## 2024 SASS WESTERN CANADIAN CAS REGIONAL CANADIAN NATIONAL WILD BUNCH CHAMPIONSHIPS

he 11th Annual SASS Western Canadian Regional Championship of Cowboy Action Shooting<sup>™</sup> and the SASS Canadian National Wild Bunch Championship was held June 25 to 30 at the Willow Lane Ranch Range near Granum, Alberta Canada and was hosted by the Porcupine Hills Shadow Riders. This was the first time the Shadow Riders hosted this event that was initiated by Grey Beard (SASS #79061) and Granny One Shot (SASS #79062), along with their Saskatchewan Association of Wild West Shooter's club, ten years ago. The match will likely return there for 2025. In total, 54 competitors from all four provinces plus two folks from Ontario competed in the six-day event.

The week started with the Canadian National Wild Bunch Championship Match, with 16 competitors, held over two days. The overall winners were Donny Two Legs (SASS #79382) and Mad Maddie McGrew (SASS #113423).

Long Range Side matches were also on offer Tuesday Morning. Wednesday's events included the Ladies Tea held at the Ranch Log Barn and attended by 24 Ladies. Granny One Shot gave an entertaining demonstration on how to make a hat. Tea and a delightful lunch were served by Caitty Calhoun (SASS #111278) and her capable crew. The day's events came to a conclusion with a potluck supper followed by the Wild

Bunch awards.

Thursday was speed match day plus some great derringer and pocket pistol side matches organized by Rusty Coyote (SASS #75574). Participation in these side matches is very high due to the guns and ammo being provided. A four-stage warm up match was held and braggin' rights went to Alberta Annie and Northern Easyrider (SASS #92528). The popular Annie Oakley shotgun challenge rounded out the day's competitions and was won by Battle River Rio (SASS #33498). A BBQ your own steak supper was on offer Thursday evening, followed by a great jam session directed by Southwest Trapper (SASS #82702), Pine Coulee Kid (SASS #113295), and Donny Two Legs.

The main match began on Friday and competitors shot four stages each day for a total of 12 main match stages. Our SASS Western Canadian Regional overall Champion was Donny Two Legs and our Ladies Overall Champion was Alberta Annie. After supper Friday evening, Dapper Doc Thompson (SASS #72011) and the Reverend, Sweet Dorcy (SASS #92712), hosted the Saloon Girl competition, won by Samsquanch (SASS #113618). Funds raised from the competition along with donated clothing sales amounted to \$900 Canadian Dollars, which was donated to the SASS Scholarship Fund.

Saturday's highlight was the ever-popular Team Shoot with Donny Two Legs, Hazbin (SASS #113695) and Powder Paw (SASS #92467) winning the day! The Costume Awards followed our formal banquet and a dance with music by Blacksmith rounded out Saturday's events.

Sunday morning Cowboy Church was presided over by Trigg R Puller (SASS #104680) and our final day of competition was shot in a light drizzle, which did not dampen the spirits of our stalwart competitors. The skies finally cleared for the second wave of shooters and our Awards Luncheon was held with blue skies overhead.

• ur area of southern Utah is called "Red Rock Country" and our State theme is "Life Elevated." Both are accurate sayings. Name an outdoor activity and you'll probably find it here. If you're into shooting sports, the Southern Utah Shooting Sports Park has you covered. Among its six venues is the home of the Dixie Desperados, a SASS affiliated Cowboy Action Club where the steel is up seven days a week/365 days a year!

I've written about this event for a number of years now, but this year I'm going to start out by giving you a look at the Regional and Territorial Championships from a different perspective. Those of you who know me know I'm as comfortable behind a camera lens as I am behind my Cowboy guns. In addition to photographing a number of club and State events and doing freelance work, I've had the honor of being the photographer at EOT for six years. So, where am I going with this? When folks are on the line, I position myself so I'm not noticed... but I certainly notice them. I get to see lots of things through my lens that may be taken for granted, or even missed. Several things stood out at this year's event that caught my attention — the number of families

that are participating in our sport and along with that, the increased number of juniors, Buckaroos and Buckarettes.

In addition, the quality of those running the timers was quite impressive, as they should be. I normally see a T.O. or two who crowds the shooter a bit or focuses on counting misses rather than watching the shooter and counting shots. Not this year. And the individual posses... the enthusiasm and support for those at the line (particularly the younger shooters) was outstanding. We had more younger shooters and first timers to this event than I've seen in quite awhile. With this kind of turn-

out, I can say SASS and our sport are in good shape. Now, on to the matches and the results!

The week started with the Wild Bunch Western Territorial Championship match. Ten stages were shot by 44 participants over two days, with Texas Tiger (SASS #74829) and Mokaac Kid (SASS #78721) taking top women's and men's overall honors. In the Wild Bunch Top Gun shoot off, it was Buffalo Belle (SASS #105271) and Mokaac Kid.

Our Four Corners Championship had 186 shooters complete the event. Overall winners were Shamrock Sadie (SASS #78511) and Gut C Gunman (SASS #105725), with Top Gun shoot off honors going to Skrap P (SASS #105726) and Texas Tiger.

The weather cooperated and aside from a few cloudy mornings, one after-

noon of very light showers, and a bit of wind, it was comfortable with blue skies.

Wednesday started with a Cowboy Swap Meet, side matches, and for lunch, a shooters' pot luck hosted by the Dixie Desperados. Meatball subs were the main course with side dishes and desserts galore. 

Ye been part of Cowboy Action Shooting<sup>™</sup> going on 30 years now. I've met a lot of new friends. Nowadays, I'm losing a lot of great friends.

Our minds and bodies age differently from each other. I am hopeful I will be of a clear enough mind and have enough intellectual fortitude to put my guns away before I am unsafe to myself and to others. But I may not be able to do that. I may always think I can go to one more CAS match, make one more hunting trip. But unless I am careful or lucky, there will be the day that "the accident" happens. We all rage against the dying of the light.

We will either die or reach a point where someone takes away our car keys. How do we determine when it is unsafe to allow someone to continue participating in Cowboy Action Shooting? There is no rule, no test, today that can predict the future and tell you on Stage 7 on this day "Thunder Bunny" is going to no longer be able to safely handle his firearms.

How do we tell the difference from an occasional brain fade in shooting order to can't ever remember the shooting order? Is remembering the shooting order a requirement? Are they safe but they get a procedural all the time? Again, are they safe? How can we determine when someone goes from procedurals and minor safety issues to being at risk for committing an actual dangerous act? And the dangerous act then becomes an actual incident?

Who is to blame? And believe me there will be those looking to figure that out. Is it the shooter alone? How about those who knew the shooter had declined in their mental facilities but decided to let him keep "shooting at stuff"? What is their culpability? Accusing fingers will point. Depositions will be taken. Consequences will be real. Should we simply let someone keep shooting until they end up charged with a crime and one of their friends gets injured (or worse)? I hope not.

What is someone is deemed unsafe by club A but not by club B? Who in the club makes the decision anyway? Is it right to put one person in such a position as to be accountable for the mental clarity and physical capabilities of another?

We have struggled with how to respectfully deal with the issues that come with aging with our friends and loved ones for as long as we have had friends and loved ones. I don't have any answers. I sure dread the day something happens and someone comes to me looking for them.

## WHEN YOU CAN'T Compete Anymore By Punxsutawney Pete, Sass #1286 Life

No, my badge number is not a misprint It really is four digits. I joined SASS back in 1990 after reading **American Handgunner** and seeing how much fun Cowboy Action Shooting<sup>™</sup> was. At the time there wasn't a posse within 300 miles of me, but I figured with as much fun as this sport appeared to be, someday it would come close to where I lived. And it did. I started actively shooting in local matches and with the Mid-Atlantic states being close together I got to take

part in a fair number of state championship matches. I wasn't the greatest shot in the world but I had a lot of fun and of course, made a lot of friends whom I would look forward to seeing wherever I went. Plus, being in SASS gave me the chance to be an extra in two independent production movies. I didn't win any shooting prizes, but I did the best I could. I could run fairly fast between stations in an event and that made up for shooting slower than most people. I got out my cowboy finery for the banquets and hopefully cleaned up fairly well.

