x the inside width of the treadle) to be moved up or down as per the thickness of the work piece while maintaining the angle of the work surface board. The yoke has a 90° V-notch cut in the center of one of the 2" sides. The notch is around 1" deep; this accommodates working on wood spokes and such. The yoke is held in place by two 1/2" by 3" lag screws. A piece of leather or rubber placed on the yoke and/or work surface board helps to keep work from slipping when burning occurs.

The work surface board is 1" x 7" x 30" long. It has holes drilled on center through it in the far end. A one-inch wood dowel inserted and glued in on the far end of the horse holds the board in place at various settings. A piece of wood 2" deep by around 4" high by 8" wide elevates the board. There are two 1/2" dowels glued into the 2" topside of this elevator with corresponding holes in the board. A wood gusset was placed on its backside for stability. A comfortable angle for the work surface board should have it pointing to about the height of the belly button.

The neat thing about this project is that it's not just for looks. This ole workhorse can stand at parade rest in the town square amid some wood chips and a faux drawknife, or if needed, can be called up for active duty to help create other 19th century items. Remember to always follow all safety and health rules when working on or displaying projects.

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In his early years Doctor I. Yankum spent a considerable amount of time at Madame DeLights fashionable home of ill-repute. Note his impeccable dress ... a trait he practiced his entire life as you will also note in the accompanying photograph.

At the recent SASS Convention, General U.S. Grant, SASS #2 asked the real Dr. I. Yankum what he did in life.

"As a member of Health Volunteers Overseas," replied the good Doctor, "I performed surgeries to repair cleft lips and palates for those who could not afford such surgeries in Lithuania, Mexico, Pakistan, Nepal and Ecuador."

"You mean you did this surgery and humanitarian work around the world voluntarily, asked the General?" "Yes," replied Dr. I. Yankum. The General stood there for a moment silent in his thought. Then in his command mode, looked directly into the eyes of this writer, and said, "Palaver, you should write an article about this man." And so the order was given, and the task undertaken.

The real Dr. I. Yankum is an all-around good guy and humanitarian known in SASS circles as Dr. John F. DiStefano, SASS #22529. Dr. DiStefano was born in Cleveland, Ohio and after considerable education became a dentist, and then after considerably more education became the Chief Resident in the Oral and Maxillofacial Departments of the University Hospitals of Cleveland. Specifically, Dr. DiStefano (now retired) repaired facial and bone defor-

mities caused by trauma, growth disturbance, and cleft lips and palates. His career involved private practice and teaching surgical residents.

His pseudo SASS character, Dr. I. Yankum, was born in 1870 in Dunblane, Scotland in the fashionable Cromlix Manor House. This mythical character is renown worldwide as the first human being to be labeled a "scoundrel" at BIRTH. History tells us when administered the slap of life on his buttocks, the new born tyke raised his right arm and gave the attending physician an obscene gesture with his middle finger—shocking all those in attendance. When the stunned physician yelled out, "damned be to this scoundrel," the infant in his hands was seen to be smiling.

Some years later, the Yankum family fortune was lost and our principal character and scoundrel immigrated to America before completing his apprenticeship in dentistry, which was little more than a crude trade in those days, especially in his hands—his colleagues used to make gestures like

Captain Hook behind his back. But, what he lacked in dexterity he made up for in confidence. In matters of judgment he was often wrong, but never uncertain. He started over in practice—several times, from Philadelphia to St. Louis to Dodge City (due to dental "mishaps"). He once ran his drill through a patient's tongue!

He gained his gunfighter reputation on the strength of his love for cheap booze, which he drank to excess, and a strong feeling of paranoia at cards. He believed the dancehall girls across the room could see his poker hand. After five or six shots of cheap whiskey they probably could see better than he could! But, nobody could deal with his temper. Even if a fellow left the saloon to avoid a fight, Doc might take that as an insult ... and then the trouble started. He was, however, a good gun hand. You might say that is unlikely because he was such a poor dentist, but witnesses say his dexterity with a six-gun was much better than his skill with a dental drill.

He did not kill as many men with the six-gun as did Doc Holiday, but he killed many more in the dental chair! Although liquor did not improve his technique, it raised his level of confidence so he employed it frequently!

Don't be confused by the photographs of Dr. I. Yankum in highland

attire. Actually, he could never see the usefulness of buying new dresswear when he so loved the feel of Harris wool tweed from home and so loathed parting with money for something as foolish as fancy new English duds the Westerner Americans were so fond of. His feet never touched western boots. He preferred Oxfords for town and Gillie boots for the field. In his choice of clothing, he may, so to speak, be compared to the Gray Fox of SASS lore in his love for authenticity and Scottish attire.

And now our character portrayal is drawing to a close. He was an accomplished horseman, but he never became accustomed to riding horseback for work since he needed to transport dental instruments and equipment. He mostly used a buckboard wagon. In fact, he met his end when his wheel caught a rut, turned him over, and landed him on his head, killing him almost instantly. But before drawing his last breath, according to passing witnesses, his right arm was upward and that same obscene gesture given many years before was seen again. Doctor I. Yankum had no relatives, lovers, or other interested mourners at his Boot Hill burial. His dental instruments were never found. It is strongly suspected they were confiscated by local gunsmiths.

We hope you enjoyed the story of Dr. I. Yankum, and hopefully someday we may hear your story as well, but don't tell it in front of the General ... please. You're a Daisy if Ya do. 🐾

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


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Major Horace Bell

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He joined the Los Angeles Rangers and participated in the pursuit of Joaquin Murietta while barely an adult, served as a soldier of fortune

with Juarez in Mexico and General Walker in Nicaragua, and was a Union officer through the Civil War. A photograph of him at age 70 shows him tall and straight as an arrow.

And, the stories he told ... He was the first of a literary mind to apply his pen to the developing history of Anglo-California. Gifted with a discerning eye and a strong sense of satire and the ridiculous, his writings are full of color and mirth in the finest 19th Century flowery prose. Reading his words are pure pleasure—and an education in human pathos.

Herewith, this writer includes two stories gleaned from two of the

Major's works. I have not attempted to duplicate his prose, but I hope I can give a hint of the man's genius.

* * * *

General Cobarrubias and the Electoral College

A great man was General Cobarrubias.

A Californio resident of Santa Barbara in those days before the gringo invasion, the general was a wealthy and respected citizen of California well after the 1850 absorption into the United States. Fluent in English and



French as well as his native Spanish, he was a natural and successful politician of the finest order.