But life sometimes has other plans. Time has a way of marching forward and with advancing age there can be an onset of medical issues. This isn't just an issue of moving from being a 49er into the Elder Statesman category. We have these categories to help keep the Cowboy Action<sup>™</sup> shooters in the game. What I'm referring to here is where the advancing medical issues may make it impractical and/or impossible to compete in matches at all. These can be in the nature of cardiac issues and/or skeletal issues. This is eventually what happened to me. I won't go into details, but suffice it to say I have medical opinion that participating in Cowboy Action Shooting<sup>™</sup> matches is not a good idea for me.

I didn't want to just walk away from SASS and the people in it I had been associated with for three decades and have everybody wonder, "What ever happened to Punxsutawney Pete?" So what do you do when your physical issues make it impossible to compete in the matches anymore? Hopefully you keep your SASS membership active. That way, you can still keep up on what events are happening and determine if you'd be able to attend.

Back in 2018, I got the inspiration to contact the person in charge of a state championship match I hadn't attended for 10 years. I explained my personal issues and said even though I couldn't compete in the shooting events, I wanted to hang out during that match and attend the meals at my own expense. The person in charge could not have been more welcoming and assuring that they would do everything they could to make sure I was comfortable while I was there.


With the welcoming message I received, I booked a room and drove up to the match on a Friday. I wasn't at the clubhouse more than five minutes when people I hadn't seen in years were welcoming me back. When the match was in progress on Saturday, I ran into another old friend from many matches who was genuinely very happy to see me. It really was like I had never been away. I have not identified the event or sponsoring club because I want to think any club or posse would be this welcoming to a former competitor who wanted to

come back to reconnect with brothers and sisters in SASS. To me this is what the Cowboy Way is about.

So now, even though I don't compete anymore, I have been back to several major SASS events to enjoy being with my old friends and make new friends. It has been a joy to be welcomed back.

If you're concerned about being able to afford the fees for an event, the major state and regional matches have provided means to allow people who can't compete to be able to come back. For a very reduced fee you can sign up as a "Conventioneer" so you would be able to attend the banquets without paying the match fees for the shooting events. I can still watch the shooting events (while wearing the appropriate protective gear) for as long as my physical state will allow.

The relationships people form make SASS special. What I learned is even when you haven't been able to take part in a match for years, pull out your costuming and go back to the matches you used to attend. I think you'll find you have genuinely been missed and will be remembered and welcomed.


MARSHAL STONE AND TRIPOD



The Doily Gang way includes giving back by encouraging ladies of all skill levels, promoting knowledge and skills in Cowboy Action Shooting, raising awareness of various shooting styles and techniques, helping new shooters overcome anxieties, participating in shooting events, celebrating achievements, and fostering friendly competition.

Members of the Doily Gang are easily recognizable by their badges and cloth doilies, symbolizing their motto and allowing other Cowgirls to identify them quickly. The Doily Gang hosts clinics that are more than just training sessions — they are empowering experiences. These energetic clinics empower ladies with confidence, providing tips and techniques on transitions, drawing pistols, levering rifles, loading and shucking shotguns, staging guns, practice tips, and the mental game.

The first official Doily Gang clinic took place at the Georgia State Championships in May 2013. Since then, Shamrock Sadie has coordinated 51 clinics with 65 top-notch instructors, educating 664 eager students and raising more than \$15,000 in donations for the SASS Scholarship Fund. In 2014, the Doily Gang also organized a Cowboy Action Shooting Postal Match, with participation from five countries, 22 clubs, 120 shooters in 24 categories, and raising \$1,300 for the SASS Scholarship Fund.

Shamrock Sadie's commitment to the sport and the Doily Gang has been unwavering since her start in Cowboy Action Shooting in 2007. Her contributions range from volunteering at various levels (monthly, state, regional, national, and world) to helping with match setups, scoring, and creating promotional video content. She also created match shooter handbooks for numerous clubs, wrote stages, served as a Range Officer instructor, Match RO, and Posse Marshal at numerous matches. An active SASS member since 2010, Pearly Heart first crossed paths with Shamrock Sadie in 2011 and has since regarded her as a role model and mentor, both on and off the range. Pearly Heart's consistent passion and dedication to Cowboy Action Shooting has made her a Multi-State, National, and World Champion shooter. Though empowering and helping SASS shooters with finding direction and building a safe space for growth is a very familiar concept for Pearly Heart, she has always wanted to expand on a larger scale to pour into others as so many have done for her.

When Shamrock Sadie offered her the opportunity to lead the Doily Gang, there wasn't even a second thought to accepting such an honor. This change in leadership will still hold the same core values and principles that the Doily Gang was founded on. With Pearly Heart stepping into these new shoes, a variety of exciting changes and developments can be expected. She is looking forward to experiencing this role alongside new and familiar faces in the journey ahead.

As the Doily Gang continues to flourish, an exciting transition is on the horizon. In October 2024, the energetic and world champion shooter, Pearly Heart, will take over leadership of the Doily Gang. Pearly Heart's enthusiasm and expertise promise to bring new energy and direction to the group, continuing the legacy of empowering lady competitors.



# CALIFORNIA STATE Championship 2024



know. I get it. We are so fortunate living in Southern California and it just isn't fair to the rest of the world. It's the weather. While the rest of America bakes in broiling heat, bastes in humidity, or shivers under a blanket of snow, sleet, or ice, Californians luxuriate in moderate temperatures, modest rainfall, and a near absence of climate extremes. Sure, we have to put up with so called "progressive" and woke politics, our taxes are the highest in the US, and so are our gas prices. And we have an occasional earthquake. But, we make up for it with the weather. Right?

We don't have a roof. With an envious sigh, I wipe my gloves across my rain spattered shooting glasses. Suck it up, buttercup! It's time to begin the 2024 SASS California State Championship!

Shoulders squared, I look down at the stage description. The posse looks up, expectantly at me, the Posse Marshal, standing with a sheet of waterlogged paper on a clipboard in my hand. As nearly as I can tell, from the water running down my arm, making the ink run, and melting the paper in my hand, the stage calls for us to shoot a *blethersquid* sweep. Oh, this is gonna be fun.

The good news is the weatherman has predicted only a five percent chance of rain and promised it will end at 9:00 a.m. It does not. It does, however, finally stop at 10:30. But only because that's when the flecks of snow begin to fall. May that lying sack of a weatherman die a cold, lingering death, and be buried deep in a glacier, with an iceberg for a pillow, and an cold pack beneath his feet. It was warmer in 42 states, that Friday.

None of this is the fault of the match organizers of course, who have assembled a fun 'n' fast 2024 SASS California State Championship match. And because of their efforts, bonded by a mutual shared misery, as the first shots ring out and the lead begins to fly down range, our posse is actually starting to have a great time, sharing umbrellas, hand warmers, hooting and hollering and banging away at the steel targets. We slither cautiously on wet boardwalks, shake water droplets from our gun sights, and clump bravely across sodden stages with clay-like mud clinging to our boots. And we all get through it, together. But, there's not a lot of good-natured banter once we're done. As soon as the shooting is over, most of the competitors head for their

campers or home. It's an odd feeling, not hanging around after the first day of a match! But back at home, I dig out my rain gear, some long underwear, a pair of those nifty electronic hand warmers, and a hat that I care a bit less about, prepared now for the rain.

Ready now for anything, Saturday

is soon upon us, and the hardened California shooters (bolstered by an equally plucky cadre of Nevada and Arizona visitors!) head bravely back into the fray. The gods have smiled on this day, however, or remembered that this is supposed to be blinking California! As if begging for forgiveness for yesterday's climatic transgressions, Saturday dawns crystal clear, the sky a rich cerulean blue, the hillsides now carpeted with bright green, dotted with wildflowers, and resplendent with freshly watered growth. Snow glittering on the distant mountains is the only reminder of yesterday's chill, and Sunday's even better weather drives the sorry climatic conditions of Friday deeper into the quickly-forgotten distance.

With the Southern California weather pattern returned to something like normal, jackets are quickly shucked, sleeves are soon rolled up, and the coconut aroma of suntan lotion takes the place of umbrellas and ponchos. And faster than a Democrat can raise taxes, the weather is back to California perfect.

Our posse, in the way of good posses everywhere, quickly falls into a comfortable routine. Shooters who like to go first belly up to the loading table, spotting sticks are handed off without a word needing to be spoken, and with bright expended shell casings glinting against the fresh ground, even brass picking duties are handled quickly and efficiently.

That camaraderie that was forged by mutual discomfort from Friday has blossomed into a genuinely enjoyable posse experience. A laughing, relaxed posse makes for an enjoyable shoot, and helps the shooters, regardless of their skill level, do their very best.

The Cajon Cowboys, one of the oldest clubs in SASS, shoot at the Route 66 Shooting Sports facility in the Cajon Pass, just north of San Bernardino. The owners of the shooting facility purchased the land a few years back and graciously allowed the Cowboys to keep their stage fronts and props on site. The new ownership's staff are unfailingly courteous, polite, and often genuinely curious as dozens of cowboys descend on a site typically filled with black plastic and magazine releases. In turn, it's clear that the Cowboys and Cowgirls who participate in their regular events are respectful and appreciative of the relationship with the new owners of the range. It makes putting on a major event a lot easier, on a shared facility!

I have the very good fortune to be on a posse with Dastardly Dave (SASS #2324) and Running Bare (SASS #2323). These two have been shooting Cowboy Action since the inception of the game and they help keep the posse between the rails. Notorious gambler Pico Pistolero (SASS #91439) runs the evening poker tournament with the same ease and facility that he does a timer. No one is rushed and no one goes to a stage before they are squared away on the stage. It's fun, it's fast, and like I said, with smiles all around it makes life easier for the shooters. Whether you're playing to win, playing for style, like Eevore (SASS #78077) and his 10-inch-barreled cap and ball Navy revolvers, or Capnball Turmoil (SASS #79103), just playing for the glorious boom and clang that black powder brings to the game, we're all having a great time.

The Cajon Cowboys, ramrodded by Clint Steele (SASS #106334) and Sassy Kitty (SASS #106468), have done this all before and it shows. The stages are well thought out and interesting, with just enough challenge to keep a body engaged, and straightforward enough that "P" traps are a rarity.

With the bitterly cold rain, the event closed down pretty quickly after shooting on Friday, but Saturday and Sunday are a whole different matter. The vendors are kept hopping, sales of food, coffee, and cowboy necessaries are brisk, and great appreciation is shown to the food vendor, who unflinchingly kept their barbeque going through the chill of Friday, and poured out a lot of hot chocolate, instead of the customary icy soft drinks and cold water!

So vendors vend, cowboys chat about their matches, while interested shooters from the nearby gun range gawk and point delightedly at the cowboy fashion show, and ask lots of questions.

American Gun Works brought along a Gatling gun, and for a few bucks you could spin the crank and send a fountain of lead down range. The afternoon was punctuated by a steady stream of *braaaaaps*, inevitably followed by hoots of delight and giggles. Understand that California has very few Class 3 licenses, and this is as close as shooters are likely to ever get to a giggle switch.

The Wild Bunch event took place on Thursday, under threatening but dry skies. Wild Bunch is a favorite of mine these days and the three-stage match was designed by Ambs Aces (SASS #103511) to encourage participation and ease the burden on the Cajon Cowboys set-up crew. Accordingly, we shot the match on the same stages and distances as the Cowboy match.

With the Wild Bunch targets a bit closer than the norm, a little creative engineering kept the match challenging. While the shooters could blaze away at the closer pistol targets, they would then use their 1911s to shoot the rifle targets on most stages and that slowed down most of the competitors. There was even a stage where (cover your eyes, die-hard WBers!) a shooter could make up any shotgun misses by reloading and re-engaging them. I think most folks found that reloading could easily take longer than the five-second penalty for a miss, but it's nice to have the option! The match was fun and fast and with 46 shooters blazing away, there were no complaints that I heard. (But, in all fairness, a lifetime of shooting, rock 'n' roll, and motorcycles may have left me a bit deaf, so....) If you think it's too easy, just go faster. You'll find a limit, I promise.

Saturday Night featured an excellent banquet, with me going back for thirds and putting away enough chicken and tri-tip that I didn't really need to eat again until about Tuesday. After the banquet, yours truly, Frederick Jackson Turner, pulled out his guitar and serenaded the folks with songs from my Cowboy Action Shooting-themed album, "The Way of The Cowboy," a collection featuring all original songs written about what we do. Such hits as "The Whining Cowboy ('Or Why I missed the Target')," "The Wreck of the Old '97," and my paean to stubborn shotgun knockdowns, "Shoot It Again," tickled the audience until it was time to go home. Over in the corner of the main tent, as they so often do at Southern California events, Double-Scotch (SASS #47509) and Colonel Angus (SASS #89408) presided over a makeshift bar, listening to tales of woe, offering helpful bartenderly advice, and, most importantly, dispensing appropriate soft drinks and adult beverages to the masses.

When the last few hardy souls had tottered off to bed at last, peace reigned and stillness descended on the clear, starry night that blanketed the Cajon Pass. But only for a few hours.

Sunday morning, the Top Gun Shoot-off welcomed 32 quick-shooting top competitors, men and women alike, and as the sun cracked the horizon, steady nerves, keen eyes and twitchy trigger fingers prepared to bang away in head to head competition. It was time to decide who the fastest shooter really was – at least that weekend!

I had the misfortune to draw Reverend Leadslinga (SASS #101284), a top shooter from Arizona who finished just ahead of me in the main match. Well, by golly he did the same thing again in the shootout, so I got a comfortable seat to watch the rest of the proceedings. When the smoke cleared, accompanied by the hoots and howls of an appreciative cowboy audience, Nevada's Sandstone Drifter (SASS #111617) had sawed through the competition and emerged victorious for the men. Lady Gunfighter Rebecca West (SASS #78022) finished at the top of the heap for the women.

At the awards ceremony, I contemplated the handsome shooter's handbook. This year's theme was a suitable homage that honored the Native Americans who were a part of this great nation's unique history. The match organizers assembled a great booklet with pictures and backgrounds of many of these historic Americans.

Soon enough, awards were given out, and the ceremonies drew to a close. The culmination of the event was when Sassy Kitty was awarded a crown (really!) by Clint Steele for all her hard work in keeping the match, and him, organized and on the rails. You know the rest. Backs were slapped, hands were shaken, and farewells were said. It was all over too soon and all that was left was to make the trek home and start planning for next year!

Many props to the participants, a special thanks to the many out of state shooters who made their way here (and it must be said, gave the home-town contingent a bit of a whoopin!), and a big congratulations to all, especially the up and coming first-time category champs! I sincerely hope to see you all once again in 2025!
















## THE REGULATORS' RECKONING 2024 TENNESSEE STATE SASS CHAMPIONSHIP







The match was held June 22, 2024 at Shacklesfords, Virginia and was hosted by Mattaponi Sundowners and the West Point Gun Club.



# THE SLIPPERY SAGA OF Soapy smith



efferson R. "Soapy" Smith was one of the most preeminent con men of the Old West. During his relatively short life he swindled thousands of people out of what would be millions of dollars in today's currency. He mastered the art of rigging games of "chance" where there was almost no chance of coming out ahead. In addition, he was a superb organizer of criminal networks. For a while, he operated blatantly and with impunity. You could easily deem him the Tony "Soap"rano of his day.

Jefferson Randolph Smith II was born into a wealthy family in Coweta County, Georgia in 1860. The next year saw the outbreak of the Civil War. By the end of the Civil War, many of the wealthy families of the former Confederacy were penniless. According to some sources, Jefferson Sr. sought solace in alcohol. At any rate, he wasn't around much, and if he was indeed an alcoholic, Jefferson Sr. probably neglected his parental duties.

The family moved to Round Rock, Texas in 1876 to get a fresh start. His mother died the following year and young Smith moved to Fort Worth. By that time, Jefferson, who was in his late teens, had taken up with some decidedly shady characters. Under their tutelage he learned how to swindle foolhardy gamblers. He ran shell games, three-card monte, and crooked poker. More importantly, he learned to be a superb organizer. At a young age, Jefferson saw the advantage of having a loyal group of reprobates. If Jefferson didn't have any luck swindling someone, perhaps one of his accomplices would. The profits would be split, and some of the money would be pooled for legal fees when someone got arrested. Other funds would be set aside for bribery.