The general was noted for two things: He cast California's first electoral vote in the election of 1852, and he could hold his liquor better than anyone before or since—and therein lies a tale.

The selection of a Californio, a Mexican of pure Castilian blood, a popular and respected native of the new state, was a stroke of wisdom by the Democratic National Party—or so it seemed.

Great pomp and ceremony attached to the general's journey from Los Angeles to *(Continued on page 55)*

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

Washington, D.C. He was berthed in the finest stateroom available both before and after the crossing of Panama, and he entertained lavishly during the entire voyage, nearly emptying the ship's on-board store of wines and liquors. It is reported upon departing from the ship at Panama on the first leg of his journey, the ship's steward presented him with a liquor bill amounting to some \$3,000. Without blinking, the general wrote a check to the good steward, drawn on the account of the Democratic National Committee.

His arrival and stay in Washington were carried out in the finest Tammany Hall tradition, with the finest accommodations, impeccable service, sumptuous feasting, and unlimited beverages of the general's taste.

He rewarded the DNC with an eloquent speech, cast the lone California electoral vote as arranged, and departed for home in the same style in which he had arrived. In all, his voyage cost the DNC over \$10,000 for his services.

The costly voyage only heightened the general's reputation at home and his successful return was celebrated by a great feast attended by Los Angeles' finest upstanding citizens. How the Californios Lost California

Many were the wrongs inflicted upon the innocent and unprepared rancheros of Early California in the process of relieving them of their lands and properties. While in some instances it proved successful to simply file legal claim to a prized proper-

ty and rely, with some confidence, that the American courts would honor the claim in the absence of proper documentation in the possession of the ranchero.

More often than not, these land grants were generations old and records were either in Madrid or Mexico City, if they existed at all. Few Californios were able to sustain their legitimate ownership of the desired land, even though they and their families had lived on and worked the land for generations. The uncouth and shameless gringos never hesitated to take advantage of that situation.

More often, the loss of Californio riches came in a more crass and bald-faced swindle. The Californio was a victim of his own impetuous nature, and many times his misfortune was blamed on his love of reckless wagers. Not so, however, according to Major Horace Bell of the Los Angeles Rangers. We would call the transgressors "loan sharks," and they were far more dangerous than those of later years in American society. Their actions would curl your hair and would have made the severest loan shark blush with embarrassment.

When a Californio wanted cash, he wanted it "now." In the more gentlemanly time of their experience, such loans were made on a handshake and honored impeccably. In the early 1850s, many times the ranchero would turn to an American merchant for the loan and there lies the tragedy.

It was not uncommon for the note signed by the ranchero to have what we now call "fine print." And such fine print it was. The debt would not be presented for payment until well after it was due, during which the hidden interest of 12 ½% per day, compounded daily, would have reached astronomical sums. Of course, the ranchero would be unable to pay and the loan would be "re-financed"—and guess what would be the collateral. The new terms would again multiply the original loan many times over and there are records of \$500 loans reaching over \$100,000 in interest and penalties, which could only be paid in cattle, horses, and land. These loans were legal and duly recorded as public record, where they may be viewed to this day in Los Angeles County archives.

So it is with unregulated commerce and finance. One wonders how California would be different today if "Truth in Lending" laws had been in force in those years of bringing American culture and society to the backward Californios.

Born a slave in 1832, the orphan Mary Fields was raised in a convent, but left the monastery when she was still in her teens. Mary soon gained the reputation as a captivating, cigar smoking, heavy drinking brawler. The legendary pistol-packing six-foot-two Amazon was one of the first female entrepreneurs in the American West. In her lifetime she owned and operated lively restaurants in some of the wildest cowtowns in Montana, Wyoming, Colorado, and Kansas. In 1895, Mary signed-on as driver of the stagecoach carrying the U.S. mail in the Cascade County Territory of Central Montana. It was here that she earned the nickname "Stagecoach." She retired and spent most of her time gardening at her home next door to the future famous Frank James Cooper. "Stagecoach" Mary died in 1914 and was buried in Cascade. A simple wooden cross marks her grave.



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

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

In my opinion, Sam Peckinpah's iconic 1969 film, *The Wild Bunch*, set a standard for excellence in a Western that has yet to be matched. In my mind, only "Unforgiven" and "Open Range" even come close. With "The Wild Bunch's" liberal use of stage blood and special effects, and its pioneering use of slow motion and multiple view cinematography, it will be a classic for many years to come. It is a story set along the Mexican border in 1913, about a band of outlaws fleeing the encroachment of modern society and the end of the free and wild days of the Old West. One of the sub-themes of the movie is the revolutionary new firearms technology, including the 1911 Colt automatic pistol.

According to the SASS Wild Bunch™ Match Handbook© "SASS Wild Bunch™ Action Shooting is a combination of historical reenactment and Saturday morning at the matinee. Participants may choose the style of costume they wish to wear, but all clothing must be typical of the late 19th century and early 20th century cowboy and military. Emphasis is put on period US military from 1900 to 1916. Period western dress is allowed such as Pike, Dutch, Lyle, or Tector in the closing scene of *The Wild Bunch* movie."

Also included in the Handbook is a description of the SASS legal Wild Bunch™ handgun: a 1911 Government Model Colt (or clone). The Rock Island 1911 .45 ACP, priced at less than \$400—far less than a Colt or one of the other clones—is the perfect handgun to meet this requirement. First, I will briefly cover the history of the 1911 Government Model, the rationale behind its development, and touch on its use in the late West. Then, I will cover this wonderful entry into the SASS Wild Bunch™ armory.

ROCK ISLAND ARMORY 1911 .45 ACP

The Perfect "Wild Bunch™" Match Pistol

Colt Government Model 1911 History

The "Pistol, Caliber .45, Automatic, M1911" had its roots deeply set in the Wild West. Its development has its foundations in the 1873 Single Action Army .45 Colt revolver and its legendary effectiveness.

At the end of the 19th Century, the then peacetime US Army was looking for a more modern, easier to shoot handgun than the venerable old 1873 Single Action Army Colt and its fight stopping .45 caliber Colt cartridge. Efforts had already been made to make the initial loading of 40 grains of blackpowder under a 255 grain semi-conical more manageable. I have fired full 40-grain rounds I loaded up in balloon head cases, and can tell you they will rock your world when you touch one off! It was the .44 Magnum of its day. To make it more manageable, the Army reduced the powder charge of the .45 Colt to 30 grains of powder for issue ammunition, but it was still fairly stiff for the then small framed 19th Century troopers.