The authorities in Fort Worth who weren't on the payroll grew tired of Jefferson's gang. Laws were passed that were

specially construed to put a stop to their activities. In 1879, the gang decided to move elsewhere. The burgeoning town of Denver, Colorado was just the ticket. Gambling laws were lax and new people were steadily passing through.

It was in Denver that Jefferson perfected the scheme that earned him his nickname. He would set up a table and begin hawking bars of fancy soap wrapped in plain paper. The soap, which was especially "fabulous," cost one dollar a pop. Inside some of the wrappings were various denominations of cash. If you bought a bar, you had a chance of earning a prize of \$1.00, \$5.00, or perhaps \$100.00. Among the crowd were some of Jefferson's men who served as "shills." These would inevitably be the guys who unwrapped the lucky soap. They would shout out their good fortune, thereby encouraging the crowd to buy more soap. Soon, the remaining bars of soap would be auctioned off to the highest bidders. Even if someone legitimately won the \$100.00 bill, there would be a huge profit. At the end of the day, the swindlers gathered at a saloon, drank beer, laughed and divided the money.

One day Jefferson was arrested and booked at the local jail. The arresting officer had forgotten Smith's first name and wrote "Soapy" on his report. The name stuck and Jefferson Smith became known thereafter as Soapy Smith.

Even an experienced bunco artist must put up with the occasional bit of legal interference. Soapy sought to minimize that by putting most of the police

bribes than the effectiveness of his argument. Despite the bribes, things were getting uncomfortable in Denver for Soapy. He was accused of election interference by the press and folks were getting tired of his drunkenness and bad temper. Indeed, chaos seemed to dog his footsteps.

He also decided to expand his operations. In 1888, he opened

also offered entertainment of the immodest variety. Above the door was a sign which read "Caveat Emptor." This was a fitting warning because *Caveat Emptor* is Latin for "let the buyer beware." It was a warning that you didn't stand much

of a chance of winning at the card table. Soapy claimed at one

point that he was doing a public service at the Tivoli because it cured gambling addicts of their vices. They would learn the cold lesson that gambling wouldn't pay off—at least, not for the gambler. Ironically, Soapy himself loved to gamble and

If you failed to heed the warning over the door or couldn't read Latin, you would be greeted by a veritable legion of swindlers, crooked card dealers, muggers, pickpockets, and prosti-

Eventually, Soapy was taken to court by a couple of cus-

tomers who felt they had been cheated out of \$1,500. (That was nearly \$50,000 in today's currency.) Once the evidence was presented, Soapy presented a novel defense. He claimed

tutes. The Tivoli seemed like a friendly place, but it was a ruse to soften up the suckers. If you didn't feel like playing cards or roulette, how about buying some diamonds? The prices were literally too good to be true since the diamonds were fake. You could also buy stocks at the Tivoli, but they weren't worth the paper they were printed on. The best thing to do would be to leave the checkbook at home and only bring as much cash as

The Tivoli was a saloon and gambling establishment. It

the Tivoli Club.

Soapy decided to take a break from Denver and moved to the boomtown of Creede, Colorado in the early 1890s. Once he established himself, he opened another saloon and gambling hall called the Orleans Club. The Orleans Club ran scams like the ones in the Tivoli, but Soapy added a new twist when he began exhibiting the "Petrified Man," whom he named McGinty. To view McGinty, a customer had to pay 10 cents and stand in line. The "petrified man" was a skeleton covered in concrete, but after a few drinks, nobody seemed to notice. Meanwhile, the customer was tempted by shell games, three-card monte, prostitutes, and the like. When the silver ran out of the Creede mines, Soapy and his cohorts relocated back to Denver. They assumed things had cooled off.

The reputation of the Tivoli had suffered as an increasing number of people complained of being ripped off. Soapy merely bought a new place nearby which he named the Silver Dollar club. This became his headquarters. Soapy didn't try to hide the fact he was a con man anymore. He even made a statement that "bunco," or swindling, was one of the most noble professions on earth. The whole thing fascinated him, especially the psychological part. Unfortunately, in 1893 Colorado inaugurated a new governor named Davis Waite who ran on a reform ticket.

Waite set his sights on Denver City Hall, which was notoriously corrupt. He began his campaign by removing the police and fire commissioners whom he accused of accepting bribes for shielding prostitutes and gamblers. The commissioners refused to go peacefully. Instead, they holed up in City Hall and appointed "special deputies" who armed themselves with rifles and dynamite. Not surprisingly, since he bankrolled most of the police and firemen, Soapy was one of the deputies.


Governor Waite responded by calling in the Colorado National Guard and told the federal troops stationed at Fort Logan to be ready to join the fight if things got nasty. A tense standoff ensued where Denver residents saw cannons and Gatling guns being trained on the building. Eventually, Waite was persuaded to allow the Colorado Supreme Court to rule on the constitutionality of the officials' removal. The court ruled in Waite's favor and the "City Hall War" was resolved peacefully.

Waite went on to crack down on Denver's gambling halls, saloons and brothels. For a while, Soapy kept his title as deputy and detained patrons of his own establishments who had lost large sums of money or who wished to keep their embarrassing pastimes out of the newspapers. They could go free if they paid a fee or agreed not to put up a fuss. Alas, Soapy couldn't get away with this forever, and decided to leave town. After going on a drunken rampage through Denver with his brother Bascom, he departed. They hurled beer kegs through windows, picked fights and shot holes in ceilings of local saloons. Bascom wound up in jail, while Soapy slipped past the authorities.

Eventually, Soapy and his gang went to Alaska. It was an ideal new location for them to start over. In 1896, gold had been discovered in the Klondike region of Canada. Alaska was the natural place of departure for Americans caught up in this latest "rush." The territory was soon flooded by dupes and suckers. What little law there was in the territory could



easily be bought. Of course, Soapy had no intention of becoming a miner. It was too much work. Why bother with that when you can harvest the fruit of another person's labor?

By 1898, Soapy and his gang were well established in Skagway on the Kenai Peninsula. He ran his operation from a new saloon called Jeff. Smith's Parlor. The Parlor was modeled on the Tivoli and Orleans Clubs, and although it was much more modest, it soon became known as Skagway's unofficial City Hall. One of his first new employees was the town's deputy U.S. marshal. Other town officials were soon added to the payroll.

The Smith gang soon opened a telegraph office near the dock where the miners disembarked from the ships that had transported them to Alaska. Since many of them were family men, they naturally wanted to assure their loved ones that they had arrived safely. There was a telegraph, a guy wearing a cap with a green eyeshade, and telegraph wires. Everything looked legitimate. Unfortunately, the wires ran into the bay and stopped there, since real telegraph lines had yet to arrive in Skagway. Oh, how about a friendly game of poker before heading off to the frozen wasteland? Jeff. Smith's operation was a goldmine in and of itself.

Skagway was the last stop before the White Pass, which was the gateway to the goldfields of the Klondike. Also known as Dead Horse Pass, it was a dangerous and inhospitable place. Sometimes a horse might break down and block the pass. When this happened, some of Soapy's men, posing as miners, would set up shell games to pass the time. The shell game is an ancient form of gambling where you have three shells and one pea. The gambler bets on which shell covers the pea after they have been moved around. If you had quick hands, which Soapy's men certainly did, the shell game was an ideal way to separate fools from their money. Before the dupes caught on, the broken-down horse would miraculously recover, and everybody would be on their way again. On the return trip from the goldfields, it was best to be on your guard and heavily armed. Some of Soapy's men ignored the niceties of rigged gambling and simply held up the pack trains. Once you got to Skagway, you had to run the gauntlet of the

same hazards that greeted you upon your arrival. A fake message from your family might be waiting for you to wire money home. The money never made it past Soapy's safe.

By early 1898, Soapy's criminal organization was at its zenith. He employed crooked officials, crooked gamblers, sham telegraph operators, bribed newspapermen, fake preachers, and smooth-talking prostitutes. In addition, he had a network of "ropers" who befriended you on the ships taking you to Skagway. Once you arrived, your weaknesses were known, and "steerers" would take you to the best place where you could be cheated. It was like herding cattle.

The Smith gang also included a wide assortment of thugs, petty thieves and highwaymen. This, combined with Soapy's sense of invincibility, would prove to be his undoing.

Soapy himself was well-spoken, polite, and impeccably dressed. Indeed, he took great pains to appear suave and polished. He gave generously to charities and took care of his people when they ran into trouble.