In 1893, the Army retired the old single action workhorse. They settled on the Model 1892 Colt double action in .38 Colt caliber. While the new double action Colt was a decent design and fairly reliable, the .38 Colt cartridge was a terrible disappointment. Being somewhat less effective than a modern FMJ .380 auto, it was NOT by any stretch of the imagination con-

sidered a reliable fight stopper for a combat handgun. During the Spanish American War in 1898 and subsequent Moro uprising in the Philippines, veterans used to the decisive wallop of the previously issued .45 Colt, were dismayed by the new .38 Colt round's complete ineffectiveness in stopping irate opposing combatants with homicidal intent. Many 1873 Single Action Army revolvers were hurriedly called back into service.

Around 1900 the prolific firearms designer John Moses Browning of Utah was experimenting with new self-loading pistol technology that was already prevalent in Europe. In 1900 Browning produced a locked breech, recoil operated, self loading pistol in a new .38 Automatic Colt cartridge. While not much better than the .38 Colt revolver cartridge, the Model 1900 was a commercial success. He improved it with some changes in

and was a tremendous success.

Because of the extremely poor performance of the .38 Colt revolver, the usually "set in its ways" US Army was instantly interested in this revolutionary side arm for its troops. Having both rapid fire and knock down capability, it was ideal. They extensively tested the Model 1905, and the results were very favorable. Working with suggestions from the Army and his own R&D ideas for improvement, Browning

developed a final product in 1910. It would be patented and become adopted as the Colt Government Model of 1911. This new pistol was rapidly put into production, and was produced and issued to the US Army.

After the bloody attack on Columbus, New Mexico on March 9th, 1916 by troops of the Mexican revolutionary Pancho Villa, President Woodrow Wilson ordered a "Punitive" expedition into northern Mexico to apprehend and or punish Villa and his men. General John "Black Jack" Pershing, a hero of the Spanish American War, was picked to lead the expedition. It is my understanding this was the first action in which troops were issued the 1911 Government Model, and in which it was first used. After the end of the expedition in 1917 with advent of US involvement in the "Great War" in Europe, the 1911 still remained popular in the Southwest, and in the rest of the country as well. Men in military being exposed to and familiar with a weapon, is generally a cause for civilian popularity as the word of

the 1902 model that incorporated a slide hold open device that activated after the last shot was fired. Several years later he introduced the "Model 1905 Military Pistol" in a newly developed ".45 Automatic Colt Pistol" (ACP) caliber. This revolutionary new cartridge had a 230-grain, .451-inch diameter, round nose, full metal jacket bullet in a straight sided, rimless case. The round traveled at about 850 fps (oddly about the same as the US Army's 30 grain blackpowder loading for the .45 Colt revolver),

(Continued from previous page) its effectiveness spreads.

In 1924, some minor changes were made to the 1911. There were relief cuts added for the finger on the frame behind the trigger guard area. The hammer was given a wider spur, and the back strap was changed from a grooved flat one flush with the back of the frame to a grooved arched one that fit the palm of the hand better. This new back strap incorporated a lanyard ring in the base. The updated version was renamed the "Pistol, Government Model 1911A1." Eventually the blued finish was abandoned in favor of a more durable phosphate "pakerized" finish, and the wood grips were replaced with brown-checked Bakelite or plastic. This same pistol has continued in continuous production for 100 years since its initial design in 1910. It was the issue handgun for the US Army until 1985 (74 years) when it was sadly replaced by the M9, a modified Model 92 Beretta 9mm, to mollify our Nato allies (after all, we forced the 5.56 x 45mm/.223 on them). The reliable old 1911A1 continues to stand at the ready in Government armories, and has been frequently used by special ops folks since.

Consider this: Browning's design is basically unchanged in 100 years. No one disputes the effectiveness of its .45 ACP cartridge. The caliber and pistol designed by Browning is as popular and as effective now as they were almost 100 years ago when Black Jack Pershing's troops carried them both while chasing Pancho Villa across northern Mexico and in the trenches of France's Flanders Field. For 100 years, the Browning designed 1911 has been the "go to gun" for close up personal defense carry. Prohibition era Feds like Elliot Ness, hardened Marines like Chesty Puller, fighting men in the jungles of the Pacific and Europe in World War II, soldiers in Korea fighting at Pork Chop Hill and the Chosin Reservoir, tunnel rats in the Vietnam's I Drang, and even US Special Forces and FBI HRT to this day—ALL have, and still do, depend on the Model 1911

Government Model to keep them alive. It is arguably the most copied self-loading handgun in the world, and imitation is the sincerest form of flattery.

Rock Island's 1911 .45 ACP Government Model

I am personally a fan of the 1911 pistol, having carried both a Springfield Armory 1911A1 and Para-Ordnance P-13 as duty weapons while a Deputy Sheriff in central California in the 1990s. As they say, "A 9mm may expand, but a .45 NEVER gets smaller!" When I retired, however, I reverted to the lighter 9mm Glock 19 that I had carried as a detective for my concealed carry weapon. Those unneeded .45 ACP duty weapons were eventually traded off for other toys.

A couple weeks ago, I was at my friend's gun shop, The Discount House, in Jerseyville Illinois. He said, "Hey, you like military weapons. What do you think of this for \$399?" He showed me a Rock Island Government Model 1911 .45 ACP. I had previously handled and fired a Rock Island 1911 about four or five years ago. I liked it and was impressed at the value. Having retired from Law Enforcement and being very occupied with SASS, however, I was not in the market for a 1911 at the time. The Rock Island 1911 eventually passed out of my mind as life moved on. With the recent growth in popularity of the SASS Wild Bunch™ matches, however,

I checked out the pistol my friend handed me with a new appreciation. It struck me as being a perfect, affordable 1911 for Wild Bunch™ matches! After some creative horse-trading with my friend, I took the Rock Island 1911 home.

Here is what the 2010 edition of the SASS Wild Bunch™ Handbook says about the required pistol:

1911 PISTOL REQUIREMENTS

Full size, single stack steel frame 1911 style semi-auto pistol in .45 ACP caliber. No more than one main match pistol may be carried to the firing line.

TRADITIONAL CATEGORY MODIFICATIONS

- Barrel length must be five inches. No barrel porting or compensators or other recoil reducing devices allowed.
- Barrel with standard barrel bushing. No Bull barrels allowed.
- Magazine wells may be beveled, but may not be oversized, extended, or flared.
- Only non-adjustable "military style" rear sights and blade type front sights allowed.