Soapy was married to a former dance hall girl, Mary Eva Noonan, whom he met in Denver. They had three children together and he appears to have been a model husband and father, at least when he saw them, which was seldom. They lived back in the states, and he visited them during the winter.

However, there was another side to Jefferson "Soapy" Smith. God help you if you crossed him. He wasn't slow to use his fists or to threaten a person with a gun. Though he is only recorded to have killed one person personally, there were plenty of folks who perished as "collateral damage." If you figure that into the equation, he's responsible for many more deaths. Smith had a nasty temper, especially when he was drunk. He was often in that state, and it was wise to avoid him then.

After a while, people in Skagway began to get fed up with the "Soap Gang" as it was called. Folks can only stand blatant corruption and depredation for so long. What was good for Soapy's business wasn't good for anyone else's. Back in the states, Skagway had earned a reputation as a veritable Gomorrah. It was dominated by a criminal who operated with impunity. Soapy did his best to whitewash his image by employing the services of his own (or owned) newspapermen, but things were spiraling out of his control.

In late January 1898, a young man named Andy McGrath took a lady for a drink at Klondike Saloon and Gambling Hall. The drink had been drugged and McGrath's wallet was empty when he regained his senses. The girl who had accompanied him was nowhere to be found. He decided not to take this lying down and confronted the bartender. He quickly got the living daylights beaten out of him.

Undeterred, McGrath left the saloon and obtained a revolver. While doing so, he ran into an uncorrupted deputy marshal who agreed to accompany him back to the saloon. A gunfight ensued and the lawman and McGrath were killed. Following the melee, the bartender was apprehended by outraged citizens and nearly lynched.

This incident was reported in the Alaska newspapers as well as in the mainland U.S. Although the Klondike Saloon was not directly owned by Soapy, it was assumed it was connected to his organization. It was, after all, one of the safer bets a person could make under the circumstances.

Soapy was back in the states vis-

iting his family when the McGrath incident occurred. He reacted as any self-respecting grifter would under the circumstances by blustering, denying, doubling down, and blaming the victims. He ordered his own journalists to defend him and to attack his accusers. The worst of the incident blew over, but a fair amount of damage had been done. In the meantime, the bartender who had shot McGrath was transported to Sitka. Eventually, a jury would acquit him of the murder charge, ruling he had acted in self-defense.

The whole thing, compounded by everything else that had transpired, left a bad odor. A group of seething citizens formed a vigilance committee called the "Committee of 101" because it had 101 members. Soapy responded by forming his own group, which he boasted contained three times that many men. The two groups took turns threatening and insulting each other. Just in time for Soapy and his gang, the USS Maine blew up in Havana harbor, and the public's attention was diverted to the ensuing Spanish-American War.

Good Citizen Soapy organized a group of volunteers reminiscent of


the Rough Riders. As their captain, he would lead them into the fray against the treacherous Spanish. On July 4, his volunteers took part in a parade through the main street of Skagway. Included in the parade was a huckster dressed as Uncle Sam and a bald eagle in a chicken cage. Soapy rode in front of the volunteers on a magnificent dappled gray mare. After the parade, he sat with the territorial governor and listened to speeches.

A few days later, a successful miner named John Stewart returned from the Klondike with a sack full of gold dust worth nearly \$3,000 (about \$100,000 today). He was set upon by Soapy's men like a wounded rabbit surrounded by coyotes. First, he was invited to view the eagle in the chicken cage in the yard of Jeff's Parlor. Stewart balked and refused to go inside to gamble when invited. He even had the audacity to refuse to go inside to exchange his gold for cash. Tiring of the distrustful miner, Soapy's men grabbed the bag of gold and ran off. Stewart went to the town marshal, who shifted uncomfortably, hemmed and hawed, and ultimately did nothing. The miner left in disgust.

John Stewart told his story to anybody who might listen. It didn't take long for word of the robbery to reach the members of the vigilance committee. A group of representatives went to Soapy to demand the return of the gold. Soapy claimed it had been fairly lost from gambling, but the story didn't hold water. He then promised to return it if there was no further fuss. Time went by and the gold wasn't returned. During that time Soapy cursed, drank, railed against the unfairness of it all, blamed everybody else, and drank even more. A fair number of his gang realized their

reign was ending and left. Besides, it wasn't a lot of fun to be around Soapy when he was in that state.

Finally, Soapy grabbed a Winchester rifle and marched out (somewhat unsteadily) to meet the vigilance committee. There were so many members they had to convene on the City Dock. He'd been warned there would be trouble. Soapy replied, "By God, trouble is what I'm looking for!" He was going to find it.

At the dock he was confronted by a tough customer named Frank Reid. Reid had been a surveyor, engineer, Indian fighter, and perhaps most telling of all, a frontier schoolteacher. Soapy tried to club Reid with the barrel of his rifle, but Reid pushed it down with one hand. In his other hand, he held a revolver. Both weapons went off simultaneously and both men were shot. Soapy took a round through the heart and died instantly. Reid was shot through the groin and lingered on for more than a week. There are differing accounts of the gunfight. Some claim Soapy had a shotgun instead of a rifle, others claim he was shot by someone else. One thing is certain, Soapy's stint as a preeminent conman and gang leader was down the drain. He died before he reached the age of 40.

Soapy's remaining associates fled Skagway like fleas leaving a dead dog. Even his bereaved mistress had to seek greener pastures. At his funeral, the clergyman quoted, "Good understanding getteth favor; but the way of the transgressor is hard." Ironically, the funds to build the church were donated by Soapy himself.

Like the James Gandolfini character in the Sopranos, Soapy Smith was colorful, intelligent, and utterly unscrupulous. He was a natural leader of men. However, he chose a calling that was bound to make him enemies. Ultimately, he lost the sense of knowing "when to walk away" or even "when to run." (Apologies to Kenny Rogers.)

# DISPATCHES FROM Camp Baylor Shooting With (Not At) Frontiersmen

ome shooters have never shot with Frontiersmen. END of TRAIL usually draws 15 or less. Some events have fewer than five. So I would like to introduce you to that elite (or perhaps eccentric) group of SASS shooters. The category requires more work than any other plus an extra set of skills. Frontiersmen use the same rifles as other categories. Only double and '87 lever action shotguns are allowed. The defining feature is they use percussion revolvers with black powder (or a substitute) in all guns. Necromancy, sorcery, and black magic are involved. Powder and ball are inserted from the front of the cylinder. Caps are fitted on the nipples on the back of the cylinder at the loading table. This, like the inserting of cartridges, makes a firearm loaded.

There usually isn't a Frontierslady

category simply because there is not enough demand for it. If you take that as proof that women are smarter than men, or at least less masochistic, you are probably correct.

Frontiersmen have strange rituals involving charging the revolvers. Some use portable loading stations with strange machines to seat the balls (so called because most use round balls instead of conical bullets). Others charge without loaders, sometimes while working the unloading table. If it's raining, they might be charging in the nearest men's room.

As described in earlier Dispatches, some switch charged cylinders.

Etiquette

It's good to know etiquette around loading stations. Frontiersmen are friendly folk, but here are two times they don't want to talk.

1. When they are charging revolvers. When the second revolver goes into its holster, you may talk to them without inducing a growl.

The sign says it all. It works like this. Colonel Kibitzer walks up to Sergeant Frontiersman in deep concentration when charging a cylinder. Kibitzer says, "Hi there." Frontiersman stops to mark where he is in the process and says, "Hi. That'll be \$5."

"Whatchu mean?"

"Read the sign. You're up to \$15 now."

"Fifteen dollars! Are you crazy?"

"Now you're up to thirty-five dollars."

"That's outrageous, I won't pay!"

"Now it's \$135. See the cashier."

2. At the loading table while they are capping pistols or inserting cartridges in their rifles or waiting to move to the next position or reading the stage instructions. In other words, anywhere at the loading table is off limits. But then, that pretty much applies to every shooter preparing to go into mortal combat with evil steel-armored assailants.

Capping is an art. Caps fall out of cappers or pop off when capping. There was a reason extra caps came with Colt paper cartridges. I contend that wasn't enough. They are not dangerous and announcing in your best command voice "I. FOUND A LIVE CAP ON THE LOADING TABLE" is a bit over-dramatic (but it has happened). A busy shooter will ignore them on the table and definitely on the ground. Since they're getting to be 15 cents each when you can

find them these days, that may change. Putting them back into the capper takes too long. I drop them in a pouch with cappers so I can forget them later.