- No sight inserts or colored sights allowed. Sights must be black or blued.
- Stainless steel is permitted. Stainless pistols may have stainless sights.
- Grips must be GI-style wood or plastic grips. Other natural materials are allowed but no rubber grips. No target style or thumb rests allowed.
- Only rear slide checkering or serrations. No front slide checkering or serrations.
- Magazines must be standard length and cannot hold more than eight rounds. No extended base pads on magazines.
- Only standard grip safeties. No beavertail style grip safeties.
- Standard length magazine release. May not be extended or oversized.
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- Standard recoil spring and guide. No full-length guide rods allowed.
- Short or long solid trigger permitted. No match triggers allowed.
- Flat or arched mainspring housings permitted.
- Lowered and flared ejection port is allowed ONLY if factory original. Standard ejection ports may not be modified.
- Checkered front strap or trigger guard not allowed.
- Standard spur type hammer only.
- Lanyard loop is optional.
- Internal accurizing and action tuning is allowed.
- Thumb and grip safeties must function correctly.
- Note: "Standard" in all cases means Standard Military Specs.

That description might have come from the promotional material for the new Rock Island Arsenal Model 1911 Government Model .45 ACP!

The Rock Island Government Model 1911 is made in the Philippines on CNC machines, and parts are 100% interchangeable with the GI 1911A1. It is a basic, plain Jane, model. It is phosphate "pakerized," with a very nice and even, medium-dark gray finish over all. The only exception is the exterior area of the chamber end of the barrel, which is visible through the ejection port. This area is stamped ".45 ACP" and is buffed bright steel. Even though the 1911 has a pakerized finish, the slide action was slick and smooth, not at all gritty. The Rock Island 1911 comes with the basic military style, low profile sights. The trigger pull was surprisingly good. It is about a 3 lb trigger, very crisp with no creep. The 1911 thumb safety was positive, but moved freely. The grip safety func-

tions as intended, and the slide safety (pushing the slide back 1/4") prevents the weapon from firing when the trigger is pulled and the slide is not fully in battery.

With the exception of the phosphate finish and later style finger relief cuts behind the trigger, the Rock Island 1911 is actually already in the basic early, pre-1925 Colt 1911 configuration. It comes with the early 1911 style flat back strap and narrow hammer. The grips are a basic, smooth, exotic hardwood. To be period correct, they should be replaced with walnut checkered grips with diamonds around the screws. According to the SASS Handbook for Wild Bunch™ matches, however, the stock grips are SASS legal. It comes with a very nice eight round magazine with a small finger rest/bumper pad that wraps around the slightly protruding magazine body. Overall fit and finish was uniformly excellent. In these days of ridiculously inflated gun prices, this bargain 1911 measures up very well, indeed.

From the reports I have read, no break-in period is required. My experience would confirm this. I took the Rock Island 1911 down by my creek for some quick test firing. It performed flawlessly, right out of the box. I fired 50 rounds of Remington 230 grain FMJ ammo with zero malfunctions. The factory trigger pull was fantastic, and easily did 2" groups at point of aim, off hand at 10 yards. I also bounced pop cans with monotonous regularity. Function was 100%. I had forgotten how perfect the ergonomics of the 1911 are. Point shooting the Rock Island 1911 across the top of the slide at close range was so natural, the sights were all but unneeded. John Moses Browning was truly a firearms genius.

I decided I wanted the later 1911A1 look to go with my 1943 Inland M1 Carbine and my empty Boyt M1916 WWII vintage holster. I promptly replaced the eight round magazine with seven round, flush fitting GI ones. I then replaced the flat back strap with an arched 1911A1 GI one with lanyard ring. I also replaced the narrow hammer with a wide spur GI 1911A1 hammer. Oddly enough, this changed the trigger pull from the factory three pounds to a heavier five-pound pull. For a cocked and locked "carry" weapon that may not be a bad thing. Finally, I mounted a pair of brown Bakelite GI checkered grips. All of the items replaced fit perfectly since, as I have already said, the Rock Island parts are 100% interchangeable with GI 1911A1s. This stuff is easily found on the Internet, though

it mostly came out of my junk left over from when I did gun shows in the late 80s and 90s.

My Rock Island is now a 1911A1 and looks just like the Ithaca 1911A1 I carried as an MP in the early 1970s. (Author's note: some GI 1911A1 hammers have hammer struts that are slightly shorter than the ones standard on Rock Island and other commercial 1911s. This allows the hammer to rebound and rest slightly back off the rear face of the slide and firing pin, rather than flat against them like factory hammers. It may be a safety feature, though I am not sure since I am not a 1911 aficionado. It does not affect reliability in any way, as ignition was 100% with deep firing pin indents in all the expended cartridge primers.)

I did some research on the Internet and various forums. The reports on the Rock Island 1911 are very favorable. Some use them as basic platforms to build up their own "whatever" guns, while many are happy with them "as is" from the factory. Rock Island even has upgraded models available for those of you that want to improve on basic perfection. You would be hard pressed to find a finer pedigree than that of the 1911. Add to that pedigree the availability of this quality copy of the firearm at an affordable price, how can you lose?

Before the REAL Colt 1911 snobs start to squawk, this Rock Island 1911 shoots as well out of the box as the Springfield Armory 1911 and Para Ordnance P-13 I had did. The fit and finish is as good as ANY factory 1911 pakerized model I have ever seen, to include military 1911A1s and 1991 Colts. With the Springfield Armory basic pakerized models being around \$600 and up, the Auto Ordnance pakerized one about \$500, and real Colt 1911s being closer to a grand, the lowly Rock Island 1911

represents a great buy for the buck. GunBroker.com is full of Rock Island 1911s for \$370-390, often including shipping to your FFL! With under-employment and true unemployment hovering at 25-30% total, many of us cannot justify spending high dollars on a 1911 for occasional use in a Wild Bunch™ match.

CONCLUSION

I expect we will see more of these Rock Island 1911s as the word spreads. They are truly the best-kept secret in the handgun community. In 14 years of writing about and evaluating firearms and being a staff writer for The Cotaboy Chronicle, the Rock Island 1911 is absolutely the winner of the all time Tuolumne Lawman's "Best Buy for the Buck" award. Inexpensive does not always translate into "cheap" or "shoddy." My belief in this inexpensive 1911 from the Philippines is not superficial, or motivated by loyalty to one of our SASS sponsors. It was not an author sample.

My belief in this fine pistol is based on John Moses Browning's genius being implemented and offered at a truly affordable price to the average man or woman with kids and a mortgage. As for the question "Would I trust it with my life," let me just say that even though I do not "carry" on a daily basis any more, this Rock Island 1911 has now replaced my Glock in my fanny pack for road trips. The sight of a formidable 1911 in your hand, in itself, is a serious deterrent to a goblin with evil intent. It will certainly meet your needs for either a Wild Bunch™ match gun or a defensive pistol as it was intended.

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MATCH READY GUN SERIES

Taylor's Comanchero

I was talking with Tammy Loy of Taylor's and Co. about their new Comanchero, a Uberti 1873 Trapper (18" octagonal barrel, straight stock or pistol grip with checkering on stock and forearm) that has been made race ready. She offered to send me a .38/.357, and I

thought for a minute. "Send a .45 Colt. I'll use it in Wild Bunch™ matches as part of the test." Wild Bunch™ is a growth area in SASS. A lot of contestants are buying big bore rifles for Wild Bunch™ who shoot .38s as main match rifles. Shooting a .45

Colt rifle with 150-power factor ammunition is quite a bit different from shooting 60-power factor .38 ammunition. Big bore rifles aren't the only item being purchased for Wild Bunch™. 1911 sales to SASS members are at an all time high. 1911s need holsters, magazines, and magazine holders. The leather rig needs .45 Colt ammo holders, and 12 gauge shell holders. Shooters who don't use '97s are buying '97s or clones. A quick poll of the SASS Wire got a lot of replies from shooters who

bought three guns, reloading equipment for calibers they didn't use otherwise, and 1916 Army uniforms.

What is a Comanchero? It's a cataloged item from Taylors, not a gun you have to send to a gunsmith for tuning. It is a Uberti '73 Trapper that has full Codymatic action and short stroking, and a hand-sewn-on glove leather butt-cover, and a hand laced lever wrap.

A Codymatic is a '66 or '73 tuned and short-stroked by SASS #6986, Cody Conagher, one of SASS's premier gunsmiths. It should be noted I

gunsmith couldn't make it work and the manufacturer would do nothing. I became a big believer in buying a ready-to-go race gun. I knew if Cody had gotten an out-of-spec gun from Taylor's, he would have sent it back. I bought it because most of the fast shooters in Texas at the time shot Codymatics and recommended them.

So another reason to get a .45 was because I already knew enough about .38/.357 Codymatics to write a review. The Codymatic short stroke is just a tad longer than some of the others, but it is extremely smooth, and it is extremely reliable. The action feels pretty much like working the action with no springs in it, but it actually works. A couple of my friends, who are not in Holy Terror's league, have

had their Codymatics redone with short stroke kits from other companies to get that tiny bit of shorter stroke. Let's just say neither of them has suddenly started beating Badlands Bud. Unlike other short stroke modifications, Cody does not use a link "kit." He developed a set of links some years back and then called his insurance company and asked about prod-

shoot Codymatics now. I have two '73 Trappers, one with straight stock, one with pistol grip. Both are outstanding rifles. I bought the first one in 2006 at END of TRAIL from Taylor's after myriad problems with another brand of rifle. I had purchased a rifle and sent it to an outstanding SASS gunsmith only to find out the gun was so far out of spec the

uct liability. The cost was excessive, to say the least. The links determine lockup. So he reshapes the lever. Product liability was affordable. He also uses stock springs that have been thinned and reshaped rather than aftermarket springs. "The first thing they taught me in gunsmithing school was how to make springs." Of course, he does a complete action job as well, adjusting the trigger pull to reasonable and smoothing the moving parts.

Tammy sent a Comanchero to me care of Diamond J Gunsmithing. That's SASS #11268, Jack Diamond, chief gunrunner at Founders Ranch events. If you're lucky enough to win a gun at a Founders Ranch event, you've met Jack. When he called and told me it had arrived, I went over to pick it up. When I got there, I found a typically beautiful Uberti pistol grip '73 with a really good looking butt cover and lever wrap, and a short stroke action job that felt as if it had no springs and a crisp trigger. It was race-ready. Well, technically, it was race ready for most of you, but not quite for me. Since I have an optic nerve disease that makes it harder to see the front sight, I prefer a sight the size of a baby moon hubcap from the 50's.

Jack mentioned he had a new design big bead front sight, a Speed Sight from Pioneer Gun Works, Inc. (2460 Harvest Lane, Springfield, OR 97477, 541-515-5084, www.pioneer-gunworks.com). To cure a problem of

beads breaking off on other big bead front sights, the post is about an eighth of an inch wide. It has a very striking appearance from the rear that grabs your attention. The bead itself is big and rounded. A rounded bead will gather and reflect more light. This one is brass. The only thing that would be brighter would be a gold plated bead. I had him put one on and keep the stock one to reinstall when I send the gun back to Taylor's.

I test fired the gun and then shot it in a Wild Bunch™ match. One of the differences between the Winchester '66 and '73 is the '73 has a safety that blocks the trigger until the lever is completely closed to prevent an out-of-battery firing. My '73 done by Cowboys and Indian some years ago and my first Codymatic came with the safety removed. The last .38/.357 Codymatic came with the safety intact. I noted actuating the safety was stiffer than the one on the .38/.357. This took a little practice to get used to. Eventually it either lightened up, or I got used to it. I prefer the safety intact and consider it a big deal on a .45. I've had two out-of-battery firings with the first .38/.357, firing mild blackpowder loads (power factor 85 or so), which were no big deal. One locked the gun up until I could get the deformed cartridge out of the carrier. The other didn't even do that. This doesn't mean I recommend removing the safety in a

.38/.357. Other shooters have damaged their rifles more significantly, with bent levers and such. With a more powerful .45, shooting power factor 160+ loads, I definitely want the safety intact. I know, .45 Colt '66s don't have the safety. Still ...

The difference in the feel of the safety wasn't the only thing different between the .45 and .38/.357s, of course. First, there's recoil. My lightest blackpowder .38 loads, as mentioned, are in the range of an 85-power factor. Smokeless shooters shoot lighter loads (because they can. I can't meet the smoke standard with loads that light). If you use good technique, you can shoot the rifle in rapid fire, and the front sight doesn't move. If you do that with the .45, you probably weigh 250 and can bench press 400 lb. I talked with T-Bone Dooley and Nuttin' Graceful at Comin'At'Cha. They concluded from tests the .45 is 1.5 seconds slower in a 10 shot string than the .38. The .45 Colt cartridge is just bigger and thicker than the skinny .38 Special.