Where possible, Frontiersmen will cap their revolvers at the left (unoccupied) end of the loading table. Until the revolvers are capped, shooters getting in line are requested to go ahead of them. Sometimes capping takes about the time loading cartridge revolvers. Other times it takes much effort and obscene muttering. If the shooter is inserting caps with his fingers, rules prohibiting cursing at SASS matches are waived if it's under his breath. He might be there for a while.

I shoot at some clubs that restrict the loading table to three shooters. If enforced this can be a problem for Frontiersmen. At my best it takes me 1.5 to 2 shooters to cap and load. Bending the rules by Frontiersmen is best ignored. Your posse needs Frontiersmen. They add color and authenticity (meaning mostly smoke and flame) to an otherwise boring show.

## TIMER OPERATORS AND FRONTIERSMEN

There are situations unique to Frontiersmen:

#### 1. Cap Only Ignition

Instead of a BANG!!! There is a pop. Some timer operators, unfamiliar with percussion firearms, thinking it's a squib, order the shooter to put the gun down. Generally it isn't. It's a cap only ignition, meaning the cap fired but did not ignite the powder for some reason. If in doubt, calling for grounding the revolver is prudent, BUT when the gun gets to the unloading table and the barrel is found to be empty, the shooter gets a reshoot. Some timing officers, posse marshals, and even match directors call it a squib because there is a round in the chamber. WRONG!

"In the case of a suspected squib, the TO will instruct the shooter to make the firearm safe and continue with the next firearm. If the barrel is later determined to be clear, the shooter will receive a reshoot." Shooters Hand Book p. 13 (Emphasis added).

#### 2. Chain Fires

A chain fire occurs when rounds in chambers not under the hammer fire simultaneously. The thought of it seems to terrify some cartridge shooters. Since I shoot Ruger Old Armies, I've never personally suffered a chain fire. (I remember an experiment by a black powder club when several attempts to induce a chain fire failed. The Old Army was well designed.) I have witnessed a few, all on Remington replicas. Several conditions are accused of causing them, errant sparks doing mischief. I have been told that's why grease is inserted on top of the balls. I'm pretty sure the grease is added to keep fouling soft and line your holster with Crisco. I have never heard of any damage to the gun involved. The ball won't have a barrel to build velocity. What do you do as TO? Watch. The shooter will probably ground the gun and say something like "Malfunction," "Evil gun," or "&^#!"

#### 3. Hang Fire

The expectation is the gun went pop and won't go bang until the gun is in the holster, etc. That is theoretically possible,

but only in Powerball winning probability. Reality: You hear POP-BANG, separated by less than a full second. This is just enough time for the gun to move toward the next target, giving the shooter a miss after eleven clean stages at Winter Range. Been there, done that. Action by the TO? Nothing. Don't laugh, at least not until all of the firearms are empty.


This happens occasionally in Frontiersman. I found it exclusively with guns shooting American Pioneer Powder or Triple Seven. This caused me to switch to Goex for percussion pistols. I still use APP 3F for cartridges and shotshells (I use BP for shotshells most of the time, APP when BP supplies are low).

#### 4. Clearing a Chamber

Sometimes a Frontiersman needs to fire a cap on a recalcitrant chamber to empty it, so the TO needs to clear the line for a few seconds for him to do it. On a space available basis. Sometimes the chamber didn't have powder in it by mistake. The shooter might remove the nipple and pour powder into the chamber, at least




LOADING STATIONS RULES. THESE ARE STRONGLY ENFORCED.


enough to shoot the ball out of the chamber, and preferably out of the barrel. Then he can reload for the next stage.

#### **UNLOADING TABLE MONITOR**

I usually can tell by the looks on their faces if the monitor is familiar with percussion revolvers. If not, I offer a short Frontiersman ULT Monitor Qualification course. Sadly there is no pin for completing this course at this time. I spin the cylinder to encourage spent caps to fly off. Then I show 12 naked

nipples (or "cones" if you are extremely Victorian). You can see the hole in the middle. That means it's empty. When I find a spent cap, I identify it and take it off, usually with a flick of my Screwknife. Occasionally several attempts with a Screwknife and muttering obscenities is required. A final resort is needle-nose pliers from the gun cart. Sometimes a live cap remains, or at least seemingly live. It didn't go off when the hammer hit it as hard as it could twice. The shooter will remove it using a screw knife or equivalent. I want to see the inside of the cap to see if it didn't have anything in it to make it go bang. (Remingtons are green if charged, gold if not. The green has been known to fall out before it's mounted.)

## WHAT ABOUT THE PINK NIPPLE?

The empty chamber is easily marked

with nail polish, Testors model paint, Sharpie's new acrylic pens, etc., on the nipple. Any color that will stand out to you works.

Now you know enough to posse with Frontiersmen if you didn't before. Do be aware that Frontiersmen have heard every smoke and odor joke. Complaints about the smoke will only cause him to bring out the REALLY smoky, smelly loads.

This will be the last Frontiersman article in The Cowboy Chronicle this year. I promise.

# DISPATCHES FROM CAMP BAYLOR Extra Percussion Caps 2024

mong the shortages facing shooters today, the one that hurts Frontiersman the most is percussion caps. Like primers, they have been off and on short since 2012. I won't get into the rumors as to why and concentrate on dealing with it. The theory is they only make them once a year. It's hard to catch up with that schedule. So buy them when you find them.

Most shooters want Remington green caps. What can we use when we can't get them? With Skinny's help I tested Remington Green and Remington Gold, RWS, CCI, and Winchester Magnum caps.

What I would have liked to do was load up 100 rounds of each with my regular loads and test them in all of my percussion revolvers. What I could do for practicality was to test caps on otherwise empty chambers on multiple guns. I can do that in the shop.

## RESULTS

#### **REMINGTON GREEN**

One-hundred percent ignition on all guns tested. They fit tight on SliXpring's SliXhot nipples, which I use exclusively. My guns are tuned for SliXshot nipples but for harder CCI caps. The theory is if they'll pop with CCI they'll pop with Remingtons.

#### REMINGTON GOLD

Before Remington Green came out Remingtons were gold colored. They were one-hundred percent. For our purposes they work the same. So if you find the gold ones, buy them.

## <u>RWS 1075</u>

The RWS were 100% on Hell, representing tuned guns with springs lightened and parts smoothed.

I shoot two guns with stock springs but polished parts. I use them with six extra cylinders as well as their own. Results were mixed. #535 had three out of five first strike with the factory cylinder, with success on re-strikes. Number 549 had four out of five with success on re-strike. Switching cylinders, both shot five for five. <u>CCI #11</u>

Yes, you use #10 Remingtons and #11

CCI. Don't blame me. They are a little bigger than Remingtons and some shooters squeeze them to prevent their falling of under recoil. Their #10s are too small.

In my tests they ware 100% successful. I give credit to the fact they were all firmly against the nipple. This can be a problem with Remingtons and RWS. Though it may hurt to waste a cap, if it isn't firmly all the way in and can't be pushed in, remove it and throw it away.

### WINCHESTER #11 MAGNUM

Rumor is these are made by CCI. If not, well, they look identical. They do throw longer sparks and make more noise. They fit the same.

The first test (using Hell) resulted in four out of five, with a successful re-strike. I decided to retest, with dirty nipples. Hmmm, three out of five, with success on re-strike. So I tried one more time, five out of five and lots of sparks.

Revolver #535 was five out of five with its cylinder and with a Kirst cylinder.

## SUGGESTIONS FOR BETTER IGNITION

Nipples do get beat up on guns that are dry fired. If you dry fire practice, remove the cylinders. If you see or feel a ridge on the nipple, replace it. If you have a hard time getting a cap on, replace the nipple.

Examine all caps in the capper very critically.

If you can't get enough Remington caps, use what you have for major matches. Use the other brands for practice, chamber clearing, and local matches.

Before every match clean the nipples. If you don't want to remove them, clean the outside half, then turn them 180° and clean that side. Retighten. (Always use Loctite on the threads.)

Seat caps FIRMLY using a Cash Capper and/or the tip of a Screwknife.

With all caps clean the nipples before capping, and if a cap gets crooked or bent remove it.

## CONCLUSION

RWS, CCI, and Winchester are harder than Remingtons, confirming what we already knew. All benefit from a good tuning, whether full strength springs or not. Mike Brackett made Heaven and Hell after several gunsmiths failed. Now he does all of my percussion guns. <u>Goonsgunworks@gmail.com</u>. text/ call 678-467-3950.

# SMITH & WESSON'S NO. 3, 1ST Model American Revolver Cimarron's Beautiful Reproduction

ike Harvey, founder and CEO of Cimarron Firearms, has always had a passion for the Old West. Mike started his business in 1977 with a small Gun Shop in Houston, Texas. Since 1984, he grew the business to be Cimarron Firearms, located in Fredericksburg, Texas. Today, it is one of the premier importers and purveyors of fine replicas and reproductions of firearms of the American Civil War and the Old West. Cimarron has always had a reputation for exacting accuracy in their reproductions, including the discreet location of non-period correct markings and proof marks. The majority of Cimarron's Old West firearms are made by the craftsman of Aldo Uberti Srl. in Brescia Italy.

Starting in the 1970s, Mike became fascinated with the 1870s Army scout

(and partner of Buffalo Bill Cody), Texas Jack Omohundro. Besides his extensive collection of Old West firearms and other historical Western items, Mike began collecting all the memorabilia he could find relating to Texas Jack. This eventually led him to acquire Texas Jack's original US marked Smith & Wesson No. 3 American Model, as well as a second S&W American model without the US markings. That is where this story begins.

Mike Harvey had a long and profitable relationship with the Italian firearms manufacturer Aldo Uberti. Mike's passion caused him to relentlessly pester the Italian arms maker for years in an effort to get them to reproduce the S&W No. 3, 1st Model American. Mike even sent Uberti one of his American models for them to reverse engineer — to do the production drawings in order to manufacture a copy of it. Because of this long relationship, Uberti agreed to manufacture the American Model exclusively for Cimarron.

**AUTHOR'S NOTE:** Thanks to Mike Harvey, many of the Old West firearms currently produced by Uberti are based on reverse engineering of original antique western period firearms from Mike Harvey's personal collection. Over the years, he sent them to Uberti in his efforts to have his products be as historically accurate as possible. In the early years, Cimarron's main Old West replica competitor was Val Forgett Jr's Navy Arms, but they fell by the wayside in the late 1990s. I credit Cimarron's ascendancy over Navy Arms after Forgett's death in 2002 is largely due to Mike's sending originals to Uberti, as well as Mike's near fanatical attention to detail, insisting his products were the most historically accurate.

Initially, Uberti made a replica No. 3 American that was a No. 3 Schofield frame and grip crossed with a No. 3 Russian barrel unit. Mike was not happy with this initial effort and called it the gun that never was. Mike continued to push Uberti to produce a true copy of the No. 3 1st Model American. His persistence paid off and eventually they agreed to produce a faithful reproduction of America's first large bore, metallic cartridge revolver, the No. 3 American.

In late 2018, Cimarron finally

announced the coming release of the No. 3 1st Model American revolver. Uberti had begun gearing up for full production. Then in early 2020, came the worldwide COVID pandemic. Very early on, COVID hit Italy particularly hard. What ensued was several years of COVID shutdowns and then the subsequent "COVID Hangover" for several more years. These factors caused supply chain and production challenges for everyone, including both Uberti and Cimarron. I am happy to announce, however, they are now in full production mode of this wonderful reproduction. Cimarron has now introduced a beautiful and accurate replica of the Smith and Wesson First Model Number 3 American.

The original Smith & Wesson No. 3 was chambered in .44 Henry rim fire (the most common metallic cartridge at the time) for army trials in 1869. In 1870, at the Ordnance Board's suggestion, Smith and Wesson altered the No. 3 design to accommodate a center fire cartridge, which was basically a center fire version of the .44 Henry. Smith & Wesson called this new cartridge ".44 S&W." Eventually in 1871, the No. 3 was also produced in the new, inside lubed .44 Russian round (which caused

the original .44 S&W to be renamed ".44 S&W American"). These No. 3 Americans chambered in .44 Russian are also referred to as the No. 3, First Model Russian.

The .44 caliber family of Cowboy Cartridges (.44 Russian, .44 Colt (BHA), and .44 Special) have been very popular in Cowboy Action Shooting<sup>®</sup> since the very beginning. The .44 Russian and the .44 Colt make reduced "period correct" loads for those folks that shoot Colt Single Action Army revolvers and clones chambered for the .44 Special cartridge. They are also popular with the owners of Uberti manufactured .44 Colt 1872 Open Top, 1860 Richards, and 1860 Richard Mason revolvers that are chambered for the .44 Special round. Uberti already produced clones of the Smith and Wesson No. 3 Russian (3rd Model), top breaks with 6" barrels and distinctive spur trigger guards for CAS shooters wanting something different.

You all should know by now, that Tuolumne Lawman likes the early guns of the Old West, that are "different" from most of the posse. I like 1865 Spencer and 1860 Henry rifles, Colt and Remington Cartridge Conversions, Smith and Wesson top breaks, and hammerd double barreled shotguns. To say I was VERY excited to finally get one of Cimarron's new American Model is an understatement! I have to agree with Mike Harvey's belief that the Smith & Wesson No. 3 American is certainly the COOLEST revolver of the Old West! We finally have a beautiful copy of the S&W No. 3, 1st Model American, with its graceful 8" barrel and distinctive plow handle grips.




TEXAS JACK'S ORIGINAL NO. 3 AMERICAN (COURTESY CIMARRON FIREARMS).

## **THE AMERICAN**

These wonderful revolvers are painstakingly reproduced by Uberti on the latest high-tech CNC machinery, then carefully hand fitted for Cimarron by Uberti's skilled craftsmen. The Uberti factory is located in Gardone V.T., a suburb of Brescia, Italy. Aldo Uberti founded his company in the foothills of the Italian Alps in 1959 to recreate long-obsolete but iconic firearms from the days of the American West and the U.S. Civil War. The factory in the province of Brescia is an area renowned for arms and armor manufacturing since the late Middle Ages.

The Cimarron No. 3, 1st Model American is a faithful copy of the original No. 3 American. I should say, at least on the exterior, it is identical. I understand that on the interior, the original American's lock work design was upgraded to be similar to the current Uberti Schofield design, which is more reliable and durable than the original American's intricate lockwork. This makes the ground-breaking No. 3 American more durable and more reliable than the original early Smith and Wessons.

The American, as I will now refer to it as, is aesthetically very pleasing. It is currently produced by Uberti in both five-inch and eight-inch barreled versions. As far as calibers, the American is available in .44 Special (which accepts .44 Russian and .44 Colt/Black Hills Ammo), .44-40 (44 WCF), and .45




CIMARRON'S NO. 3 AMERICAN .44 RUSSIAN (AUTHOR PHOTO).

Colt (which also accepts .45 Schofield). My Author Sample was an 8" barreled one in .44 Special (Russian/Colt). It is marked "44 COLT & RUSSIAN" on the top line, and " S&W SPECIAL" on the second line. I chose that caliber because I am a purist, and I think an American in .45 Colt or .44 WCF would be blasphemy, but that's just me.

It has a rib along the top of its long, slightly tapered barrel. The entire pistol is blued, with the exception of the hammer, trigger guard, barrel latch, and pivot screw, which are what appears to be real bone color case hardened, rather than the cheaper chemical treatment. The notch rear sight is located in the top of the barrel latch at the rear end of the top strap. The distinctive First Model Russian grip has a pronounced "Plow Handle" shaped grip, with an angle more like the original Colt Bisley than S&W's later Schofield version. The two-piece oil-finished walnut grip panels are a perfect fit. The grip does not have the lanyard ring that the later No. 3 Russian models have.

The front sight is a blued blade, pinned in. The rear sight is a pair of rectangular protrusions on the top of the barrel latch, the space between them making a deep notch. This rear sight system, though it sounds unusual, works exceptionally well! There is ample material on both front and rear sights to allow for removing metal to adjust the impact of the bullet for your pet load.