But very quickly I got used to it. I don't try to shoot groups with rifles, not having the rifle equivalent of a Ransom Rest. But, out of the box, it did shoot a small group to point of aim at 15 and 30 yards with my Wild Bunch™ load (200 gr. LRNFP, 5.7 gr. Trail Boss). At another practice session another shooter put a target out to the far berm, circa 75 yards, and I rang the bell with monotonous reliability.

I did make one more change to the sights. At Comin'At'Cha I traded rear sight blades with The Brisco Kid of Cowboy Shooters Supply. He had a dozen or so he had neatly flat topped. He put one of them on each of my '73s and the test gun. I really like the sight picture that results. For what we do, it is incredibly fast. Without the ears of the stock semi-buckhorn sight getting in the way when moving quickly from one target to another, it is really easy even for my eyes to see the shiny front sight over the black target and know it's time to pull the trigger.

Counterfeit Codymatics

I've talked to a lot of people who tell me, "I've heard bad things about Codymatics." But I've not met anyone who actually had problems with them. One claimed to have worn one out, but he didn't call Cody. He gave it to another gunsmith. Any gun can wear out some parts under the abuse to which we put SASS main match guns, but nothing Cody couldn't repair. Cody always fixes his guns when they're returned. He also told me of an interesting situation. A few years back he received complaints from people who had trouble with their Codymatics they bought used. He told them to send him the gun. When he got it, he had never seen it before. He did full Codymatic treatments on the guns involved and sent them back. Now every gun he does has his signature inside it to prevent any more "counterfeit" Codymatics.

Glitch?

The only glitch I had was starting with the 9th round, the loading gate did not completely return to the upright and locked position, preventing the lever from being opened. This happened every time the rifle was completely loaded. Using my Redwing Screw Wrench, I pushed the rounds in with the flat blade, and the loading gate popped up. Only once did I start a stage and have the loading gate lock the gun up, and fortunately, that was in practice. I mentioned it to Cody, and he blamed it on the Uberti magazine spring. Sometimes they're stiffer than other times. He recommended an aftermarket stainless magazine spring.

Conclusion:

1. Uberti '73s are excellent choices for SASS main match rifles. 2. Cody Conagher does excellent action jobs and short strokes for '73s. 3. The 18" octagonal barrel model '73 is an extremely well balanced setup for SASS matches, being easy to swing from target to target without over-swinging. 4. The other additions on the Comanchero, the neatly sewn on butt cover and the well-done lever wrap, are a nice plus and save you the cost of buying them later.

This is one I hated to send back to Taylor's. MSRP is \$1370. 🐾

Not only do we Cowboy Action Shooters dress up in nineteenth century duds and handle nineteenth century-style firearms, many of us pause to think how really comfortable we would be if we had to live in that often dirty, smelly, and inconvenient era, especially as we leave a shoot, and our fantasies, to return to our modern homes, RVs, or hotel rooms and our TVs, microwaves, and indoor plumbing.

S.D. Brook, also known as Slow Shootin' Sam, SASS #64833, was inspired by our game to ponder how someone from the nineteenth century would handle himself in today's world. And so was created "A Cowboy In Time," a combination of Oklahoma Western lore, a social introspection of modern life, and a wee bit of science fiction.

Samuel Benjamin, a nineteenth-century deputy U.S. Marshal, discovers himself, in the blink of an eye, in twenty-first century Oklahoma City, all because of a natural phenomenon that's just plain unexplainable. Understanding he cannot return to his own time and faithful to his obligation as a lawman, Benjamin attempts to capture the hunted fugitive who came forward in time with him. Most importantly, Samuel seeks information about the life he left behind.

Samuel Benjamin meets Paul Crabtree, an Oklahoma City police detective, who takes an immediate interest in him. Intrigued by Benjamin's story, Crabtree connects Samuel with Lawrence Harris, a University of Oklahoma history professor. Together, although each with his own motivation, they hope to unearth the unknown marvel that caused Samuel Benjamin to appear 113

years into the future and help him return to his own time. Or, at least, help him to adjust to the wondrous machines and fast-paced lifestyle of the twenty-first century world. A world of boxes that talk, pants that stay up without suspenders, motorized carriages that travel at break-neck speeds, and women's clothing that actually reveals their legs!

Despite the fact "A Cowboy In Time" is not a book of fantasy or science fiction, aficionados of that writing genre are sure to enjoy how the author handles the Time Travel Paradox.






2009 NEW MEXICO State Championship

Magdalena, NM – They came from all over New Mexico and Arizona, Colorado and Texas. Some even came from as far away as Iowa. No matter where they called home, these cowboys and cowgirls had all come prepared for some great shooting and camaraderie. Now in its 6th year, the “Shootout In Old Magdalena” is a rip-roaring, fast-paced match that combines close and

generous sized targets to challenge a shooter’s skill with entertaining props and elements designed to produce giggles and grins for all.

Magdalena is an historic old New Mexico community, based on mining, cattle, and sheep. Magdalena was the center for a thriving cattle and sheep industry, and served as the railhead for the shipment of stock from Arizona and New Mexico beginning in 1885. The last movement of stock down the “Stock Driveway” occurred in November of 1971 when the driveway was closed and trucks became the means for shipping livestock. It was the end of an era, and today only the old shipping pens remain, along with a marker on Hwy 60 that denotes the “Stock Driveway.” The Old Magdalena shooting facility is located where many of the cowhands camped with their stock, waiting to move their herds to the railhead.

Activities began bright and early on Thursday with campers arriving. A light rain gave match officials some concern, but that proved to be worry over nothing! We even managed to get Capt. Baylor’s mega motor home safely ensconced in the camping area!

The drizzle certainly did not

dampen the enthusiasm of those who started the first day of Half-a-Hand Henri’s “Finishing School!” If you sign up for Henri’s school, make sure you bring lots of ammo! It is fun, and it is rigorous!

Friday morning dawned bright and beautiful. Down on the Javalina Range, the long-range match drew a large group of sharpshooters wanting to match their skills against a challenging array of steel spread up the side of a hill. Long Range Master, Dirty Dan, SASS #9726, kept things moving in a well organized manner that limited seat time for those waiting their turn in the barrel.

Mid-morning brought out those who wanted to try their hand at the Speed Pistol, Rifle, and Shotgun events. These events, plus a practice stage provided folks with many opportunities to “get the kinks out,” and make sure all the hardware was in good working order.

Following a break for lunch, Dirty Dan kicked off the four-stage Wild Bunch™ Match. In spite of a light off-and-on rain, participation was strong, with 24 shooters taking on the Federales. When the dust settled, Fast Hammer, SASS #60707, and Smith Ryan, SASS #72821, took home the gold in Traditional and

Modern, respectively. Cain, SASS #72632, and Kid Salado, SASS #7618, both shot the match clean. I would have to say that Capt. Baylor, SASS #24287, had the sharpest uniform!