As with all S&W No. 3s, the action breaks open, the barrel tips down, and ejects all the cartridge cases simultaneously. Once the barrel tips all the way down and the ejector star has kicked out the empty cases, it retracts to be once again flush with the cylinder face.

The thumb activated barrel latch is prevented from traveling upward under recoil by the hammer, which when dropped to the firing position, has a protrusion on the top of the hammer that the cylinder end of the barrel top strap fits snuggly into, preventing any movement at all.

Loading/Unloading of the First Model No. 3 American is simplicity in itself. Because of the above-described locking action of the hammer on the frame thumb latch, it is necessary to first pull the hammer back to the "safety" notch. This frees the thumb latch to be pulled up by the thumb and forefinger of the non-firing hand. The frame will then tip down, forcing the extractor star out, ejecting the empties.

If you only want to only remove a few empty cases, there is an ejector disconnector lever under the front of the frame. Depress this when opening the action and the ejector is deactivated. It is a good idea to turn the American Model on its side (minding the direction of the muzzle) and invert the gun (upside down) to eject the cases downward. This prevents the ejector star from "jumping" over the case rims.

The hammer on the No. 3 American is located somewhat differently than on SAA Colts and their clones. I do not find this a problem, though it took a little time to get used to the larger, somewhat vertical plow handle grip and different hammer placement. The hammer cocking is smooth and fairly light and can be adjusted by a tensioning spring on the front of the grip frame. The trigger pull on the sample was crisp at about 3.5 to 4 pounds (maybe a tad less). It can be made heavier by putting more tension on the hammer spring. The let-off was crisp, with very little creep. The action is crisp, and the timing seems right on the money.

## AT THE RANGE

All group shooting was done offhand, two-hand traditional style, at about ten yards. I used Black Hills 200-grain .44 Russian Cowboy, some 2000 vintage Load-X Cowboy 210grain .44 Colt, and my own 246-grain round nose original factory duplication load as ammunition for the testing.

The Black Hills .44 Russian ammunition regularly shot around 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub>to 11/2- inch groups, two inches above point of aim.

The Load-X .44 Colt ammunition regularly shot around 1 to 11/4 -inch groups, one inch above point of aim.

The Factory Duplication .44 Russian load averaged around also 1 1/4 -to 11/2-inch groups, and about dead on point of aim.

All loads seemed perfectly regulated, centered laterally on target, with no "Kentucky Windage" needed. This is perfect for your average Cowboy shooting steel plate targets. The real fun was shooting the First Model American Duelist style, and doing off hand speed drills in the woods, bouncing pop cans and pine cones at 10 to 20 yards!

It should be noted here that the Cimarron American is on the heavy side, at least compared to other CAS revolvers, especially with the 8" ribbed barrel. This extra weight really tamed the 246-grain factory duplication load, which I found is noticeably a "kicker" in the lighter 1872 Open Top and 1860 Richards Conversion revolvers.

I used the Americans at a local monthly match as well as "Peaceful's End of Track 2024" annual match at Railroad Flat, California. Since my other pistol was a 1999 vintage Dave Anderson 1960 Colt Type I conversion in .44 Colt only, I used the Load-X, .44 Colt (BHA) 200-grain, flat nose loads for the match. I never dropped a shot and all shots seemed to smack the plate in the middle as long as I did my part! The American turned a lot of heads, as other shooters wanted to handle and admire it. In general, several other shooters who were familiar with the Uberti No. 3 Russians unusual European styled grip, preferred the American's "plow handle grip" and vertical angle.

## **HOLSTERS FOR THE CIMARRON AMERICAN**

Cimarron's American will not fit your average 1873 Single Action Army holster. Fortunately, Oklahoma Leather (now a division of Don Hume Hol-

sters) makes a uniquely styled "Slim Jim" style and "Mexican loop" holster that also works for Schofield and American top breaks as well as almost every other single action used in SASS. The 71/2" model works for the 8-inch Americans and Schofields and the 51/2" model works for 5" Americans and Schofields. Both styles come in either right or left hand draw as well as cross draw models that are SASS legal. The Schofield's thumb latch needs a slight modification to the area of the holster where it sits, but with Americans need no modification.

## CONCLUSION

A Cimarron's Number 3, First Model .44 American is perfect for the Cowboy Action Shooter or re-enactor wishing to emulate the early West. It could be paired up with an 1866 Winchester or 1860 Henry. The .44 American is classy and fun to shoot. These hand-crafted Americans are truly magnificent. In Mike Harvey's own words, they are the finest replica old west revolver on the market. Even with a retail of just over \$1350, they are worth every penny.

After all, if a First Model No. 3 American was good enough for Wyatt Earp at the OK Corral, it is certainly good enough for Tuolumne Lawman!





An incredible whirlwind of revenge and justice, two themes that often become intermingled with one another, allows the reader to fully immerse themselves in this narrative. # END OF TRAIL 2024 Cowboy Mounted Shooting World Championship

egend has it that back when fuel was around a dollar per gallon and a box of .45 Colt could be had for under fifteen dollars, there was another class of shooters within SASS. These hearty souls weren't satisfied with shooting targets from a firing line, they wanted to do it from the back of a horse.

Mounted shooting was a part of SASS until sometime in the late 1990s or early 2000s when the complete break took place. It was only common sense as it's pretty much logistically impossible to keep with one's posse and still get to the arena for their runs. Enter Cowboy Mounted Shooting Association, soon followed by several Canadian groups, and then the United States Mounted Shooting Association.

While mounted shooting is no longer an official part of SASS, the ties are strong, with a large number of mounted shooters belonging to their local SASS clubs.

Every winter the Arizona Cowboy Mounted Shooting Association has coordinated their schedule to have a match in conjunction with END of TRAIL and before that Winter Range, and it was no different in 2024, with more than 100 competitors and their mounts running three stages, plus shotgun and rifle stages. For those of you unfamiliar with the sport, a rider begins with two single action army revolvers in .45 long Colt, each loaded with five rounds of black powder blanks. They engage five balloon targets on the way out from the timer line, change guns, and engage five more on the way back – usually in a straight line and at speed. The balloons burst from the burning powder from the muzzle. Shotgun and rifle shooters start with one pistol, engaging five targets on the way out and either a rifle or shotgun on the rundown

back, usually riding without the use of reigns. Competitors are scored on speed and accuracy, with a five-second penalty for each miss or other penalty.

The SASS buckle winners this year were Chatty K (SASS #108322) and Buckskin Run (SASS #44390) Along for the fun were a number of other SASS members, including five time world mounted shooting champion Kenda Lenseigne (Cowgirl Kenda, SASS #24263).

For those of you who didn't get to see it this year, you missed a good time. Next year take a wander across the road, you'll have fun.

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# SUBMISSION Guidelines

*The Cowboy Chronicle* welcomes and encourages submissions of articles and match reports from any and all readers.

Please submit articles in MS Word or something compatible. Open Office and Apple Pages (saved as MS Word) are also fine. A count of 500-800 words is a good target to shoot for, but shorter pieces are also fine. Match reports on larger events, like END of TRAIL, Winter Range, and Regional and Divisional matches may run 1000-1500 words if necessary. We will accept lengthier articles, but may choose to break them up into two or more parts to run in consecutive issues, or heavily edit them.

Please do not embed your photos in the Word document. They can be extracted for use in the *The Cowboy Chronicle*, but it can be a chore to do that. Instead, send your photos separately, in one or more emails, as attachments. Three to six photos per email usually works best. It's best to send JPEGs, but other formats are acceptable, and it's best to keep them at about 300 dpi and 3000 pixels (10 inches) on the short side. That size is ideal and will allow us plenty of leeway when it comes to cropping and adjusting them for publication. Photos should be at least 1000 pixels on the short side to be used for publication. If you're unsure of the size of your pictures, or how to size them, send what you have and we'll adjust them and/or inform you if they're usable.

Usually, two to six photos are sufficient for an article, but we will consider using more for a "big" event, if provided. Photos need not have captions, but captions always make photos more interesting. Ideally, the caption would consist of one or two sentences that say something about the picture that is not obvious and/or is not implicit in the body of the article. "Sam making smoke" is a title but not a caption. "Sam, SASS #XXXXX, shooting his first black powder match; after much deliberation, he decided to give it a try and now he's hooked" is much better. A caption may also serve to let everyone know why the picture is worthy of being published in an international magazine.