All shooting activities ended at 5:00PM and folks gathered at their camps for dinner and a round of war stories. Rumor has it that the Redhead served margaritas for about 112 folks at Camp Baylor!

The main match kicked off on Saturday with the mandatory shooters meeting, followed by the opening shot fired from Chickasha Smith’s,

SASS #50339, cannon. The stages this year were designed by Half-a-Hand Henri, SASS #9727, and provided shooters with a rich mixture of speed, elements of entertainment, and play that used to be common but have been lost at many matches in recent years. The emphasis was definitely on the shooting, but judging by the laughter and good-natured teasing, the play factor was high!

The range at Old Magdalena is set up as an Old West town with corrals, shipping pens, shop fronts, gallows, and other period "buildings." Essentially there are six "bays" that present two stages per bay. This provides a great deal of flexibility in terms of setting up target arrays and a wide variety of shooting scenarios.

Stages one and two were set in the Corrals and Shipping Pens bay. Both of these stages were pretty straightforward in terms of how targets were to be engaged, and everything was close and fast. Stage one required the shooter to throw a prop hat into the air after giving the line, "Buffalo Bill's Wild West Show is rid-

ing into town!" Stage two, "Them Ain't Horses; They're mules!" required the shooter to toss a rain slicker over a saddle, prior to engaging targets. Both stages had lots of movement from one position to another, so good planning was rewarded! There are no "stand and deliver" stages at Old Magdalena!

Stages three and four used the Train Depot and Hotel bay as a


backdrop. The target array on these two stages included a falling plate rack for the rifle and Wild Bill's pet monkey. "Get This Monkey Off My Back!" was the theme for stage three, and boy, did folks enjoy this one! The shooter began with rifle at port arms, and the pet monkey strapped on his/her back. At the buzzer the fun began, as the pet monkey suddenly came to life, and

chattered and wiggled to encourage the shooter through the course of fire! Stage four gave folks a chance to regain their composure, as they tossed a set of curtains at the posse, and then blazed away without the aid of any simian friends!

Stages five and six brought the posse into the "entertainment district" of Old Magdalena. Set at the Dusty Boots Dance Hall and the Yukon Rose Saloon, it was at this point shooters encountered the first of two very lifelike dummies constructed by Knitin Kitten, SASS #50340. On stage five, the "poker game" was preceded by a handshake with the dummy seated in a chair. The shooter next moved to the pistols

that had been staged on the poker table under their hat. After placing the hat back on one's head, the shooter began the course of fire by engaging the card suit. One had to think, as the first pistol was clockwise and the second counter-clockwise! Stage six was set at the Yukon Rose Saloon, and presented shooters with a swinging bar tender they had to shoot around, but not hit! If you timed your shots with the swing, all went well! There was no penalty if you did happen to shoot him between the eyes, however, some were tempted!

The first day saw brief periods of light rain, which presented no serious problem. However, the sixth stage was interrupted by a sudden lighting storm, and the Match Director called it a day due to the lighting. In the six years we have been holding this match, it is the first time we have ever had anything but good weather!

Plans called for a potluck dinner and entertainment, but as the afternoon progressed, the chances of that happening looked grim, and it appeared those activities would have to be canceled. That did not take into count the determination and tenacity of Knitin Kitten, and the other Trail Driver ladies! They wrangled the men up, pressed some of the shelters into service, and put on a spread fit for a king! The rain also quit, and nearly all participants showed up to partake in the good food. The band had been weathered out, but Bloody Dave Stout, SASS #50113, managed to rustle up a roaring campfire, and persuade yours truly, Cain, SASS #72632, and Led Foulin, SASS #18030, to break out the guitars and hold a campfire sing a long! It turned out to be a wonderful cowboy evening!

Sunday brought the sunshine and blue skies one would expect in New Mexico in September!

Stages seven and eight were on bay four, in the "legal district," with the gallows and courthouse serving as the setting. On the gallows, shooters had the company of the second dummy created by Knitin Kitten. This one was a rather well endowed lady who graciously allowed shooters to stage their shot shells within the confines of her bosom! I noted most shooters really loaded her up with shot shells, since they had to be fished out for the course of fire! This stage also featured the infamous "Amazing Sweep"—R4, R1, R3, R2, R4—and repeat, with both rifle and pistol targets. Right! The stage ended with 10 pistol shots, and the option of reloading one round to engage the "Marshal," a rifle target. A miss on the Marshal was a miss, but a hit was a 10 second bonus. Stage eight featured a progressive sweep with

the pistol on two targets, eight rifle on four targets, and six shotgun engaged from two different positions. Again, good planning was key to success!

Stages nine and ten were set on bay 5, at the Marshal's office and Bank. Stage nine featured a "jailer," a figure painted onto a sliding panel, which could be adjusted to accommodate the height of the shooter (who knew?). This panel had a hole cut in and around the belly button, which was filled with a balloon. The shooter started with the rifle muzzle on the "belly button" and at the buzzer shot out the balloon and then engaged the remaining barn door sized rifle targets by triple tapping each of three targets through the hole. A rifle reload was then placed on a smaller 4th rifle target. The same three very large rifle targets were then engaged with the pistols at least three times each in any order, from the fence. A two shotgun split, one from each end of the fence, finished the job! Piece of cake with a '97, but doubles had to plan! Stage ten was pretty straight forward, consisting of double tap Nevada sweeps with rifle and pistol, but just to make things interesting, the shooter had a pair of saddle bags over the shoulder, and they had to be there at the end of the stage. The five shotgun targets were split, and engaged from different positions, so again, planning was the key.

Stages eleven and twelve were set in bay six, the general store and outhouse. These two stages, featured the shotgun, and included four flyers. While you had to engage the flyers, misses were not counted as misses, and if you hit them, you picked up a five second bonus on each! On stage eleven, the rifle and pistol targets were engaged in the "WW Birthday Sweep," created by WW, SASS 5353, a local New Mexico gunfighter. There are five pistol and five rifle targets. The order on the pistols is: P1, P3, P2, P3, P1 and P5, P3, P4, P3, P5 and R1, R3, R2, R3, R1, R5, R3, R4, R3, R5 with the rifle. It's actually easier than you think. In any case, stage twelve lessened the "cognitive turmoil" some felt, by providing shooters with quick and simple sweeps they could start from either end of the array.

The Shootout In Old Magdalena concluded with a Top Gun stage, a Couples Shoot, and a Four Man Team Event followed by the Awards Ceremony.

The Shootout In Old Magdalena has grown each year, and this 2009 year was the best by far. This event will again be the SASS New Mexico State Championship in 2010. Put it on your calendar, September 17-19th, and come prepared to have a great time in the Land of Enchantment! 🤠

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





BUNKHOUSE BIDNESS

The Alberta Frontier Shootists

They looked a little north to a club near Alberta's capital city of Edmonton, and at a meeting of the two boards of directors, there was a unanimous vote to accept their new cowboy pard. But just as everyone was backing up the yoked oxen to hitch the trace chains to the prairie schooners for the trek north, the pony express clattered up, blowing foam, and waving a letter.

"They'd renege on the deal," recalls President B. Slim. We were stuck.

And, he means axle deep!

That was the bad news. The good news was there wasn't a cowboy shooter in Alberta who wanted those fabulous 10 years at Ft. Kusk to just disappear into the mists of memory. One posse of those cowboys called The Rocky Mountain House Rod and Gun Club had its home on the range. A small group had started Cowboy Action Shooting™ about five years prior to this time and called themselves the Rocky Mountain House Old West Shootists. They'd shot at Ft. Kusk and cared.

Their range was no Ft. Kusk.

"We had about half a street," of Western town, smiles Luke Leathersmith (yes, he's a master maker of leather cowboy gear), and he was head honcho of the Rocky Shootists at the time. "And, we had our 500 yard range in." It was 500 yards because the bulldozer got stuck in the muskeg at 600 yards of a journey that was planned for 1,000 yards.

Muskeg is a northern peat bog that can swallow moose calves whole. About 3/4 of Rocky's range is

muskeg. Pulling a gun cart through it can be a life-changing experience.

Rocky might be a small town (pop. 10,000) tucked into the foothills of the Rocky Mountains and its Cowboy Action Shooting™ range might have been embryonic at the time, but you can't get much more "Western" than Rocky. Two hundred miles southwest of old Ft. Kusk, it was once a fur trading centre, where the mountain men, Indians, and Couriers du Bois came down out of the Rockies with their beaver pelts, howling like wolves, and intent on partying. The town's biggest park features a row of stone chimneys and fireplaces. All that's left from the last time the Blackfoot burned the place to the ground in the early 1800s. Yes, the cowboys here still carry lever guns in their horse's rifle scabbards. No pistol calibers, though. This is grizzly country. The .444 Marlin was the artillery of choice last time I looked.

The executive of the Rocky range invited the Alberta Shootists to make a proposal that would be to the satisfaction and mutual benefit of both clubs. To that end B. Slim and pards went to Rocky to measure the area allotted for Cowboy Action Shooting™ and to plan what they could design there and what else they could do for the range apart from greatly increasing the membership. A deal was struck. And in Rocky they don't renege on deals—not since the Blackfoot drew the line.

But, as anyone will tell you who's trailed 5,000 beeves from San Antone to Dodge City, having somewhere to

go and getting there are two different things. It was now April. A three-day Canadian Championship of Cowboy Action Shooting™ was due first weekend in August.

What began then, B. Slim calls "an ordeal."

Fifty to 60 members and non-members stepped right up to beg, borrow, and practically steal pick-up trucks, trailers, tractors, and real big trailers for the trek. One of the things that had to be trekked was a saloon big enough to be the centerpiece in a three-day match's awards banquet.

"We were lucky we had members who were real truckers, who knew what permits and things we needed for 'extra wide loads' and such," recalls B. Slim.

The Alberta Frontier Shootists invested \$25,000 in all new props and targets. Grants were obtained from the Alberta Sports, Recreation, (Continued on next page)

The Alberta Frontier Shootists had it made in the shade. For 10 years they'd had an Old West town (Ft. Kusk) set up at a gun club solely dedicated to Cowboy Action Shooting™ on private land. It was in Kelsey, near Camrose, Alberta, right in the heart of horse and cattle country. There wasn't a trap or skeet shooter for miles. They didn't have to say: "Aye, yes, or no," to a single soul, but could go about their monthly matches from April to October (weather permitting) and take July off to perfect plans, prepare, and put on their first-class, three-day Canadian Championship of Cowboy Action Shooting™ match on the first weekend in August without "let or hindrance" as the lawyer fellers say.

Then, suddenly, the land was sold. They had to move—and fast.

Parks, and Wildlife Foundation and the Alberta Federation of Shooting Sports. Alberta has perhaps the most pro-gun government in North America. Casinos were run by more volunteers to raise additional funds. And, the people and industries of the little town of Rocky Mountain House itself donated in goods, equipment, and in cold, hard cash \$30,000 worth of stuff. And the range wasn't the only thing improved. Truckload after truckload of gray shale was brought in to bring not only the range, but the on-site club campground up to snuff. Pulling gun carts is now a piece of cake.

While all this was going on, they were working with the new owners on decommissioning Ft. Kusk. You don't just walk away from a gun club. There's something called "site remediation," which means sifting out 10 years worth of lead bullets shot happily into berms and backstops one 250 grain bullet at a time.

When asked for tributes to donors and such, B. Slim just shakes his head and allows there are just too many. Mustang Heart summed it up with her special thanks to those who "volunteered countless hours, equipment, money, and 'sweat'. Because of you, we have what we have." What they have is simply one of the best Cowboy Action Shooting™ facilities I've seen

in almost 20 years traveling North America to cowboy shoots. And, they did it in two and a half months!

Looking south you shoot down into a ravine as spectacular as Ohio's Guns of August. North you shoot over a flat, sandy desert as dry and dusty as Arizona.

"We had no idea we could do it," admits B. Slim. "We astounded ourselves."

Rest on their laurels? Not B. Slim.

"We all need to remember that in our sport, change is the key to all the excitement we enjoy," he says.

Work party, ho.

And he wasn't kidding. I phoned a friend of mine in Rocky and was told, "If you haven't seen the range since 2008, you've no idea. They've improved it 100 per cent since then, and you'll often see B. Slim out there banging away all on his own. He's amazing."

So saddle up and go there. But you'll have to respect that "weather permitting" thing. These are hardy folks. The school buses don't stop running until the mercury hits 40 below. There's outside recess even for JK until it hits 20 below. But the toddlers can come in and warm up every 5 minutes until it rises to a mere 15 below. After that they're on their own. So when they say the weather isn't permitting anything, it's a veto! 🐾
